COMMUNITY SPIRIT

As we see from the lead letter in our *Bugle* Postbag this month, when adversity strikes in Bosworth community spirit rises... When, on the night of Wednesday September 26th, adversity did strike and a fire-raiser decided to target our village, the consequences, though serious could easily have been fatal.

The firing of the bin store at Brook House Care Home could easily have spread to the rest of the complex - and the evacuation of the elderly, infirm and frankly, bewildered, residents in the dead of night, doesn't bear thinking about.

A casual look at the damage to the undercroft of Mowsley Court reveals how fortunate the family in the apartment above were in escaping the fire. Thankfully the occupants were alerted in time to escape and the fire service were quickly on hand to dowse the fire before the whole court



went up in flames. Ironically, the young family in the flat most severely damaged were temporary visitors to Bosworth, only lodging there whilst work on their own home in North Kilworth was being carried out, yet our community rallied around.

The police and fire and rescue teams were quick to reassure us that the incidents on that night, including the fire-bombing of a campervan parked on Church Street, were random attacks - with the added reassurance that a suspect had been arrrested near the scene. The scars, the anger and the bewilderment will heal in time, but the community spirit of Bosworth will, we're sure, be ready to rise if adversity again rears its ugly head amongst us...

SCHOOL SAFE-GUARDING

At the time of writing we hear of an incident at nearby South Kilworth school when a man brandishing a knife appeared at the school gates. Again it appears that a combination of community action in disarming the man and robust school procedure averted what may have been a potentially serious incident.

It is reassuring that the school quickly implemented safe-guarding measures and that the police were soon on hand to apprehend the suspect.

MORE HOMES PLAN

The Bowbridge development, of 30 homes to the west of Welford Road, which has recently been put before Harborough planners, proposes to include 10 'affordable' units, which are likely to be available through an independent housing association.

Within the affordable housing 'mix' 2 two-bedroom bungalows, 4 two-bedroom homes and 4 three-bedroom homes are planned. Overall, the development favours three bedroom homes, with only 6 four bed properties of the thirty featured in the plans as submitted. Detailed plans and more information about this development are available at the Parish Office, 2a Mowsley Road. (See p.6 for office opening times.)

LIGHTING UP TIME

The eagle-eyed villager will have noticed that three extra street lamps have been installed on Welford Road. These are part of the conditions laid down in the planning permission granted for the Marsh Drive development, which also includes moving the 30mph speed limit further out of the village.

The Parish Council pushed for this extension to the restricted speed limit at the time of the original out-line planning application for the site and are currently lobbying the county highways authority to also consider further traffic calming measures, taking into account the proposed 30-home development on the opposite side of Welford Road.

POLICE FILE

Recently we have seen a big influx of reports of computer software service fraud, accompanied by huge financial losses. So what is computer software service fraud?

It will usually look a bit like this: 1. Fraudsters cold-call using the name of well-known service providers, such as BT,

- Talk Talk or Microsoft. 2. They may tell your computer or device has
- viruses or it's been hacked and your personal information is at risk.
- 3. You'll be asked to download an application which gives the fraudster remote access to your device.
- 4. You're asked to log into your personal accounts to help the caller 'safeguard your money and information'.
- 5. Your will be money and information is stolen.

REMEMBER: Service providers will

NEVER make unsolicited calls with offers to fix your computer. Never allow a cold caller access to your device and never give them any personal information. Remember, phone numbers, names, logos and locations can all be spoofed easily - don't assume the stranger on the end of the phone is genuine.

Listen to your instincts, stay in control and don't be pressured into making a decision. Have the confidence to say no if you feel uncomfortable. Just hang up. If you have been a victim of fraud, please report it to Action Fraud online or call 0300 123 2040.

Phishing Alert

Watch out for these fake TV Licensing emails.

We've seen a sharp increase in reports about fake TV Licensing emails claiming to offer refunds. The emails state that the refund cannot be processed due to "invalid account details". The links provided in the emails lead to phishing websites designed to steal personal and financial details.

Always question unsolicited requests for your personal or financial information in case it's a scam. Never automatically click on a link in an unexpected email or text.

BOSWORTH IN FOCUS

A TASTE OF BOSWORTH Anzac Biscuits

A nice and easy recipe which gives a lovely aroma while baking! These biscuits will keep for several days in an airtight container.

Ingredients

(Makes approx 18 -20 biscuits)

1 cup soft brown sugar

1 cup Jumbo rolled oats

1 cup desiccated coconut

1 cup plain flour

1 tablespoon golden syrup

100g butter

1 level teaspoon bicarbonate of soda mixed

with 2 dessert spoons warm milk

Method

Mix the sugar, oats, coconut and flour in a large bowl. Melt the syrup and butter together and add to the dry ingredients. Mix well. Lastly add the bicarbonate of soda and milk mixture and mix well together. Leave for a few minutes then roll into small ball shapes. Place on a large baking tin lined with greaseproof paper and space the ball shapes out - a standard large tin will fit 9 or 10. Bake for 15 mins at 170°C until golden brown. Leave to cool on wire rack.

WILD ABOUT BOSWORTH

Horse Chestnut - Aesculus hippocastanum

It is approaching that time of year again - the Husbands Bosworth Conker and Welly Wanging Championships take place on Sunday, October 7th. The horse chestnut is associated with horses because, when a leaf is shed, it leaves behind a horseshoe shaped scar, complete with seven 'nail' holes.

Horse Chestnuts were introduced to Britain from Turkey in the late 16th century. They were frequently planted in parks as ornamental and shade giving trees. In the spring, they're adorned with spikes of white and pink flowers which resemble Christmas tree ornaments. The flowers' nectar and pollen are a food source for insects, and a variety of caterpillars found on



the trees provide food for birds such as blue tits. Then, in autumn, they produce the conkers, so beloved of children.

I started out expecting to pen an upbeat article about these magnificent trees but, sadly, this

is not the case. About 13 years ago, a pest called the 'leaf minor moth' arrived in the UK and since then, it has spread across the country, eating its way through our horse chestnuts. The moth's larvae burrow into leaves and prematurely defoliate the trees. While this doesn't kill the tree, it weakens it to the extent that other infections, such as 'bleeding canker', cause its demise.

Regrettably, all our village trees appear to be infected and so we're likely to lose most of them in the coming years. The pest's impact can be reduced by clearing the leaf litter, as this contains the seeds

of next season's infestation. Perhaps help will come from small birds, when they learn to peck through the leaves to reach the larvae.

It will be a sad day when our children can no longer enjoy collecting conkers, while learning a little of the life cycle of trees.

BYGONE BOSWORTH

Images from the Historical Society's Archive Collection

In any other context this picture, from the Historical Society's Archive collection, of smartly dressed and apparently well-behaved children outside the Village Hall would evoke thoughts of everything being well with the world.

The reality, however, couldn't have been further from that idyll. For these children were from London and had been forced to flee the capital as the threat of German bombing loomed. To many, especially the older ones, it may have been quite an adventure to move to the relative freedom of the countryside but to the parents and the younger ones it can only have been a traumatic and bewildering time.

The children in the picture had just been off-loaded from a bus outside Hunters Cottage on

High Street and were shepherded across the road to the Village Hall where they were to be allocated their new 'homes' with families in the village. Although at the time they probably expected that the situation would be temporary, for some, whose families and homes were subsequently broken by the Blitz, Bosworth became their permanent home.

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN UPDATE

The intrepid volunteers who make up the Advisory Committee and the Theme Groups have completed their tasks and by the end of September the first draft of the Husbands Bosworth Neighbourhood Plan will be written. Their hard work and commitment is very much appreciated. Once finalised by the Advisory Committee and Parish Council, the draft will be subject to a further period of Statutory Consultation. The precise policies for the future of Husbands Bosworth will be put to the community and all the organisations and individuals who were previously consulted will be given a copy of the draft for further comment, which will be recorded along with any amendments to the Plan.

At the end of this consultation, and after any further amendments, the draft Neighbourhood Plan will be submitted to Harborough District Council Planning Authority, along with a consultation statement that records all engagement activities undertaken and ensures that the Plan meets the required Basic Conditions.

Harborough District Council will satisfy itself that the draft Neighbourhood Plan complies with all relevant statutory instruments and will then publicise it and invite further comment before submitting the draft Plan and any further comments received for Independent Examination.

Once passed by the Examiner, the Plan will proceed to a Referendum in Husbands Bosworth Parish. If it passes this stage on a simple majority of those voting it will become 'made' and become a Statutory Planning Document and part of the Local Development Plan.

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Report of the Parish Council Meeting held on Tuesday, September 4th 2018.

Three Council members, District Councillor Lesley Bowles, PCSO Peter Willson and four members of the public were present. Apologies were received from Councillors Bill Fletcher and Susan Fisher. Melvyn Forman took the Chair.

Visitors' Ouestions

- PCSO Willson addressed the meeting and assured the community that the recent arson attacks were thought to be random acts and that no campaign was being waged in Bosworth. Police were studying CCTV footage and a suspect had been apprehended.
- The meeting heard that Lutterworth Police were aware of street peddlers operating locally and warned residents to be wary of engaging anyone in work or buying from unlicensed traders. Often such uninvited travellers were assessing areas for future criminal activity and residents were urged to report any strangers offering services or goods on the doorstep.
- A resident brought to the attention of Council the proposed development of two homes off Broad Lane. The matter was discussed at length.
- The condition and safety of footways and footpaths for pedestrians on the approach roads to the village were brought to the attention of Council. Although this matter had been discussed previously no action had been taken by Highways. Clerk was asked to contact Highways again and reinforce the matter of the danger to users. DC Lesley Bowles also agreed to raise the matter with Highways.
- A resident asked if Council had any plans to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the re-opening of the Welford Arm of the Grand Union Canal in 2019. After discussion it was decided to seek direction from the Old Union Canal Society, which is planning some commemoration events.

Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved Matters Arising

- No response other than acknowledgement of receipt of enquiry had been received regarding the poor finish to surfacing in Highcroft and Wells Close. The poor reinstatement of tarmac where electrical connections had been made for the new street lights in Welford Road was also brought to the attention of Council. DC Lesley Bowles agreed to contact Highways regarding these matters.
- Clerk had now obtained a Street Cleaning Schedule, which would be displayed in the Parish Office.

Traffic Matters

• Discussion took place regarding confirmation of the extension to the 30mph restricted zone and traffic calming measures on Welford Road.

Transport

• Discussion took place regarding forming contingency plans, if the 58 bus service was lost next year. DC Bowles agreed open discussion with other villages along the route.

Neighbourhood Plan

• A report of the NP Advisory Committee and the progress of the Theme Groups was heard and Council agreed that the consultants, Your Locale, should carry out the assessment of Council's recent Call for Land. Council noted that grants had been awarded for this extra work.

Playing Field and Play Area

- The recent RoSPA report had highlighted a number of minor safety relating issues, which Council agreed to address as a matter of urgency.
- Options for the refurbishment of the Skate Park were discussed. Some major safety related work was needed and Council discussed whether to repair, replace or remove some items. Some costing had been carried out, which indicated that the costs would be high for replacement. It was decided to refer this matter back for further consultation and present it before full Council.

Planning Issues

• DC Lesley Bowles outlined Harborough's new Planning Committee procedure, which aimed to reduce the time taken to assess planning applications that came before Committee. Restrictions on who can comment and the time allowed for making representations is now more limited in order to streamline the process.

Any Other Business

- Councillor Forman updated Council on the canal towpath project. A meeting with Canal and River Trust engineers had been cancelled but they had noted that the work was likely to need considerable input in manpower and funding, which they would have to schedule into their local budget.
- Council discussed possible improvements to the lighting of the Sports Pavilion, carpark and access. Clerk was asked to contact a local electrician and arrange a site meeting.

FROM THE RECTORY

I watched *Beauty and the Beast* recently. Not the Disney version that I watched repeatedly as my daughter was growing up, nor the one that came out a few years back, but 15-rated version without cartoon characters or humour, although mirroring in some part the familiar story line. There was a beast - Leon, who was both good and bad and there was Belle, who was beautiful, pure and kind but also feisty. At the end of the film, Belle announces the moral to the tale - that 'something has to be loved in order to be lovable'. It's an idea we pick up from other films too. The boys at the public school are changed by the care of Mrs Chips in *Goodbye Mr Chips* and it is the underlying theme of many romantic novels. We may even know people who have changed once they realised they were loved. A child from an uncertain background or an adult who suddenly becomes likeable when they fall in love and are loved in return. It may even be us who blossomed and flourished once we knew we were loved. It's actually how God made the world to be.

The Bible tells us that we love because God loved us first. Knowing we are loved gives us confidence to grow into our full potential, being free to try and fail sometimes, knowing that love does not depend on our achievements. God made us, gave life to our bodies and knows us. All that he did out of love, and he loves us through and through.

He invites us to respond to that love by loving him back, but also by growing into the people he intended us to be in the first place, people who reflect his nature, his wisdom, his creativity, his love. The security of his love sets us free to grow, to heal from our hurts, to develop, just like the love of a good home nurtures children, so God's love nurtures us. So here's praying we may all become more lovable as we realise just how much God loves us.
