SPEED DATING.

eaders will know that the Parish Council have been monitoring speeds on the approaches to the village since 2011 and have amassed a vast amount of data relating to average speeds at these sites.

Recently it was noted that the temporary speed restriction imposed on Welford Road by Davidsons, the developers of the housing site, seemed to be having a marked effect on the speeds recorded.

From a thumb-nail survey of data gathered by the Speed Indicator over the past six years on the Welford Road it is clear that the average speed of vehicles approaching the village from the south which, before the restrictions were put in place in August 2017, were previously 'clocked' at 33.5mph, are now averaging 30mph. Even more impressive are the results for out-bound traffic, which has seen a reduction from almost 35mph to 30mph - a remarkable reduction. From this evidence it is clear that the extended speed limit has had a positive effect on the speed of traffic.

Residents living on Welford Road welcomed the introduction of the

temporary speed restrictions when they appeared. They are now urging the Parish Council to press a case with the local authority for making the restrictions permanent, or at least introducing traffic-calming measures as part of the present development, and also to take into account the likely effect of the proposed development of 32 homes for the other side of Welford Road.

From the Highway Code: Stopping distance at 30mph is 23 metres (75ft.) Stopping distance at 35 mph is 29 metres (95ft.) A pedestrian hit at 30mph has a one in five chance of being killed. This rises significantly to a one in three chance if they are hit at 35mph. (Source: www.gov.uk)

At one point an order that might have made progress, fell by the wayside because it had the wrong postcode on it; the postcode for the surgery being different to the adjacent road. You couldn't make it up! The up-shot is that the facility sits unused whilst someone organises the connection of a secure telecommunications link from the old surgery site to the new one.

When will the new surgery open? Mid-May, perhaps... if BT and Open Reach can finally start talking to each other.

POLICE FILE

We have seen a spike in reports regarding fraudsters purporting to be from the Telephone Preference Service, cold calling you and offering a paid-for call blocking service.

Please be aware, the Telephone Preference Service (TPS) is FREE. You should never be asked to pay for it, and the TPS will never make unsolicited phone calls in order to sign you up. Once your phone number is on the register, it stays there forever. You do not need to re-register and you certainly do not need to pay for renewal.

The TPS is the only official UK 'do not call' register for opting out of live telesales calls. There are other companies that offer a commercial alternative to the TPS and may charge for their service. However organisations making live telesales calls are not legally obliged to check against any of these alternative registers. You can sign up to the TPS on-line or you can phone them on 0345 070 0707.

BOSWORTH IN FOCUS

A TASTE OF BOSWORTH

A firm family favourite, very easy to make and will freeze well. Ideally served with fresh French bread or Melba toast

Smoked Mackerel Paté Ingredients

350g smoked mackerel
100g cottage cheese, sieved
200g butter (split into 2 x 100g both melted)
2 tablespoons creamed horseradish
Juice of ½ lemon
3 tablespoons single cream
Salt and freshly ground black pepper
Garnish with slices of lemon and sprig
parsley

Method

Remove the skin from the mackerel and mash the flesh. Add the cottage cheese, 100g melted butter and the remaining ingredients. Blend well. Spoon paté into a serving dish and smooth the top. Use the remaining 100g of butter and pour over the paté. Arrange the lemon slice garnish on top and place in the fridge for the butter to set. Top with sprig parsley before serving.

To freeze

Cover seal and freeze. Thaw at room temperature for 4 - 6 hours

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN UPDATE

WILD ABOUT BOSWORTH

May Bug - Melolontha melolontha
May Bugs are much less common than
they used to be. In the Middle Ages,
they could appear in swarms of biblical
proportions, but modern pesticides
have decimated their numbers. They
are making something of a comeback
and are sporadically seen in the village.
As their name suggests, they surface in
May and begin their hunt for mates and
food, oak leaves being a favourite. In



truth, their buzzing flights are best described as crashing with style!

They are about 25mm to 30mm in size and live for about six weeks in their adult form, during which the females lay eggs in the soil. About three weeks later, the eggs hatch into larvae. These lie dormant during the colder months but spend spring and summer munching on plant roots, including valuable food crops. During their third winter the larvae pupate and wait for spring, when they leave their subterranean existence for their moment in the sun. The adults sport a pair of feathery antenna, which the males use to home in on the sexual pheromones broadcast by the females. They also have excellent eyesight, with compound eyes comprising 5,475 facets each (who counts these?). It's true May Bugs can look a little scary, but they are totally harmless. The pointed *pygidium* on the females is for egg laying, not stinging. Indeed, the literature says May Bugs are edible, but remove the wings and legs first!

In the fourteenth century, the larvae caused so much devastation around Avignon in southern France that the town put them on trial. When the bugs failed to comply with an order to move to a designated area, they were sentenced to death!

They are also known as Cockchafers, (no snickering please). Cock meaning male, dynamic or vigorous, and chafer from the Anglo-Saxon for a beetle.

BYGONE BOSWORTH

Images from the Historical Society's Archive Collection

We recently ran an article featuring some interesting items that family history researcher, Sue Church, had unearthed whilst transcribing Husbands Bosworth Burial Register. Often, with family history research, a snippet of information can send you off on a wider journey of discovery. One such journey started with



the burial of William Thomas Wells in 1949, and a scribbled note next to the entry in the Register, which Sue followed up in the local newspaper archives.

William was a retired gardener, of Mowsley Road, who tragically died when he was struck by a train on the Mowsley bridle road level-crossing. The Coroner's Court inquest heard that Mr. Wells was first spotted as he approached the closed crossing gates when the engine was 50 yards from the crossing. A witness on the engine footplate testified that he saw the person open the hand-gate and start to cross the track. The engine, which was travelling at 40 miles per hour at the time, struck the man and spun him around. The inquest heard that the crossing gates were kept shut, except when anyone needed to cross, and the hand gate was not locked. The engine driver testified that he had been a driver for 12 years and frequently travelled on this line and had blown the whistle as he approached the crossing, as he always did.

Mrs. Wells, the widow, said that her husband left the house after lunch to go for a walk. Although in good health, his hearing had deteriorated and she frequently had to shout to make him hear. The village policeman, PC. Herbert, noted that the deceased was lying between the lines with sticks scattered around, as if he had been carrying firewood when struck by the engine. Dr. Jones of Husbands Bosworth attended and concluded that the deceased had died of injuries consistent with being struck by the engine.



PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Report of the Annual Parish Open Meeting held on Tuesday, April 3rd 2018.

Four Councillors and 2 members of the public were present.

Apology received from Bozena Kuncewicz, Clerk to the Neighbourhood Plan Committee.

Visitors' Questions

- ■Concerns were raised about the emptying of dog bins, some of which seem to fill faster than others and thus tend to overflow. Clerk was asked to see if the contractors were still working to a schedule.
- ■The state of lower Broad Lane and the canal access was discussed. Farm and sewage plant traffic was the main cause of contamination, but this would be less of a problem and could be dealt with if the surface was tarmac sealed. Clerk was asked to contact Highways again on this matter..

The Ordinary Parish Council meeting followed the Parish Open meeting.

Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved, with two amendments.

Matters Arising

■No further contact had been received from Canal and River Trust regarding adoption of 'our' stretch of the canal. It was understood that CRT were looking at what work was needed and costing the job.

Neighbourhood Plan

■The Clerk to the NP Advisory Committee had prepared a report outlining progress, which was read out. Initial impressions were that the Questionnaire had been well received and a high number of responses had been returned.

Cemetery

■The Verger's refuge behind the Chapel of Rest had been cleared out and a pallet of about 200 Victorian bricks had been rescued. (Anyone interested in taking these is asked to contact the Clerk)

Playing Field & Pavilion

- ■Council noted that the broken window had still not been repaired. Chairman to follow this up again.
- ■The provision of an outside light to illuminate the sign and approach from the roadside was discussed. Clerk agreed to contact an electrician.

Allotments

■It was noted that Renewals had gone out and three plots were vacant. (Anyone interested in taking on an allotment should contact the Clerk)

Traffic Issues

- ■Chairman agreed to set up a meeting with Highways, County Councillor Blake Pain, Davidsons and the Parish Council to discuss the temporary speed restrictions and accesses onto Welford Road. S106 Developer Funding
- ■Chairman had had a meeting with the HDC Community Liaison Officer regarding criteria for S106 funding for village projects and organisations. Projects must be of community benefit. Provision of new facilities or upgrades of existing facilities, which would make them more accessible, would be considered, but funding for maintenance or repairs wouldn't.

Planning Matters

■Notice had been received that the 5 home Butt Lane development would go to Planning Committee. Correspondence

■ The Beaver group were seeking permission to carry out some planting on The Green. Council suggested that they plant bulbs, as these would require little maintenance after planting.

Staffing Matters

■ Four applications had been received in response to the vacancy for the post of Parish Clerk. Council discussed short-listing and interview procedure.

Parish Office

■Members discussed equipping and furnishing the Parish Office. Some work had been carried out on fittings and some refurbishment.



FROM THE RECTORY

The message of Easter is that Jesus died for us, in our place, it is us who benefit from his death. We are the ones who get things wrong and deserve the consequences, but Jesus, on the cross, takes the consequences that should be ours. We might wonder why Jesus would do that. I recently came across an extract from a post written in 2014.

'The love of God needs no because. He does not give his love because of something that you've done. He does not give his love because of something he will gain. He does not give his love because it's something you have earned. He gives his love with no because. We come at love with conditions; you can take it or leave it. God comes at love with no conditions: I'll take you and I won't leave you. We might, in rare instances, show love by dying for someone we deem worthy. God, in all instances, showed love by dying for us. While we were still rebelling against God's love, Jesus said, 'I lay down my life... No one takes it from me, but I lay it down of my own accord.'

God is love - that's his nature; Jesus demonstrated that love by laying down his life to take the blame for what we do. Love needs no because. Love is there for you too - just receive it.
