## CANAL BANK

$T_{a}^{n}$he Parish Council has recently opened up discussions with the Canal \& River Trust (CRT) with a view to promoting a scheme to improve the canal near Bridge 46, in Broad Lane.
CRT are seeking local support to progress a scheme that was originally tabled in 2008. That project, which would have seen repairs to the canal banks, improved landing stages and access, signage and moorings for six boats, was shelved because of lack of funding. However, CRT, which is now an independent charity with enhanced fund-raising ability, are keen to re-present the project.
The project is being promoted to the funding bodies as improving amenity and supporting the local economy by encouraging passing boaters to stop and use village facilities. CRT are hoping that their bid will be bolstered by the support of community groups, village businesses and the Parish Council.
[Ed. We hope to have more on this project and how the local community can help in our February issue.]

## OFFICE SPACE

Renovation and conversion work being carried out at the Council Offices in the Symington Building, Adam and Eve Street, Market Harborough is expected to be finished a month ahead of schedule.
The work will include three retail units in the ground floor, accessible via the foyer from the street, with Council and County Council offices in the upper floors, with lift access. Council staff are expected to start moving in by the end of January, with a full return by April. The improvements also include a revamped museum and library within the building.
Meanwhile the District Council has decided to sell the property in Market Street, Lutterworth from which they used to operate the drop-in centre service shop. The building has been used as temporary offices while the Harborough offices have been refurbished but a change of focus will now see the building redundant.
