sers of the 58 bus between Market Harborough and Lutterworth will have seen that the service is now running on a reduced timetable.

Changes made by HinckleyBus, which runs the service, came into effect on August 23rd and sees the loss of the hourly service during the morning and a reduction to 2-hourly for the rest of the day. HinckleyBus say that the situation has been forced on them by low passenger numbers at certain times of the day and other commercial reasons. Leicestershire County Council, which subsidises the route, say that there is no money left in the pot to maintain the full hourly service and needs to focus on the more popular routes. Services between Lutterworth and Hinckley are, at present, unaffected by the changes.



HOME FRONT

s part of their update of the Local Plan, Harborough District Council has recently drawn up a draft survey of land throughout the district. The council's snappily named Strategic Housing Land Availability Assessment (SHLAA), identifies pockets of land that they consider potentially suitable for future housing development within the next 20 years. The survey was initially based on the response to calls on landowners willing to release suitable land for consideration for development. Thereafter it is mainly a desk-based exercise which identifies plots which broadly show the characteristics necessary for development, such as siting, accessibility and availability. Sites identified wouldn't necessarily be 'rubber-stamped' for development and would still need to satisfy a whole raft of normal planning and commercial criteria.



In Husbands Bosworth four sites were originally identified. Sites off Theddingworth Road and Broad Lane have, for the time being, been discounted due to siting considerations, including access and traffic movement.

However, two sites off Welford Road have been retained in the draft document. A site adjacent to the Knights Close exception site is projected to provide up to 30 dwellings. The other site is opposite this and is already being promoted by Davidson Homes with a view to providing 28 homes and a public amenity area.

Outline proposals have been put forward by Davidson's and it is expected that detailed plans for this site will be put before Harborough planners in September.

HOT TOPIC

A public meeting called to discuss the proposal to build a solar farm on agricultural land north of Theddingworth heard that Planning Policy CS9, which states that "there should be no harm to heritage assets, minimum impact on the countryside, no detrimental impact on the landscape and designed to mitigate impact" was likely to be relevant. It was felt that the proposal, as tabled, was in breach of several of these points.

Concerns were raised regarding the impact on the landscape, especially the Laughton Hills, the wider Welland Valley and the view along the valley towards Husbands Bosworth. Despite the offer of £5,000 per annum to Theddingworth parish for the 25 year life of the scheme as a 'sweetener' it was felt that villagers were opposed to the scheme. Highways and English Heritage had voiced concerns over the scale and nature of the proposals and the meeting sought assurances that the statutory consultees were fully informed.

Due to the complexity and public concern the application was likely to go to full Council meeting in September (Ref: 14/008333/FUL)

BYGONE BOSWORTH Images from the Historical Society's Archive Collection

The appearance recently of the 'For Sale' sign outside this property on the High Street, prompted us to delve into the Historical Society's Archive photographic collection. The



building, today no doubt a very desirable residence, was originally the workaday haunt of the village blacksmith, the workshop cluttered with equipment, tools and blackened by years of smoke and heat from the open forge. At a time when the village was largely self-sufficient in most of the dayto-day services the blacksmith would be kept busy repairing and making tools and equipment and keeping the hunters and work horses of the local 'big houses' sound on their feet.

It is pleasing to note that although the building has been extended to two storeys in later years, the form of the original wide doorway has been retained, carrying a normal width door in an unusually wide frame. The horses would most probably have been shod outside in the road if possible, but the wide doorway allowed the blacksmith to bring them inside if necessary



and also allowed big pieces of machinery to be repaired or built in the workshop.

The property was owned by Bosworth Hall Estate and for many years George Dicks was the proprietor of the business, assisted by Harry Payne. Bill French joined them in 1946, when he came out of the Army. When George finally hung up his leather apron and hammer Bill took over the workshop. However, he wasn't a very astute businessman and the business suffered. Eventually John Turner, who had been a blacksmith at Balls Implement Works of North Kilworth, took over the business. The smithy finally closed when John Turner retired in the early 80s.

These pictures were taken by Michael Salter in about 1975, when the workshop was still a hive of activity. Another photo, which we haven't got room to include, shows a wooden door on which are nailed hundreds of foxes feet - a grim reminder of the importance of fox hunting to the local economy in times past.



PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Report of the Parish Council Meeting held on Tuesday, August 5th 2014.

Full Council was present. **Matters Arising**

Clerk and Chairman had been in consultation with the Community Heartbeat adviser regarding provision of a defibrillator. Members queried what funding had been allocated for the project. It was understood that the school had also raised some funds towards a defibrillator. Clerk agreed to consult with the school after the summer recess.

The Chairman had met with the new grass cutting contractors to discuss extra work to the cemetery margins and weed growth in the vew stands.

Council noted that the spurious A14 signs that had littered the A4303 for months had suddenly disappeared. Cemeterv

The Clerk had refurbished the noticeboard in the cemetery.

A grant application had been filed for the Chapel of Rest renovations and a response was awaited.

Playing Field & Play Area

Council noted that the Cricket Club was no longer active. A lot of cricketing equipment was being stored in the pavilion and the Clerk was asked to write to ask if this could be removed.

Users of the children's play area had asked if Council would consider installing some shading for the site. Council agreed to look into erecting a 'sail' shade in the short-term and planting a row of trees along the southern fence.

Some minor defects were highlighted in the recent RoSPA report on the safety of the play equipment. Clerk to arrange for these to be rectified. Allotments

Two untended plots had now been cleared; one of which had been let. A second skip would be required to take the rubbish that had been removed. Two people had expressed an interest in taking half a plot each.

It was noted that a small number of plots needed work to control weeds. Clerk was asked to contact the plot-holders and ask that any untended parts of the plots be strimmed back.

Rural Broadband

BT had approached Council with proposals to site a fibre-optic cabinet on The Green. Council queried the need to site the cabinet, and a possible second one, in such a prominent position. BT had returned with a slightly better position. It was agreed that although the site was not ideal any further objection by Council might hamper provision of the service to the village.

Correspondence & Planning

Council had received confirmation that the telephone box on The Green had not been used to make any 999 calls, no chargeable calls and only 7 freephone calls in the past year and could be considered redundant by BT. As such it could be requisitioned for Paul Bolton

use as a base for a defibrillator.

Council had been awarded a grant of £2,130 towards further renovation work to the War Memorial. Clerk had received confirmation that £4,809 had been allocated for community projects from the New Homes Bonus Scheme. Further funding would be allocated in the 'topping up' procedure once all schemes had been assessed.

Any Other Business

It was noted that work to reduce the height of the roadside wall to Bosworth House on Berridges Lane, in accordance with approved plans and an Enforcement Order, had started.

Clerk was asked to contact the East Midlands Housing to see if the untidy hedge on the roadside of the Knights Close could be cut. Internal hedges would be the responsibility of the householders.

In view of the funding available it was agreed to progress the project to purchase a defibrillator.

Visitors' Questions

Peter Wilkinson, planning consultant for the proposed development off Welford Road addressed the meeting and discussed proposals as they stood presently at the outline stage. Twenty eight homes were envisaged on the site, 7 of which would be low-cost and social housing units. An amenity space would be included in the plans. Concerns about the capacity of the local services and utilities would be answered by the service providers as statutory consultees. Concerns were also raised about the prospect of creating an urban sprawl by building outside the village 'envelope'. Again, these matters would be considered by planners in the planning process. Detailed plans were likely to be presented in September. The next meeting of the Parish Council will be on Tuesday, September 2nd at 7.45pm in the Committee Room of the Village Hall.



From the Rectory

Once again we are into the harvest season and that will mean different things for different people. For some it will mean lower shopping bills as it is possible now to eat some of the produce that has been grown in gardens and allotments. For some it will mean constantly watching the weather, looking for the optimum moment to get the harvest in and then working long hours in order to do so. For the birds it means a glut of berries and seeds in the hedgerows and the squirrels work hard to store what they find for the winter months in the hope they will remember where it is when they need it. Once again at the Rectory we have more apples on our trees than we can either reach or use. Last year the blackbirds feasted on them long into the autumn as the wind eventually blew them down - so if anyone fancies picking a few for your own use, then do come and knock on our door.

Then when their first born animals come along or the first seed from crops, they pass it on to another family and help them learn how to tend them, and so the spiral grows, hopefully helping them out of poverty and building a better community. It is good, at a time when we see so many people suffering through our media, to be part of a good news story of people being helped.
