The new facility will be open on a regular basis for the public to pop in with their queries or comments, or just for a chat and a monthly 'surgery' is planned. LEAD

No they are not thieves - it's all legal!

You may well have seen that work is being carried out at All Saints Church, with workmen on the roof. Some villagers have even rung to say they had spotted them, in case it was brazen thieves taking the lead! It's good to know that we have vigilant friends looking out for our parish church. The church is currently having the lead on the south aisle roof replaced with terne-coated stainless steel, like that which replaced the lead that was stolen from the north aisle in 2014.

The lead may have been the original, put on in about 1886 and had been patched and repaired many times. If that is the case, it has served well.

The cost of these repairs is similar to the cost after the theft in 2014; approximately £20,000. This includes the architects fees, scaffolding and protecting the organ. Fortunately, the leaks have not caused deterioration of the roof timbers and no unexpected additional work has been required. The

work is being funded by some generous donations and the remainder from monies which had been set aside for renovating the Church Hall. Now that the decision has been made to close the Hall, as it is beyond economical repair, these funds are available for use on the church, although depleted reserved funds will need to be replenished. LAST BUS

A stark notice declaring that the 58 bus service will end on July 15th sent shockwaves around the village's public transport users recently. No explanation was forthcoming and no consultation sought. As far as Arriva were concerned they would simply end the service, presumably as it either conflicted with something else or was unviable. The response from Leicestershire County Council to representations from the parish council indicate that they are assessing the impact of these changes, which they acknowledge would leave the A4304 corridor without a service.

STOP PRESS

GOOD NEWS! Leicestershire County Council has announced that it will step in to save the number 58 bus. The Council promises a new operator will be found to provide the service from July 16th onwards.

AVERAGE SPEED

The eagle-eyed, or the unwary, will have noticed the new traffic cameras that have recently been installed on the approaches to Walcote on the A4304. These are part of a scheme of road safety measures that are being rolled out on traffic speed hot-spots across the county.

These cameras 'clock' the average speed within the 30mph zone rather just than the 'snap' reading, such as the new Kilworth camera, does. The word is that if the scheme proves successful, that is, if it catches enough of us, it will be rolled out in all the villages along the A4304.

BOSWORTH IN FOCUS

A TASTE OF BOSWORTH

Potato Salad with Soured Cream and Chives

With the BBQ season on us this is a very tasty accompaniment to any grilled foods. Will keep in the fridge for 2 days.

Serves 8

900g new potatoes, scrubbed

3 tablespoons mustard dressing (see below)

175g pickled cornichons (gherkins)

65ml soured cream

65ml mayonnaise

4 tablespoons snipped fresh chives

Salt and freshly ground pepper

Mustard dressing: 2 tablespoons white wine vinegar, 2 tablespoons Dijon mustard, 8 tablespoons olive oil, salt and pepper

Mix the vinegar and mustard together in a small bowl. Gradually whisk in oil until thick and creamy - season with salt and pepper and chill until required.

Method

Cook the potatoes in boiling salted water for 20 mins until just tender. Drain well and cut into half or quarters if quite large. Tip the potatoes into a serving bowl and stir in the mustard dressing. Set aside until cold. Chill in the fridge until just before you are ready to serve. Add the cornichons, and gently mix. Mix the soured cream, mayonnaise and chives together and stir into the potatoes. Season to taste and serve. *Jackie Kerr*

WILD ABOUT BOSWORTH

Canada Goose - *Branta canadensis*

The perennial Canada Goose flock has taken up residence by the fishing pond at the bottom of Broad Lane. Canada Geese first appeared in Britain in the 17th Century, when some birds were given to King James II. Since then, their numbers have grown to some 62,000 breeding pairs and 190,000 overwintering birds. Like swans, they mate for life. But also, like swans, divorces occasionally happen... Irreconcilable differences?

They breed in spring and, at the time of writing our flock has a batch of chicken-sized goslings. Also, about this time, the adults lose their flight feathers and are earthbound for around six weeks.

While they are attractive birds, they do come with a variety of problems. Firstly, they generate an inordinate amount of poop. They can eat around 1.8kgs of food a day; mostly grass, much of which is duly returned to the environment...

Because of their large size, they can cause serious damage to aircraft engines. The film 'Sully: Miracle on the Hudson' is based on a bird-strike, which caused US Airways Flight 1549 to crash in 2009.

Lastly, if they feel threatened, they become aggressive. If you see a goose standing erect, spreading its wings and hissing in your direction, it's time to move away! Retreat slowly and calmly without turning your back on the bird.

Curiously, not only do they fly in formation, but when they have young, they also swim in formation. As per the photograph; an adult leads, followed by the goslings in line astern, with the other adult bringing up the rear.

There's an Atlantic divide regarding their edibility. An American describes them as "so yummy...good, lean, rich meat." The British Trust for Ornithology, however, describes them as "reputedly amongst the most inedible of birds."

BYGONE BOSWORTH

Images from the Historical Society's Archive Collection

Following our musings last month regarding the blind culvert above the canal tunnel portal off Boaty Lane villager, David Glithro has another slant on the story. David tells us that he thinks it is a drainage culvert after all, and built at the time of the canal tunnel.

'In the past, whilst carrying out ditching work I dug through the end of the disused culvert. The culvert is high and dry now but before the railway it would have taken all the water from Leicester Road out of the village to the spill-way that drains the fields on the opposite side of the canal. When the railway cutting was subsequently dug out this changed the direction of the water flow along the path of the railway into the canal. The railway cutting is lower than the culvert, therefore it became redundant.' So, there we have it... not an artificial fox-earth after all - another romantic theory debunked!



Anyway, here is an evocative picture of the tunnel portal to appease... The tunnel is noted as 1066 yards and is reputed to contain over 12½ million bricks, that were made adjacent to the cutting, where the Honeypot Fishery pools are today. The tunnel is brick-lined for the whole of its circumference, like an egg shell, otherwise the side and up pressure would push the walls in. Perhaps someone would care to check the maths?

DATA MANAGER

Like us, you've no doubt been bombarded with emails and post from everyone that you've ever had contact with regarding the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR), which from May 25th, requires everyone to obtain your permission to continue holding your personal details.

Unfortunately, as with many hastily cobbled EU directives, the actual finer details are unclear and the interpretation of what is required is varied. Three options have popped up: You are required to positively 'opt in' and re-register, you are required to positively 'opt out' or you are simply asked if it is OK for them to keep the data as before.

The main thing is that anyone holding your personal information must contact you to give you the chance to decide, they must allow you to view what personal details they do hold, if you request it and they must abide by your wishes as to what they do with it.

On the positive side it may help by forcing organisations to remove you from their cold-calling lists and deter scammers. However, beware that scammers are also using the confusion to get personal information!

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Report of the Parish Council Meeting held on Tuesday, June 6th 2018.

Present: Full Council, Assistant Clerk and PCSO Willson

Minutes

Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

Neighbourhood Plan

■ Clerk to the NP Advisory Committee gave an update on progress. Some queries were raised concerning the breakdown of consultancy fees and financial timetables for the project.

Cemetery

■ Council noted poor service from the grass-cutting contractors at the cemetery and the playing field. Chairman agreed to contact the contractor.

Playing Field & Pavilion

■ New contractors had been engaged to repair and maintain the roller shutters.

■ A quote had been received for repairing the Play Area car park, which would involve digging out, laying substrate and topping with granite chip. Due to the estimated cost, two further quotes would be sought.

■ Councillors were concerned that the skate park half-pipe requires costly repairs. As the unit is over 16 years old it was agreed to consider either removing it or replacing it with a new piece of equipment. Clerk was asked to seek quotations for both options.

Allotments

■ Mr. Forman agreed to ask the village contractor to trim the two redundant plots, the cemetery-side track and the public areas.

Traffic Issues

■ Chairman had met with County Councillor Blake Pain, County Council lead for Highways, to discuss the traffic issues relating to Welford Road. Councillor Pain explained that one condition of the Davidson site planning permission was that the 30mph speed limit would be extended permanently before any home was occupied. The developer was in breach of this condition, as at least four homes were occupied. [Clerk to notify HDC of this infringement.]

Accounts

■ The annual Internal Auditor's Report had highlighted a few minor adjustments to banking arrangements and procedure.

■ Council formally approved the Annual Governance Statement and Accounting Statements for External Audit.

■ In the interests of openness and good practice Council agreed to publish the monthly accounts, (personal details withheld) on the Parish Council website.

Planning Matters

■ Council agreed that current planning applications be available for public scrutiny during Parish Office hours, or by arrangement with the Clerk.

Scout HQ Lease

■ Council agreed to refer issues relating to the land holding and its implications in renewing the lease back to Council's solicitors.

Staffing Matters

■ Members discussed a number of minor staffing matters and lone-working procedures relating to the Parish Office.

The Great War 100 year Commemoration Events

■ Council agreed to plant suitable memorial trees alongside the Play Area to commemorate the men of the parish who gave their lives in the conflict and provide shade for the area. This would be carried out in the autumn.

Any Other Business

■ Quarry Liaison - Ask that the road sweeper sweeps the length of Welford Road up to the crossroads where possible.

■ Improvements to external lighting and signage to the Sports Pavilion were discussed. Clerk to arrange a site meeting.

FROM THE RECTORY

Bob has lived in the village for many years, is married to Jean, and speaks to anyone and everyone! Some of you will remember him from years back when he was running the church youth club in the 1980s - he tells me it was 20 minutes stories, 20 minutes games and 20 minutes tuck shop! Does anyone remember it? Some of you may remember him as a policeman. To some he will be a friend and neighbour, maybe of many years standing. You may recall that he was ordained a priest and would help out taking church services wherever he was needed, but for some years now he has ceased to hold a Bishop's licence to act in an official capacity. More recently he has helped at Messy Church and looked after the *Hexagon* magazine - pursuing some of you to support it through advertising and latterly inputting all the text until his health prevented him from doing so (he promises to resume duties soon, as his health is more stable).
