

HOW DID WE DO?

Many of the results of the village Questionnaire were as we would expect: nearly everyone appreciated the rural nature of our parish, favoured the preservation of local character and style and supported the village facilities.

However, some surprises did pop up. Those who suffer poor mobile phone, and communication provision in general, will understand why over a quarter of those who responded were unhappy with the service they receive, with 52 feeling sufficiently aggrieved to note their discontent with additional comments.

Perhaps not a surprise, but of particular interest, is the higher than average number of retirees living amongst us. Clearly facilities that favour older people, such as the shop, doctors' surgery, pharmacy and access to suitable housing has encouraged older people to stay, (more than a third of respondents have lived here for more than 30 years) or encouraged them to move specifically to the parish.

Responses relating to housing and development show a desire for a significant increase in the provision of smaller dwellings, and starter homes, homes for smaller families or for 'down-sizers', rather than the provision of larger dwellings. Also, strongly felt, was that open vistas should be maintained and that local character and styling cues should be carried forward into any new developments. Predictably, of the potential development sites around the periphery of the village, the overlooked greenfield site between the canal and the village boundary found less favour, whereas the less obtrusive sites south of the village would be preferred, though grudgingly. Commercial development and future employment opportunities within the parish were generally favoured, with Kilworth Wharf and the Airfield showing most acceptance. Just over half the respondents travel to work by car, which is reflected in the positive response to access to the major road system. However, the problems caused by traffic, especially HGV traffic passing through, were of great concern to 8 out of 10 of respondents. Sadly lacking was the bus service, which was noted by many, with a very small number using the bus, probably due to the poorly timed schedules. Of particular note was the number of people who wish to see the canal towpath improved - a large number evidently considering the towpath important and bemoan its poor condition and access between the canal and the village.

The strong response to the questionnaire demonstrates a set of clear concerns and preferences, which will be a good source of information for the development of the Neighbourhood Plan, the wider community and the Parish Council.

GLIDING CLUB

This month, the gliding club will be celebrating sixty five years since it was formed. Founded as Coventry Gliding Club at Baginton Aerodrome near Coventry in 1953 the club expanded rapidly as interest in the relatively inexpensive flying experience of gliding grew, and acquired a number of gliders for the use of members.

Commercial activity at Baginton also continued to develop, with a view to elevating the site to regional airport status and it became clear that gliding from



Baginton would soon become restricted. So, members started to look for a new site, which should preferably be reasonably local to Coventry.

At the time the Air Ministry was disposing of a number of former war-time airfields and in 1964 they gave notice for the sale of Husbands Bosworth. Finances were raised and members successfully secured part of the site for £5,400. They further negotiated a private deal with a neighbouring farmer to purchase additional areas to form what is now The Airfield.

Although the site is now known as The Gliding Centre and enjoys a national and international reputation for services to the gliding movement, the business and administration is still within the remit of Coventry Gliding Club Limited.

The Gliding Centre has over 250 members and now that the age limit for 'going solo' has been reduced to 14, the club has had a number of 14 and 15 year olds achieving the standards needed 'to reach for the sky'! A local Air Scout section is also based at the Centre. Associate membership is available, and a radio controlled model helicopter group fly most weekends throughout the year.

During the year the club hosts competitions at all levels and recently was the venue for the World Junior Championships, when British pilots took 1st, 2nd and 3rd places.

The club will be hosting the World Women's Competition in 2021, when we hope 50 plus competitors from around the world will be taking part.

If you call in at the club, you will see gliders take off and land and, as they have no engine, think that is all they can do. Not so... on a good summer's day a glider may take off and fly a task course of anything from 100km to 1000km, flying for up to 12 hours, electronically recorded using GPS.

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BOSWORTH IN FOCUS

A TASTE OF BOSWORTH

A cost effective meal for 4 people with the ribs coated in a deliciously sticky sauce. Serve with plain boiled rice and stir fried vegetables

Serves 4

BBQ Spare Ribs

1.8kg pork spare ribs (cut into individual pieces)

Salt and pepper

100g clear honey

4 tablespoons dark soft brown sugar

4 tablespoons tomato ketchup

2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce

2 tablespoons prepared English mustard

2 tablespoons red wine vinegar

Method

Place the ribs in a single layer in 2 roasting tins and sprinkle with salt and pepper. Roast at 190°C, Gas 5 for 30 minutes. Meanwhile put the remaining ingredients in a jug and stir well until mixed together. Pour the sauce into the tins and turn the ribs until well coated. Return to the oven and roast for a further 1-1¼ hours, until the meat is tender and the sauce syrupy. Turn the ribs in the sauce several times during cooking and swap over the shelf positions of the 2 roasting tins, if necessary, to ensure that the ribs cook through evenly. Serve hot with the sauce poured over the ribs.

WILD ABOUT BOSWORTH

Earthworms

We may consider earthworms insignificant but, as Charles Darwin said, "It may be doubted whether there are many other animals which have played so important a part in the history of the world as these lowly creatures." Without worms we would be wading knee-deep in rotting organic matter. And as they process this detritus they do a fantastic job of reinvigorating the soil.

The RHS, in conjunction with nature trusts, have declared 2018 to be the Year of the Worm. Their website gives some great information on identifying the 27 UK species and how to make your garden worm-friendly. In a nutshell, their advice is, be untidy; leave dead plants, rotting wood and leaves on the ground!

The saying, "look after the pennies and the pounds will look after themselves," has a particular relevance for nature conservation. Care for little creatures and you'll be caring for the bigger ones. In the case of worms this means; moles, foxes, hedgehogs, shrews, toads, frogs, robins, blackbirds and many other species, which all depend on the humble worm.

Worm sex is 'different'... They're hermaphrodites, having the attributes of both sexes, but seek partners to reproduce. During mating, packets of sperm are exchanged and stored. The thick ring on an earthworm's body is called a 'saddle' or more strictly a *clitellum*. Sometime after mating, the saddle becomes detached and the worm sloughs it off, like removing a ring from a finger. It's now that fertilisation takes place as sperm and eggs are injected into the clitellum, which becomes an incubator to embryonic wormlings.

Lastly, some trivia. If a worm is cut in half, one half might survive but not both. The longest known species lives in Australia and can reach 2m in length. Healthy farmland can support 1.75 million worms per acre. The word 'worm' comes from the Old English, 'wyrme', which meant a legless sea-serpent or dragon...

BYGONE BOSWORTH

Walkers along the boat horse path may have noticed this curious brick structure above the eastern portal of the tunnel. The design, position and character would suggest that it could be a simple drainage culvert relating to the nearby canal or the adjacent railway. However, on closer inspection it would appear to be wrongly placed, next to the path and above the railway, to catch any water. So, what was its function?



Well, looking at the bricks from which it is constructed, and its placement within the canal company's property, it is likely to suppose that it was built at the time the tunnel was constructed in 1812-5.

At that time the land where the canal and tunnel was being built was part of the Highfield Estate, which belonged to John Mills Esq., a prominent landowner and director of the LNWR Railway Company. A man of some clout, and a notable follower of country pursuits, he kept a large stable of hunting horses to indulge his passion. Country estates would endeavour to preserve any natural sport on their estates and sometimes even encouraged fox and badger populations by building artificial earths and setts.

It's likely then that this blind culvert was built to replace a natural or constructed earth that was destroyed by the building of the canal, or the later railway, to preserve the gentleman's sport. An interesting piece of history on our door-step, and a reflection of a past lifestyle.

FROM THE RECTORY

I once read a book that was entitled 'Failure is never final' and it looked at the idea that beyond failure there will always be another chance to try again. With some things we know that to be the case - the first time we sit on a bike we are likely to wobble and maybe fall off. It won't automatically be a success. The same with swimming - we don't all take our feet off the bottom the first time we try. There is an element of failing and trying again, and even practising until we are able to succeed. The same is true of so many things in life - learning to play a musical instrument, driving a car, playing sport - the list could go on.

But sometimes in life we are less able to cope with failure and if we can't get something right straight away we choose to give up.
