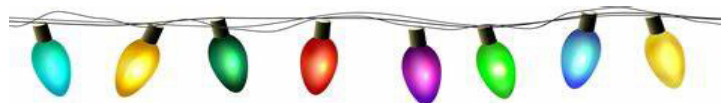

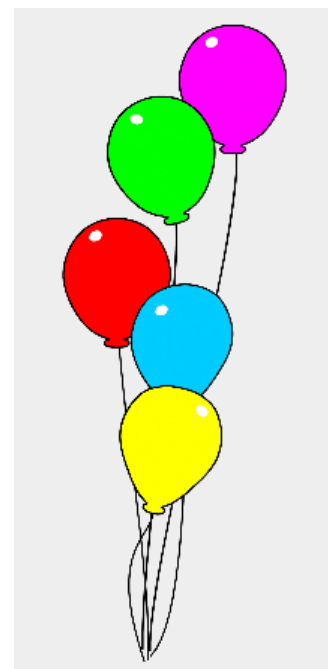

STAMPED OUT

From January 31st 2023, stamps without a barcode* will no longer be valid. You can either use up these stamps before the deadline or swap them for the new barcoded ones. Non-barcoded stamps can be exchanged for barcoded ones through the *Stamp Swap Out Scheme*. Complete a Stamp Swap Out form (available from the Post Office) and send it to us along with your unused stamps. The step-by-step process for doing this is explained in the Freepost envelope. Otherwise you can search on-line for *Stamp Swap Out*.

**Note: Special edition pictorial stamps and existing Christmas stamps without a barcode will continue to be valid and don't need to be swapped out.*

Only unused stamps, attached to their original backing can be swapped out.
