POLLING CARDS

s you read this issue of the Bugle we will be gearing up for the General Election on May 7th. It's disappointing that in Bosworth both the District Council and Parish Council representatives are being returned unopposed and we will only be voting for our Member of Parliament on Polling Day.

Councillor Lesley Bowles, the Conservative 'sitting tenant' in the post of District Councillor, is the sole candidate for councillor in Harborough's Bosworth ward. Democratically this should be of concern, that no other party felt the urge to test the political waters in Bosworth. At Parish Council level we are losing two of our current councillors, due to personal reasons, leaving only four to administer our local parish matters. Technically, the Parish Council can run with four councillors, but would obviously be better able to represent the people of Husbands Bosworth if they were up to the allotted six councillors.

In these circumstances the Council has the power to co-opt additional members, without the fuss and formality of an election.

So, if you would like to have a constructive say in how your community is run and, in particular, how it is to develop in the future, why not offer your services as a parish councillor?

Local government is devolving to the parishes and parish councils in particular are being offered a greater say and having a greater influence on their own community affairs than they have ever had.

Be a parish councillor - now is a good time...

In the last month Husbands Bosworth has only seen one crime relative to public interest. This was where a work van was broken into and tools were stolen. The advice is still the same for work vans as well as for domestic vehicles: park close to your home or building that you are working in and in a well-lit area if it is overnight. Lock and alarm your vehicle and try, if possible, to secure or hide any property left in there. As the warm weather approaches, we see an increase in 'Garden Crime', where items such as garden furniture, attractive stone ornaments and elaborately planted pots and hanging baskets are stolen. Police would advise that if you do have any of these items that are of high value, you consider placing them in your back garden so that it is you who gets the pleasure from them and not a potential thief. In past years, I have had occasion to investigate an incident where expensive fish had been stolen from a garden pond! Advice would be to secure any side gates that you may have already fitted to the rear of your property and if the rear of your property is open, to consider getting some form of security fitted.

The service, in partnership with Leicestershire County Council, will tour the county in a specially designed mobile unit, providing information, support and advice. Over 1.8 million people are living with significant sight loss in the UK, and evidence suggests that over 50 per cent of sight loss is due to preventable or treatable causes. Vista will raise awareness of the signs and symptoms of sight loss, the importance of early diagnosis and the links between lifestyle and sight loss.

Manned by friendly staff, the vehicle features an open plan welcome area, leaflet display and a seating area for individual consultation and support. Visitors can:

- ■Learn how a healthy lifestyle can reduce the risk of sight loss, the importance of regular sight tests and spotting conditions early
- Find out more about the support and services available through Vista
- ■Discover equipment and technologies that can support people with sight loss

The programme will also support older people already experiencing sight loss, enabling them to access dedicated information, advice and support in their local communities.

BYGONE BOSWORTH

Images from the Historical Society's Archive Collection

This month's pictures from the Historical Society's Archive Collection remind us that there were people living in the countryside that we know - in 'our' neck of the woods - even before the time of the Ancient Egyptians. The pictures are of archaeological 'finds' made by fieldwalking on ploughed land just south of the village, near Wheler Lodge.

You could probably guess that the top picture is of a flint arrowhead. This one is particularly finely worked, and would have represented a couple of hours labour by a skilled flint 'knapper'. It is so fine that it is unlikely to have been produced for use as a common hunting tool. It is more likely to have been made for ceremonial purposes or as a demonstration of the knapper's skill, and may have been attached to an arrow laid to rest with a tribal warrior.



The second picture shows a scraper tool also found near Wheler Lodge. Again it is made from



a rich flint core and has been finely worked around its edges and thinned across its body to produce a tool that would be used to de-bark wood, scrape flesh from skins or dress bone. This scraper is particularly unusual by its size. Usually scrapers were small and had to be held in the end of a stick by resin glue, to be used. This one has been made to fit the palm of the hand.

These tools, and many more that we have found locally, were made by our prehistoric ancestors during the Stone Age (6000BC - 2500BC). The latter part of the Stone Age is referred to as the Neolithic or New Stone Age. This is the period in history where the nomadic tribes shifted away from the hunter-gatherer culture and started to develop farming - planting crops and tending animals.

In 1996, as a pre-condition of an application to develop Husbands Bosworth Quarry to the west of Wheler Lodge, an archaeological survey was undertaken. The survey showed a high concentration of worked flint tools. Later geophysical surveys identified a Neolithic causewayed enclosure, which has been dated to approximately 3500BC.

The enclosure consists of a large oval, about 175 metres diameter, bounded by two parallel interrupted ditches, encompassing about 2 hectares. No signs of dwellings have been found inside the perimeter. Numerous interruptions in the earthworks would suggest that the enclosure was not built for defensive purposes or as a livestock holding. Excavations suggest that the site was active over a period of 2,000 years during which the ditches show signs of regular maintenance. The most likely explanation so far is that the site was a meeting place, a market place or a religious centre.

The site is designated as a site of national importance, a Scheduled Ancient Monument, under the protection of English Heritage.

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Report of the Parish Council Meeting and Annual Open Meeting held on Tuesday, April 3rd 2015. Four Council members and one member of the public were present.

Visitors' Questions

- ■Queries were raised about the resurfacing of the footpath from Dag Lane to the Mowsley bridle track. Clerk informed the meeting that it was understood that this work would be carried out shortly.
- ■Concerns were also voiced about the over-grown footways on Leicester Road, Welford Road and Kilworth Road, which in places had narrowed to less than two feet. It was noted that Theddingworth Road had been cut back recently. Clerk was asked to contact Highways.

Minutes of the previous meeting were circulated and agreed

Matters Arising from the Minutes

- ■No response had been received from Leicestershire County planning department regarding the soiling of Welford Road by quarry traffic. Council queried the lack of wheel -washing facilities, which it was understood was a condition of the landfill operations at the site.
- New signage for the Play Area would be needed now that an item of adult exercise equipment had been installed. Clerk agreed to seek advice on wording.
- ■No response had been received regarding the poor carriageway markings and obscured signs at the Welford Road/Kilworth Road junction. Clerk agreed to contact the local police to see if they could get the problem resolved.
- ■It was noted that although the defibrillator was installed and operational it hadn't been registered with the emergency services and therefore wouldn't be accessible to the public. Clerk was asked to chase up the registration process as a matter of urgency.
- ■Council noted that the low wall between the Springfield's store forecourt and Cherry Tree Close had been reinstated.

Cemetery

- ■Clerk informed Council that the refurbishment work on the Chapel of Rest had started. The work had been scaled down as grant funding wasn't forthcoming and only pointing, guttering replacement and the rebuilding of a 'blown' section of one gable was being undertaken.
- ■A complaint had been received relating to alleged damage to a gravestone. The Chairman had investigated the matter and found no damage for which Council or its contractors were liable. Clerk was instructed to write to the complainant pointing out that the general maintenance of memorials was the responsibility of the family.

From the Rectory

As I flick through the pages of the Christian Aid Magazine that has just landed on my desk I am overwhelmed by the number of places in the world where aid is needed, and by the many different ways in which the Christian Aid organisation is trying to help. They still support those recovering from the ebola crisis in Sierra Leone and surrounding countries, they still send aid to the displaced people in Iraq and support traumatised young people of Syria. They are still campaigning for tax justice and climate change and that's just their campaign and crisis work.

There is also a whole mass of work in supporting individuals and communities to lift themselves out of poverty and make better lives in places like Africa and South America. Their featured story of this year's Christian Aid Week is Loko, from Ethiopia, who rises before dawn, leaves her 6 children and walks barefoot all day to collect firewood, praying as she goes she will find some. She sells the wood to buy food, clothes, schooling and medicines for her children. All she can earn is about £4 a week, which provides one small meal a day. Christian Aid would like to help her, and those like her, to grow her own food and raise her own livestock, to bring them a better income and better prospects. By comparison we all have so much.

An envelope will be posted through your door for your Christian Aid Week donations. Envelopes will be collected on Monday, 11th May, between 6.00pm - 8.00pm. Please be as generous as possible. If you would like to come and help with the collection of the envelopes, do join the team at church at 6.00pm. This is an opportunity to give life and hope to people in deepest poverty.
