

BIGGING-UP BOSWORTH

You may have heard of the Neighbourhood Plan. Backed by the Parish Council, it is the blueprint for the future development of our community.

The Neighbourhood Plan Advisory Committee; the group tasked with drawing up this vision of Husbands Bosworth and shepherding it into legislation, have been rubbing their crystal ball and looking into the future to see how our community is likely to look in 20 or so years time.

That Bosworth will grow is inevitable; location, we are told is everything and with Bosworth being so well located and served it's obvious that developers are going to focus their attentions here. Where that growth is likely to manifest itself is reasonably predictable; the village could expand on all fronts - graphically illustrated, as we note here, when plotted onto a map.

That these sites have been identified in a desk-top survey certainly doesn't mean that they will satisfy normal planning rules, or indeed any other constraints that would see them progress, but there's no doubt that developers will be fishing for sites and spotting the same possibilities...

The Neighbourhood Plan gives us a chance to head off speculation and to say what we value. It lays down our aspirations and how we want our community to look. In the Vision Statement the Plan declares our intent to encourage development that protects the character, heritage, environmental and visual amenity. A Plan that encourages a natural mix of housing development, employment opportunities and social and leisure facilities that will ensure the future sustainability and viability of our community.

If you are concerned about how Bosworth is to develop and would like to get involved in shaping the future of our community, come along to the next Plan meeting on Monday, October 23rd at 7.30pm in the Committee Room of the Village Hall.

SLOWING DOWN BOSWORTH


The School's new 20mph speed limit signs have recently been erected. The signs on Welford Road, High Street and Kilworth Road are remotely controlled by County Hall and are programmed to activate during school opening and leaving times, during term-time only.



POUND-STRETCHER

The 'old' pound coin, which has been around since the dawn of time (well, 1983!), is being withdrawn from circulation and replaced by the less-easily counterfeited 12-sided bi-metal one.

The Treasury reckons that there are over four billion of the old one pound coins lurking in jam-jars or squirrelled away somewhere out of circulation. So, if you have any sitting at home or in your wallet, you need to spend them or return them to your bank before <u>October</u> <u>15th</u>. From this date businesses will no longer be obliged to accept them. However, High Street banks and the Post Office may still exchange them, but only for a limited period.

A TASTE OF BOSWORTH 'The Spoons' Granola

An adaptation of a delicious granola given to me by a wonderful B&B on the Isle of Skye. Will keep for a couple of weeks in an airtight jar.

Ingredients

75g butter 75ml honey 250g oats 250g mix of your favourite nuts & seeds [I use a combination of pecans, pistachios, cashews, sunflower and pumpkin seeds.] 100g dried cranberries

Method

Preheat oven to 140°C. Melt butter and honey in a saucepan. Mix all other ingredients in a bowl except for the dried cranberries. Pour on the butter and honey mixture and combine well. Spread out evenly on a large baking tray. Bake in the oven for 35-40 mins. - stirring occasionally to brown evenly. Remove from the oven and allow to cool.

When cool mix in the dried cranberries and serve with natural yogurt and fresh berries. Jackie Kerr

WILD ABOUT BOSWORTH

European Mole - Talpa Europaea Freshly excavated mounds of earth at the western edge of the Millennium Wood are evidence that a mole has taken up residence. These small creatures spend their lives underground, digging tunnels which act as traps for their favoured food - earthworms. Burrowing creatures are termed 'fossorial' and moles are superbly adapted to their lifestyle. Increased red corpuscles and

haemoglobin in their blood help them cope with the low oxygen levels in the tunnels, their fur can lie in any direction so it doesn't hamper movement and one of their wrist bones even grows into an extra thumb, turning their forelimbs into more effective shovels.

They have very poor eyesight but compensate with ultra-sensitive touch sensors in their nose, 'Eimer's Organ'. When they catch a worm that has fallen into their web of tunnels, they first immobilise it by biting off its head. Then, they either tuck into the worm or store it in a larder where it stays fresh for months. To avoid eating mud and grit, they draw the worms between their claws to squeeze out their stomach contents.

They pursue a reclusive existence and violently defend their territories. Except during the breeding season, the females actually produce testosterone to intensify their belligerent nature. In the spring, males dig long straight tunnels across the landscape in search of partners and, after meeting, they spend an hour or so in nuptial harmony before resuming their solitary lives. The strategy plainly works, as there are over 30 million moles in the UK. Those of us of a 'certain age' will recall Jasper Carrot's diatribe regarding a mole in his garden. In his rant, he threatened to bury the mole alive if he ever managed to catch it! Mike Chanter

This picture, courtesy of villager, Nick Bradshaw's drone footage, gives us a unique glimpse back in time ...

It shows the line of the old road. with the kerb and even the white line, clearly exposed when Nick recently excavated Bosworth



Hall driveway, outside the Lodge gates.

The line of the original road proscribed a tortuous corner until the road was straightened in about 1960. The bend was notorious on what was, at that time, the A427 Trunk Road, the corner being so acute and narrow that there was a mirror on the Lodge wall to warn traffic of what was approaching from the opposite direction.

In straightening the road, an extensive range of outbuildings and stabling belonging to the old Queen Anne rectory, and the rectory itself were lost, along with a vast swathe of the graveyard.


HISTORICAL SOCIETY

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Report of the Parish Council Meeting held on Tuesday, September 6th 2017.

Three Parish Council members and Assistant Clerk, Claire Sheriff were present. (Apologies for absence were received from James Shelley and Sue Fisher) There were no Visitors' Questions

Minutes of the last meeting were circulated and approved

MATTERS ARISING

■No further bids for S106 funding had been forwarded.

■Work to repair and replace equipment in the Skatepark had been carried out.

A tentative enquiry concerning the use of the Sports Pavilion by a Leicester-based cricket team had been received previously. The Chairman would seek further information.

Two allotment plots had been relinquished and would now be strimmed and cleared. NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

■Mr. Forman gave a brief report on the progress of the NP. He stated that an Awards for All grant application had been turned down but following discussion with the Lottery funding office it was agreed to re-submit the application, as changes to criteria brought our project more in line with the requirements of the grant. Mr. Forman reported a poor response to invitations from the community to help with the NP process and steps were planned to engage villagers more by promoting the project more intensely. The themes, or chief sections of the Plan had been agreed by the Advisory Committee and it was hoped the community would get more involved, informally, as the project progressed. CEMETERY

(Members had met in the cemetery prior to the meeting)

It was agreed to arrange for the north doors of the Chapel of Rest to be painted and the door and framework to the verger's store at the rear removed, to open it out as a weather-refuge for visitors to the cemetery.

■It was noted that the pathways would need weed-spraying before the winter.

TRAFFIC ISSUES

Council noted the poor state of the footway of Welford Road between Station Road and Welford village. clerk was asked to report this to Highways as a safety issue.

Council noted that the school 20mph warning signs had been installed.

S106 FUNDING

Council noted very poor response from village groups and organisations regarding Section 106 developer funding but continues to seek suitable projects in order to build up a 'wish-list'.

CORRESPONDENCE

Members discussed correspondence from the Scouts regarding the wording of the ground-rent Lease Agreement for the Scout HQ. Council would need to refer back for legal clarification. PARISH COUNCIL WEBSITE

Members discussed at length, content, options and costs of setting up a website. Several options were discussed. Mrs. Hobson agreed to lead on the matter and seek further information.

STAFFING MATTERS

The Chairman formally welcomed Claire Sheriff to the permanent post of Assistant Parish Clerk, subject to a probationary period.

Council noted that Mrs. Bozena Kuncewicz, as Clerk to the Neighbourhood Plan Advisory Committee, was contracted only for the duration of the formation of the Neighbourhood Plan, which was expected to be 18 months to two years.

ANY OTHER BUSINESS

Council agreed to re-grade the Play Area car park to fill in the pot-holes, as a 'stop-gap' measure. A more permanent solution would be considered once the doctors' surgery had moved to the new premises and traffic into the car park lessened.

NEXT MEETING

The next meeting of the Parish Council will be on Tuesday, October 3rd at 7.30pm in the Committee Room of the Village Hall.

FROM THE RECTORY

How do you feel about promises? I guess most of us have made promises at some time, and maybe we have had promises made to us. I was told as I was growing up not to make a promise I couldn't keep – promises need to have integrity, at least the intention that we will make them good if we can. Though I guess we are all guilty of sometimes breaking a promise, maybe by no fault of our own, when circumstances change or are taken out of our hands. Maybe we have been let down when a promise made to us was broken.

Sometimes a promise comes with conditions - if you will do this, then I will do that - these might be covenants, when a promise is made on each side.
