ur 58 bus service is once again under threat as one of thirty-six bus routes around the county that are to be scrutinised in the county's attempt to shave £400,000 off next year's transport budget.

The service was given a temporary stay of execution last July - perhaps because of the hoo-ha generated by users. However, at that time county made it clear that the continued subsidisation of the service, which the provider claimed was not economically viable, was to be reviewed again in July 2019. We are told that this time users will actually be canvassed for their views.

In the meantime the parish council has been pressing the local MP, Neil O'Brien and our County Councillor, Blake Pain, (who holds the county portfolio for transport) for their support.



Bosworth has a strong argument for retaining the service as it gives patients living along the route, who are registered at both our doctors' surgery or at Harborough Medical Centre, access to these vital facilities. It also provides a sustainable social and economic link for residents living in the string of villages along the A4304 corridor to our two main service centres and schools at Market Harborough and Lutterworth. It's got to be admitted that the service is well-used in part and poorly used in others, so a rationalisation of the route, timings and frequency may be in order. But, losing the service altogether, especially as Bosworth expands, would be a major blow to the sustainability and the status of the village as a Rural Centre. Look out for updates on the situation and be ready to shout when the time comes!

Are we to assume that everyone knows what activities and interest groups are active in Bosworth? Certainly, very few took the opportunity recently to come along to the Community Forum, where loads of local groups were showing their 'wares'...

What was on show were a host of things that happen here, many of which are struggling to recruit new blood, especially the Tennis Club. We have a wonderful facility here on the Playing Field and have players and youngsters keen to play but, apparently, not keen enough to join the club!

Our community has lots to offer, but it doesn't just happen - it needs community participation to survive.

POLICE FILE

We are still receiving reports of vehicle crime across the county and feel it appropriate to reiterate the advice that all incidents should be reported, to enable us to assess where best to deploy officers and high visibility patrols.

Tool thefts from vans and house burglaries where car keys have been taken and the vehicle being stolen are continuing to help deter these thieves remove keys from obvious places and hide them. Even simple deterrent such as these can slow down the thief and make him leave empty-handed.

If possible, remove tools from your vehicle when you arrive home for the evening. When you are at a job and not working near your vehicle, lock all doors and consider fitting a loadspace alarm.

With the wet weather continuing, we advise that you drive with your headlights dipped, reduce your speed to decrease your stopping distance. Heavy rain often leads to damaged road surfaces and puddles can hide deep potholes, look for clues such as loose chunks of tarmac. Torrential rain may interfere with your vehicles electrics causing a break down, ensure that you have your mobile phone charged and keep the number of your breakdown service saved in it.

Leicestershire Police are still running the information zone for parents and children. This can be accessed on our website: www.leics.police.uk and is called 'KIDS AND TEENS'. Take a look for advice ranging from staying safe on line/keeping safe when out as well as advice on bullying, road safety, anti-social behaviour and how to report a crime.

SHEEP ATTACKS

County police are warning farmers and stock-keepers to be vigilant following a recent spate of attacks on sheep. In three incidents in Leicestershire, and a number in neighbouring counties, the sheep were butchered in the field and their carcases left. Most of the cases involved heavily in-lamb breeding ewes. Police are urging anyone travelling about late at night to be concerned if they come across any suspicious activity, especially in remote areas and report it as soon as is safely possible on 999 if a crime is suspected to be in progress.

BOSWORTH IN FOCUS

A TASTE OF BOSWORTH Pork & Mango Curry

An easy to prepare one-pot dish that can be frozen for up to 3 months. Fresh or canned mango can be used.

Serves 4-6

Ingredients

750g pork fillet cut into 2.5cm cubes 25g plain flour

2 tablespoons oil

1 large onion - peeled and thickly sliced

2 small red or green peppers- cored, seeded & sliced

1 teaspoon turmeric

1 teaspoon salt

1 tablespoon garam masala or curry powder

1 teaspoon ground cumin

1 teaspoon ground ginger

1/2 teaspoon chilli powder

5 medium tomatoes - peeled, seeded & chopped

2 teaspoons tomato purée

450ml chicken stock

750g small new potatoes, scrubbed

1 x 425g can mango slices, drained or 2 large mangoes, peeled, stoned and sliced

Method

Coat the pork in the flour. Heat the oil in a flameproof casserole and fry the pork for approx 5 minutes until golden brown. Add the onion and peppers and cook for a further 3 minutes. Add the turmeric, salt, garam masala, cumin, ginger and chilli and cook for 1 min., stirring constantly.

Add the tomatoes, tomato purée and stock, stirring everything well. Add the potatoes, cover and cook for 15 minutes over a gentle heat. Stir occasionally. Add the mango slices and cook for a further 5 mins until the potatoes are tender. Serve with boiled rice, mango chutney and poppadoms.

Freeze for up to 3 months. Thaw overnight in the fridge and reheat gently until piping hot.

WILD ABOUT BOSWORTH

Orange Tip Butterfly - Anthocharis Cardamines

The generic name 'Anthocharis' is based on the Greek 'Anthos' (flower) and 'Charis' (Goddess of Grace). Indeed, Orange Tip butterflies are graceful insects that add splashes of orange and white to hedgerows and woodland margins. In France, they're called 'Aurora' (Goddess of Dawn); with their orange orbs alluding to the sunrise. An ancient English name, no longer in use,



is 'Lady of the Woods.' Perhaps it's been abandoned as only the males have orange markings. The females lack this colouring and are easily mistaken for the Small White butterfly. The underside of their wings is mottled green and white which provides excellent camouflage. Besides differences in appearance, the sexes occupy different habitats. The males tend to be woodland dwellers, whereas the females inhabit meadows. The two meet when a male chases and catches a virgin female.

When it comes to egg laying, the females are particularly choosy. They seek out a large flower head of a suitable species: garlic mustard, lady's smock, cow parsley or other cruciferous plant. It must be a young specimen, have a strong stem, must not be in the shade and, most importantly, must not have been claimed by another egg-laying female. The first egg to hatch begins life by eating its eggshell and, cannibalistically, any unborn competitors. After feeding on the foodplant and going through five larval instars, the fullygrown caterpillar descends and pupates on lower vegetation.

Orange Tips overwinter as pupa and emerge the following year. For many nature lovers, they are their favourite harbingers of spring. It's true that other butterflies can be seen earlier. During the recent unseasonably warm weather, Brimstone and Tortoiseshells have put in an appearance. But these would have overwintered as adults.

MEDIEVAL LANDSCAPES

Local historian and former county archaeologist and curator of Harborough Museum, Robert (Fred) Hartley has recently published his latest work exploring enigmatic field-marks and visible archaeology in the landscape of south and east Leicestershire. The book covers the whole of Harborough district, from Lutterworth to Billesdon.

The sites of deserted medieval villages, wind and water mills, moats, lost manor houses, castles, medieval fish ponds and religious establishments are all revealed through evidence gathered from field walking, aerial photography, archaeological site assessments relating to developments and crop marks.

There have also been some exciting 'finds', where previously 'lost' villages and heritage sites have come to light in the process of compiling the book.

BYGONE BOSWORTH Images from the Historical Society's Archive Collection

Many of us are getting back into our gardens and setting about digging, so this image from our Archive Collection comes, perhaps as a timely reminder of the perils that may lurk therein... The information we have is that the gardener holding the 'trophy', which he dug up in his garden at 48 High Street, on February 6th 1977, was Mr W H Evans. How, what appears to be an artillery shell, found its way to Bosworth is



a mystery. The shell is intact and presumably 'live', although the intrepid Mr Evans doesn't seem too perturbed.

One suggestion may be a link to the 320th Glider Field Artillery Battalion, an element of the US 82nd Airborne Division, who were camped at Bosworth Hall and Highfield House before they embarked for Normandy in 1944. Maybe this shell is a legacy of that occupation, a treasure, recovered to be used as a doorstop!

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

HISTORICAL SOCIETY

The next meeting of Husbands Bosworth Historical Society will be the Annual General Meeting on Wednesday, April 3rd, which will be followed by a talk, 'The Archaeology of Leicestershire's Parks' by University of Leicester lecturer, Mathew Morris.

Recent excavations in Bradgate Park, part of a 5-year programme of work, have revealed evidence of hunting in the Ice Age (c.14,500 years ago), Mesolithic hunters (c.6000-9000 years ago) and Bronze Age occupation. The work has also discovered buildings pre-dating the existing brick structures of Bradgate House, the home of Lady Jane Grey, the Nine Day Queen.

Work has also recently been commissioned by Leicester City Council to investigate the remains of Leicester Abbey in Abbey Park where Cardinal Thomas Wolsey is reputed to be buried. Another Richard III to bolster Leicester's tourism fortunes?

The meeting in the Sports Pavilion, Kilworth Road and starts at 7.30pm with the AGM, followed by the talk at about 7.45pm. Visitors welcome. (£2.50 door charge requested)

FROM THE RECTORY

Christians believe that through his death Jesus mended the relationship between God and humanity. He made human beings and God to be 'at one'. The cross is a symbol of God's love for us. In his letter to the Ephesians Paul describes the extent of God's love - of its length, depth and height he writes -how long is it? It lasts all the way through a lifetime to eternity.

-how deep is it? It can reach down to you and me wherever we are, however much of a mess we have made of our lives.

-how high is it? It can lift us to the highest place of that relationship with God

And if we look at these things - how wide, long, high and deep is the love of Jesus, we will find that it forms the shape of the cross. It is on the cross that we see how much God loved us - so much that he was willing to send his Son to die for us.

But the death of Jesus was not the end. At Easter we celebrate the fact that his tomb was empty, Jesus appeared to people after his death and they felt his presence among them. The resurrection is proof that good is greater than evil, life is stronger than death, and love is stronger than hate. Death is not the end. Jesus rose from the dead and by his resurrection gave us hope that we shall also be resurrected from the dead. The resurrection means that Jesus is still living and we can experience him in our lives today.

This year our benefice Easter service is to be held in Husbands Bosworth Church on Sunday April 21st at 10.30am. Do come along and share in this central festival of our Christian faith. Jesus died and rose again, not just for me, but for you as well. Let's celebrate together. Praying you will know joy and peace, as well as new life this Easter. Happy Easter.
