# WHO IS RESPONSIBLE?

C ocial responsibility is a hot subject across the country these days, a **D**blight on modern living. From littering, fly-tipping to graffiti and vandalism, a lot of folk seem to live only for themselves, with little regard for the damage or feelings their actions have on their fellow men.

Thankfully we are relatively free of this type of irresponsible behaviour in Bosworth. Recently, however we seem to have become the focus of one of the less savoury elements of social irresponsibility - dog fouling. Not just the odd poop, but regular and focussed pooping, in certain areas of the village.



These pictures are of recent 'deposits', and are one villager's spontaneous response, highlight the problem on High Street. The Clean Neighbourhoods & Environment Act 2005 sets out the law with regard to dog

fouling and provides a remedy - a spot-fine of £80, or if convicted, up to £2,500 - an expensive poop by any standard!

Another aspect of social irresponsibility that crops up in our village is nuisance

parking - parking on pavements, obstruction of footways and obstruction of the highway. Not only is this inconsiderate, it can also be dangerous, forcing pedestrians, children and mobility scooter users onto the road and, on narrow sections of road, compromising access for emergency vehicles. So, which are you? A considerate villager or one lacking a gene or two in the social responsibility department?

### **GLIDER CRASH**

he Air Accident Investigation Branch has recently released their report on the glider accident that occured in December 2016. The incident involved a glider piloted by an experienced flyer from the Gliding Centre at Husbands Bosworth, who died in the accident. The report concluded that a Cessna light aircraft collided wth the glider in the sky over Gumley. Due to the relative altitudes and direction of travel of each aircraft neither the glider pilot nor the Cessna pilot and his pupil pilot saw each other until it was too late to avoid a collision and it was suggested that the glider pilot may not have seen the Cessna at all before the impact. The Cessna pilot attempted to take evasive action but was so close to the glider that his wing tip caught the glider's wing causing it to lose control and plummet to the ground near the Lubenham to Laughton road, killing the pilot. The Cessna remained airborne and was able to land safely.

The investigation found that the glider and light aircraft had no means of communication between each other, there being no legal requirement to provide compatible radio systems on the types of aircraft involved. Having such a system may have enabled each to monitor the sky around them more easily. The coroner returned a verdict of accidental death on the pilot.

### LEAD THEFT UPDATE

couple of months ago we reminded ourselves of the theft of lead from the north aisle roof of All Saints church in the village back in November 2014. Recently we happened upon a Crown Court report in which one of those responsible for the crime, Mitica Calin, (45) from Gillingham in Kent, has been charged.

In court Calin claimed that he would never steal from a house of God, but faced with evidence from mobile-phone records, which put him in the area at the time of the crimes, he changed his plea to guilty. He admitted to being recruited to help others in the thefts from three local churches, All Saints, Wigston Magna; St Mary the Virgin, Welford and our church, the value of the lead stolen amounting to a total of over £66,000. At Leicester Crown Court Calin was sentenced to a 21 month jail term, suspended for 18 months, and ordered to carry out 120 hours community service.

The repair work to our church, in stainless steel to replace the lead, cost over  $\pounds 22,000$ , most of which was raised by donations from villagers - the insurance claim being capped at £5,000.

The church is now embarking on a project to replace the troublesome lead roofing on the south aisle roof.

There is no excuse for leaving dog mess on the footpaths, which is both unsightly and unhygienic. However what is even worse are dog owners that use a plastic poo bag and then leave it hanging on a fence or hedge. We even get dog owners dropping bagged waste in our recycling bin in School Lane.

I am not a fan of 'shopping' fellow villagers but feel so strongly about this thoughtless behaviour that I will do so and I'm prepared to collect photographic evidence to ensure those guilty get punished. I would encourage responsible villagers to do the same, either while in the street or from a window. Hopefully if we can 'name and shame' a guilty dog owner and if they receive a heavy fine, other guilty owners might mend their ways. *Editor's Note*

# **POLICE FILE**

We have had a report of a male acting suspicously and looking through windows. We responded but the person had moved on and we were unable to locate him. Call 101 if you have any concerns regarding any suspicious activity - a description of the person, any car registration and model that may be related to the incident would also be helpful.

We've also had a report of a vehicle being stolen whilst parked in the street. The vehicle was later found and recovered.

### NUISANCE PARKING

Recently police were called to a vehicle that had been parked dangerously for several days on Berridges Lane. The vehicle was parked in such a manner as to force pedestrians passing it by to go onto the road. It transpires that the vehicle was nothing to do with any Bosworth resident, as the owner lived outside the area and police arranged for it to be removed. Nuisance parking does occasionally crop up in the village and police are warning residents that it is an offence to wilfully obstruct the footway in such a way as to cause a danger to pedestrians.

# **BOSWORTH IN FOCUS**

### A TASTE OF BOSWORTH

A very tasty dish which can use any type of white fish. The hidden tomato sauce complements the wine and cheese sauce beautifully

### **Gratin of Pollock**

### Ingredents

450g Fresh Pollock 150g Shallots (Finely chopped) 110g tomatoes (peeled and chopped) 110g strong cheddar cheese (grated) 275ml milk 150ml dry white wine 25g plain flour 60g butter 1 tsp dried basil 1 clove garlic (crushed) Salt and freshly milled pepper Buttered gratin or baking dish

### Method

Place fish in saucepan with the milk, add some salt and pepper and poach gently for approximately 7 mins. Strain off the liquid into a jug. Remove the skin from the fish and divide into large flakes.

Next make the sauce by melting 40g butter in a saucepan. Add the flour, stir and cook for 3 mins. Begin to add the milk the fish was cooked in, a little at a time, stirring continually until it has all been incorporated and you have a smooth sauce. Add the wine and continue to whisk until smooth. Taste to check seasoning, lower the heat and stir in flaked fish and all the cheese except for 1 tablespoon and cook gently for 3 mins. Pre-heat the grill to its highest setting.

In a frying pan melt the remaining butter and add the chopped shallots and crushed garlic. Cook for 5 mins, then add the tomatoes and basil, season, then simmer for 5 mins. Spoon the tomato mixture into the base of a buttered gratin or baking dish, then pour the fish mixture on top and sprinkle with the remaining cheese. Place under the grill for about 5 mins until the surface is browned and bubbling.

Serve with new potatoes and green beans or peas. Jackie Kerr

### WILD ABOUT BOSWORTH

Brown Rat - Rattus Norvegicus An eighteenth century naturalist believed brown rats arrived in Britain from Norway. Hence their scientific name, Rattus Norvegicus. But, in truth, they originated in Asia and travelled via ships from the Middle East. So, you're not going to find one pining for the fjords. They are great survivors and, except for Antarctica, they've reached every corner of

the globe. For preference, they like to live near to humans, in subterranean places, such as sewers, cellars or under rubbish dumps. Their countryside cousins usually choose a location close to water to excavate tunnels, which link bedrooms, nesting burrows and food larders. Cleverly, they begin digging these warrens under a solid object, so it forms a lintel over the entrance. Prime real estate for rats includes a food source: farmyard stores, compost heaps, bird tables;

absolutely everything is on the menu. The UK rat population is estimated to be 10 million; three million urban and seven million rural. There's a myth that you're never more than 6ft away from a rat; the true figure is probably closer to 160ft.

They're sociable creatures that love playing, sleeping and even laughing together! Wild rats can live three years, but the majority die within a year. To counter this high attrition rate, they are prolific breeders. Under ideal conditions, in a year a pair of rats can be the progenitors of 15,000 descendants!

Perhaps due to their liking for sewers, and their reputation as disease carriers, they are not the public's favourite animal. Though their fleas no longer host the plague bacterium, rats can transmit Foot and Mouth, Weil's disease and Ringworm.

A final positive; it's worth remembering they're a significant food source for foxes, weasels, stoats and especially owls. Lastly, the collective noun for a group of rats, is a 'mischief'! Mike Chanter

### **BYGONE BOSWORTH** Images from the Historical Society's Archive Collection



We've already ranted about anti-social behaviour elsewhere in this issue, and touched on vandalism and graffiti. But vandalism and graffiti occasionally become historical features where they become so established that they become part of the fabric of the community or more likely, where they become art. It's become such an accepted part of the village scene that the graffiti at the top of Dag Lane goes almost unnoticed these days. The perpetrators of this act of social vandalism, who liberally splashed their allegiance to Leicester City Football Club on Hunters Lodge wall, probably didn't expect their work to endure. But it remains, as lively a scrawl today as it was decades ago when it was daubed

on, and although we can't condone the action, it has become a heritage feature of the village. Certainly a few years ago an august canal travel guide noted it and queried, in rather acid tones, the wisdom of boaters stopping for long in Husbands Bosworth. This month's picture features another little piece of local vandalism, where a lowly culvert marker post, a mundane article of the canal infrastructure, has been wantonly attacked. Whoever whittled this little gem, of Christ or a sun god, into the post probably didn't give it a second thought. However, by the subject and quality of the work it easily jumps the gap into art, and therefore becomes socially acceptable and, I think, another worthy heritage feature of Husbands Bosworth parish.

### HISTORICAL SOCIETY

Our old friends, Harborough Movie Makers, opened our 2018 meetings with two of their recent films. 'The Story of the Old Grand Union' was commissioned by Foxton Inclined Plane Trust and detailed the building and operation of the canal line from Leicester to Northampton in the early 1800s. Originally planned as a direct link via Market Harborough along the Soar, the Sence and Brampton valleys, the promoters ran out of money at Debdale and eventually opted for a cheaper route along the line we know today, with Harborough demoted to an offshoot.

The Movies Makers' second film, 'The Restoration of the River Welland' documented restoration work on the river through Market Harborough that took place in 2015. Years of 'improvement' to the flow, to help alleviate flooding, had sanitised the river and destroyed much of its ecological character. The restoration project aimed to disrupt and divert the flow into a more natural course and restore the river's attraction to aquatic life.

Our next meeting will be on Wednesday, February 7th, when we will be hearing the story of Trinity House, the authority that administers lighthouses around our coasts. The meeting is at 7.30pm at the Sports Pavilion, Kilworth Road.

### FROM THE RECTORY

It is a coincidence that this year Ash Wednesday, which marks the beginning of Lent, falls on St Valentine's Day, February 14<sup>th</sup>. Research into St. Valentine makes it quite unclear as to who he actually was. There were actually two Valentines; one a martyr and the other a bishop, and neither of them had anything to do with love or romance or courting couples! So quite how St. Valentine's Day became associated with love is strange. It is thought it might be because the birds are supposed to pair up for the summer on February 14<sup>th</sup> or maybe it is to do with the ancient Roman Festival of Lupercalia, which took place at about that time. No-one is quite sure how it came about, but it has a long tradition of being associated with romance, going back several hundred years.

Ash Wednesday marks the start of the season of Lent, during which time Christians are encouraged to prepare themselves for the celebration of Easter, the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Some will choose to take up some act of self-discipline or self-denial like giving up some kind of food or pleasure. Others may seek to take on some additional activity, such as helping others, reading the bible more regularly or spending more time in prayer. The hope is that we become more like Christ during this time. Some may fast, if their health allows it, and traditionally, to help with the fasting process, pancakes are eaten before Lent starts so there is less tasty food in the house to tempt you.

### THE BATTLE'S OVER

'The Battle's Over...' is the nation's commemoration of the centenary of the ending of The Great War. A series of events is planned for Armistice Day, Sunday, November 11<sup>th</sup> 2018.
