arborough planners finally approved the layout of the new housing development to the east of Welford Road, at a planning committee meeting in December.

Concerns had been raised locally that the surgery element of the application, which would satisfy much of the developer's Section 106 community contribution, was causing problems when the application appeared to be faltering. However, assurances given to

the Parish Council, by the developers, that the surgery and homes development was still on track, have been borne out and the whole of the proposed work now has the green light. Permission has been granted for the erection of 41 homes and a doctors surgery, with associated services, service roads and parking.

From Chris Price, Mowsley Road

Severn Trent had assured me [following problems last year] that our water supply is going to be connected to a reservoir, rather than relying on the pumps that have failed so often in recent months. I had a phone call before Christmas from the manager of the whole supply network for Leicestershire and Rutland. He told me that the work was delayed and would not be completed before the end of 2016.

He explained that there is a local supply tank in the village but following problems about 18 months ago this was taken out of the circuit. To bring it back into use, which would give us a surer supply, they have to prove the good quality of the water in it and that, despite several attempts, this has been impossible to achieve. The new solution, which does not involve the tank, needs them to drain and flush out two miles of supply pipe, for which they need extra budget. Once done, we will be connected to a pressurised main from Market Harborough (the one that burst between Theddingworth and Lubenham a couple of months ago). This will not provide the full pressure we need, but it will ensure that we get some supply in the event of the local pumps cutting out again.

In the meantime, we're at the top of the priority list for rapid attention if our pumped supply fails again.

Those who have suffered poor water supply and had no compensation may like to know that those who complained and did get a reduction in their water service bill, which now includes me, had it under Severn Trent's 'Guaranteed Service Standards scheme' so a call to them quoting that might do the trick! Pet owners please be aware of the possible consequences of using windscreen de-icing products. Our cat unfortunately passed away recently with toxic poisoning caused by licking de-icer fluid. Cats, in particular, find the fluid very palatable and just a small amount can be lethal. Death can occur within 6 hours, when the animal's organs shut down due to toxic overload. Symptoms to look out for include a staggering gait, thirst, and head shaking. Please bin the de-icer and use a scraper instead!

BOSWORTH IN FOCUS

A TASTE OF BOSWORTH Goulash

A tasty easy to make casserole, perfect for the cold winter evenings. Serve with buttered noodles or dumplings

Serves 4

700g Stewing or braising Steak 40g butter

350g onions, thinly sliced

225g carrots, peeled and thinly sliced

2 tablespoons paprika

1 tablespoon plain flour

450ml chicken stock

2 tablespoons dry white wine

Salt and freshly ground pepper

Small carton soured cream (142 ml)

Method

Pre-heat oven to 150C, Gas Mark 2. Cut the meat into 4cm (1.5 inch) pieces. Melt the butter in a frying pan and fry the meat until browned. Drain and place in shallow ovenproof dish. Fry the onions and carrots in the remaining butter in the pan until lightly browned. Add the paprika and flour and fry for 2 minutes. Gradually stir in the stock, wine and seasoning. Bring to the boil and pour over the meat. Cover tightly and cook in the oven for 23/4 hours until tender. Serve with the soured cream as an accompaniment. Jackie Kerr

WILD ABOUT BOSWORTH Male Fern - Dryopteris filix-mas

Ferns first appeared around 350 million years ago, but most modern species surfaced 200 million years later, at the start of the Cretaceous period, when dinosaurs roamed the earth.

Perhaps it's this longevity that's caused the subject of ferns to develop such a plethora of polysyllabic words. For instance, this picture, taken near our canal, shows a Male Fern which is a member of the leptosporangiate group - but ferns are neither male nor female! They have an interesting reproductive



cycle. Starting what we would recognise as a fern, in its sporophyte phase, sori (spore capsules), appear on the underside of some fronds. The cells within a spore have a shuffled version of their parent plant's DNA, but with half the chromosomes. When conditions are right, the spores are cast to the wind, and if a spore lands in a suitable location, it will take root and grow into a tiny heart shaped leaf (a bisexual gametophyte). Male cells form at the pointed end and female cells at the blunt end.

When the *gametophyte* becomes flooded, during a downpour, male gametes are released to swim freely in the water. At the same time, female gametes in the area release an attractant. When the male and female gametes meet, nature takes its course, and a new fern is born. This may appear a little random, but it has generated around 12,000 varieties worldwide, which have flourished for eons.

Two final points of interest. Some fern roots contain chemicals which are an effective treatment for tapeworms. There is a condition called pteridophobia which is the morbid fear of ferns. A noted sufferer of this condition was none other than Sigmund Freud.

BYGONE BOSWORTH

Images from the Historical Society's Archive Collection

Many of us will have passed by this gravestone, perched innocently in the raised churchyard of the parish church off Church Street, without giving it much thought. However, a closer look reveals a 172 year old enigma...

The stone marks the last resting place of Mary Freeman, who departed this world on February 5th 1845, and like many other gravestones the inscription notes the parentage of the deceased.

Every picture tells a story as they say, but this one also poses a question... A closer look at the inscription reveals that whilst the mother's name remains, the name of the father has been crudely chiselled out of the slate! This looks to me like a paternity dispute and one late to come to light at that, seeing as the unfortunate Mary had been 32 years old, and was now buried and duly commemorated before the aggrieved party responded to this slight on his character! One can almost imagine the offensive lettering being roughly chiselled out by candlelight...

Mike will be giving an illustrated talk on the work that the group have been carrying out over the past three summers, on a previously unknown Iron Age and Romano-British settlement site, close to the Roman Watling Street at Shawell.

The site was identified by aerial survey, and subsequent resistivity and magnetometry surveys, carried out by the team that found the famous Hallaton Hoard, revealed evidence of settlements of Roman and Iron Age origin.

Extensive excavation in the overlying pastureland has uncovered sites of homesteads, enclosures and a wealth of animal and human remains.

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Report of the Parish Council Meeting held on Tuesday, December 6th 2016. Four Parish Councillors and one member of the public were present. Apologies were received from Mrs Hobson and County Councillor Graham Hart.

Minutes of last meeting were read and approved Matters Arising

- ■Clerk informed Council that the condition of the Honeypot Farm canal bridge had been brought to the attention of the Canal and River Trust who had carried out an inspection and had agreed to monitor the situation.
- ■It had been noted that the light in the old telephone box had not been working. Clerk explained that although electricity to the box had been lost it didn't affect the operation of the defibrillator, which works on a battery. Work to restore the electricity supply was in hand.
- ■Work was now completed on the repairs to the Chapel of Rest.

Cemetery

■Council agreed to arrange for the yew trees overgrowing the footpaths to be trimmed back. This would be carried out in February, before the nesting season.

Playing Field & Play Area

■ A barrier had been made for the Play Area car park and would be fitted as soon as possible. Problems had arisen recently, when parked vehicles had obstructed access for maintenance. Car owners who park their vehicles overnight in the car park would be reminded that Council reserves the right to close the barrier when necessary.

Allotments

■Clerk informed Council that one plot was still vacant, with immediate availability.

Traffic Issues

■It was brought to Council's attention that vehicles parked adjacent to the entrance to Cherry Tree Close were making it dangerous to exit and enter the road. A lack of road-markings indicating the entry point was noted and the issue would be passed to Highways.

Accounts

- ■Monthly accounts were presented and approved.
- ■Council adopted the 2017-18 precept of £38,250, agreed at the Precept Meeting on November 15th.

Planning Issues

■Following a request for an update on the progress of the new doctors' surgery building within the Welford Road development, the developers, Davidsons, had confirmed that this was still going ahead.

Any Other Business

- ■Clerk agreed to arrange for a condition and safety survey of trees around the playing field to be undertaken.
- ■Concerns had been raised about the safety of pedestrian and vehicular access at the Springfields Store. Mr. Holyland would be asked to ensure that recycling and waste bins obstructing the exit would be moved away from the access.
- ■Mr. Forman agreed to reinstate the dog poop bin on Leicester Road.
- ■The fallen road sign on Leicester Road would be brought to the attention of Highways. The next meeting will be on Tuesday, February 7th, 2017, at 7.30pm in the Committee Room of the Village Hall. The meeting will be preceded by a Section 106 Funding Meeting at 7.00pm.



FROM THE RECTORY

What is faith? The bible says it is being sure of the things we hope for and knowing that something is real even if we do not see it. I suppose in this day and age when we can prove the existence of things we cannot see with the eye by other scientific means, we would need to change it to - knowing that something is real even if we cannot prove it. Much stress is placed on being able to prove things and as science progresses we are able to know more and more.

Scientists do operate in the arena of faith – believing in a theory up until it can be proved, and then it becomes knowledge. For some scientists, the more they discover about the world we live in and how it has been made the more they think there must be a creative mind behind it rather than just randomly occurring - for others, science rules out the case for the existence of God.

I came across a slogan some time back which says that 'Faith is not hope without proof, but trust without reservations.' This seems to shift the emphasis from scientific knowledge to experience - which is a different kind of knowing. 'Trust without reservations' makes me think of those team building activities when you are invited to allow yourself to fall backwards to be caught by the other person - to place your faith and trust in their ability and desire to do so. The better you know the person, the more likely you are to know whether that faith is well-placed or not, but it would be impossible to prove scientifically. This is the sort of faith relationship God invites us into where we trust him, knowing he has our best interests at heart and that he loves us. The bible also says 'underneath are the everlasting arms' ready to catch us if we will trust ourselves to him - our place of safety. Praying you will know him well enough to trust him without reservations in 2017. *Liz*
