

SPOTTING THE GROT

A couple of months ago the *Bugle* leader article sought the co-operation of villagers in helping to tidy up our community. We are pleased to say that this brought some positive action from a number of villagers who have stepped forward to help tidy up areas near to their homes. Already we are seeing the benefits of their industry in small pockets around the village!

One area that has recently been high-lighted as a village 'grot-spot' is Dag Lane. It is evident from a quick walk down this cut-through from Berridges Lane to Mowsley Road, that it has become something of a dumping ground for a few of the properties that back onto it, with garden debris and redundant fencing littering the sides of the path in places. As one villager has pointed out, this is fly-tipping in a public place and as such it is likely to be a criminal offence. All of which detracts from what should and could be, an attractive pathway. It's not only those of us who live here that have noticed it. We have heard that boating forums on the internet have warned visiting boaters of the unkempt state of the entrance to our village that is presented to those who venture up from the canal in search of shops and the pub.

At present the weed cutting, clearing and general maintenance of Dag Lane, as a public highway, comes under the umbrella of the county Highways department. However, as we have noted recently, cutbacks in council funding have already seen poorer services, especially in rural areas and it is likely that further cuts will see even less work carried out. So, again we ask that villagers take an interest in the areas around their homes, even in what might be seen as the out of sight areas and help to keep our community tidy.

It is also used for family parties and several village events including Conkers and barbecues, and 'specials' like the Jubilee celebrations and bonfire parties. Harborough District Council regularly hold meetings here, as do Lafarge and FOBS and it was recently used for a presentation by a housing developer. Sadly cricketing activities have been suspended for the time being, but it is hoped that the Cricket Club will start again next season. The full cost of building and providing the pavilion was covered by generous donations by local people and grant funding and is self-funding in operation. It offers first class facilities and we would welcome any enquiries for future bookings.

HUSBANDS BOSWORTH C. of E. PRIMARY SCHOOL Head Teacher Louisa Morris

Husbands Bosworth C. of E. Primary School has been awarded the British Council's prestigious International School Award in recognition of their work to bring the world into the classroom. 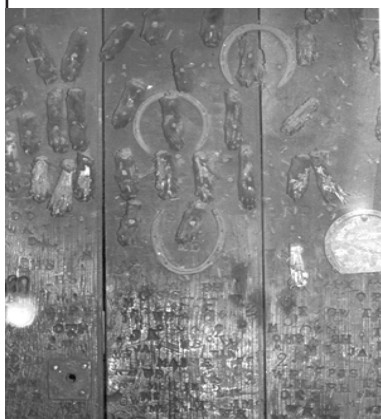

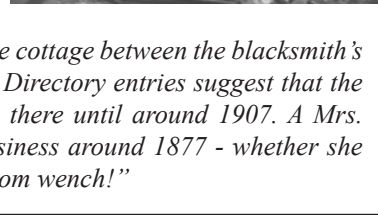
Aneurin Owen of Church Lane has a bit more information about the old blacksmith's shop on High Street, which we featured last month...

"The horses were always shod, even heavy shire horses, inside the workshop doorway as shown in the photo. Although not being very wide it prevented the horse turning around. Especially difficult horses were tethered to a very heavy ring fastened to the end wall. If there were a number of horses waiting to be shod they would be held in the stable next door in Woodford's Yard, which could hold another two or three horses comfortably. Sometimes shoeing was done in Woodford's stables if there was a number of horses waiting to be done.



Most of the gentry's horses such as those of Sulby Hall, Wheler Lodge and Highfields were usually shod at their own stables where an anvil was usually available on site. George Dicks had a 350cc BSA motor-bike, which he used to take him and his bag of tools to these premises to shoe horses, Before the motorbike he would probably have had a pony and trap, like most tradesmen of that period, to use for his visits.

The Woodfords were blacksmiths before Dicks and lived in the cottage between the blacksmith's shop and the Red Lion pub, (now Red Lion Cottage). Trade Directory entries suggest that the Woodfords were smiths there since at least 1827 and were there until around 1907. A Mrs. Woodford seems to have been the sole proprietor of the business around 1877 - whether she shod horses or not I have no idea, unless she was a big buxsum wench!"

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Report of the Parish Council Meeting held on Tuesday, September 2nd 2014.

Four Council members and 4 members of the public were present.

Visitors' Questions

A resident brought to the attention of Council the poor condition of Dag Lane and the footpath leading down to Mowsley bridle track. Queries were raised about the barbed wire fencing bordering the footpath. Clerk was asked to contact LCC to bring this matter to their attention. Concerns were raised about the lack of a 'dropped' kerb on lower Berridges Lane, outside Highcroft, which was causing difficulties for wheel-chair and mobility scooter users. Clerk would ask LCC Highways if they would be able to schedule this work.

Queries were raised concerning the possibility of extending the building line of the village to accommodate HDC's extra housing provision. Council noted that up to the present time the building line had been held, with the exception of the Knights Close development of social housing and it would be hoped that any further expansion would only be allowed if there were similar community benefits.

Two members of the CS17 Group, which is spear-heading a campaign against the proposed solar park at Theddingworth outlined their concerns and future plans for opposing the proposals. The matter was discussed at length and Council added their support to the CS17 Group.

Matters Arising

Concerns were raised that the newly installed dog waste bin on Leicester Road was not being emptied. Clerk would again contact HDC who are contracted to carry out the emptying of the bins, as it would appear that previous messages had not got through to the contractors.

A second skip had been required to finish clearing the redundant allotment plot. No response had been received from plot holders who had been asked to clear excessive weed growth from their plots. Clerk was asked to contact the plot holders again and point out that it was their responsibility to keep their plots in a clean and tidy condition.

No response had yet been received about an application for Landfill Tax funding to carry out work to the Chapel of Rest.

Cemetery

Council members were pleased that the grass cutting work in the cemetery was now back on track and the area generally was looking good.

Playing Field & Play Area

It was noted that the area behind the tennis courts was not being cut back. Clerk was asked to discuss the matter with the contractors as the work had been requested.

Council reiterated its support for any groups that sought to set up sporting activities on the Playing Field. Funding from the Council's contingency fund may be considered to help establish such groups.

Allotments

No outstanding issues were raised.

Rural Broadband

Clerk and Mr. Forman had met with a BT surveyor and had authorised the siting of a primary fibre-optic cabinet and a secondary cabinet on the village green. Although not ideal, due to the size of the cabinets, it was agreed that the chosen sites represented the best options.

Correspondence & Planning

There had been some confusion over the notification period for the handover of the telephone box for use as a defibrillator site. Clerk agreed to follow this up.

Any Other Business

The condition of roadside signs was discussed. Many of the signs were virtually unreadable due to dirt and algal growth. Clerk was asked to contact Highways to see if they had a programme of cleaning in place.

We live in a world where technology means that we can do things quicker now than could be done in the past, and so the expectations can be that we fit more into our lives.
