

A TASTE OF BOSWORTH

Strawberry Parfait with Vin Santo and Biscotti

An Italian inspired no cook, simple dessert, which is ideal for entertaining when strawberries are plentiful. Quick and easy to prepare.

Ingredients

(Serves 6)

250g box biscotti biscuits

100ml Vin Santo

400g punnet strawberries, hulled and halved 50g golden caster sugar

250g tub mascarpone

284ml carton double cream, softly whipped

Method

Place the biscotti in a plastic bag and crush with the end of a rolling pin until slightly chunky. Tip into bowl and drizzle over Vin Santo - stir.

In a small bowl, mash half the strawberries and all the sugar with a fork. Whip the mascarpone, then fold into the softly whipped cream. Add a little milk if too thick. Put half the biscotti in a 1 litre glass bowl. Top with half the crushed strawberries and then half the mascarpone/cream mix. Repeat. Scatter over the remaining halved strawberries. Chill, then serve.

WILD ABOUT BOSWORTH

Wood Pigeon - Columba Palumbus
Wood pigeons are a common sight
in our village. Despite there being
no closed season on pigeon shooting,
they're one of the few birds in Britain
that are thriving, with a current
population of more than ten million.
Doubtless their proliferation is due
in part to the increase in oilseed rape
farming, which is a favoured winter
food. Indeed, they cause millions of
pounds worth of damage to all manner

of crops every year.



The females invariably lay a clutch of two eggs in the flimsiest collection of twigs, that passes for a nest. They can however, lay multiple clutches per year. It takes around seventeen days for the eggs to hatch. With both parents feeding the squabs they grow quickly on a diet of nutritious 'crop milk', fledging thirty days or so after hatching. Most youngsters die within their first year, but one ringed 'oldie' died at the grand old age of sixteen.

They are almost exclusively vegetarian: small leaves, young shoots and seeds are dietary mainstays. Though they are not averse to an occasional protein snack such as a worm or grub. Later in the year they feed on pine nuts, berries, acorns and plant buds. In winter, they frequently fill their crops to capacity and digest the food overnight.

They're gregarious creatures and outside the breeding season gather in large flocks. To proclaim their presence, like many birds, they select a lofty vantage point to make the coo-cooing noise we're familiar with.

Around the seventeenth century, and even up to the early 1900s, pigeons were used as medicinal remedies. Sadly, for the pigeon, the treatment often required its demise. Typically, the bird would be plucked, and its naked skin pressed against the bothersome part of patient's body!

SULBY OPEN GARDENS

Sulby Gardens open their gates again in aid of charity as part of the National Open Garden Scheme on Thursday, August 22nd, 2.00pm to 5.00pm. Extending to 12 acres, the gardens include a working kitchen garden growing salad crops, vegetables and soft fruit and an apple orchard with a collection of 63 varieties.

There are seven ponds, butterfly gardens and a stream attracting all sorts of wildlife including 18 species of damsel and dragonflies, nesting kingfishers and otters. The area has been enriched for wildlife habitat, including the provision of nest boxes for birds and an artificial badgers' sett, as well as breeding, hibernating and basking sites for grass snakes, slow worms and common lizards. There are also tender plants such as dessert vine, bougainvillea,

BYGONE BOSWORTH

Images from the Historical Society's Archive Collection

We're indebted once again to former villager, Michael Salter for sending this picture, which shows a couple of his village mates, David Lambert and Roger Parrish, larking around on the disused RAF Husbands Bosworth site in about 1960.

The old aerodrome was a favourite playground for village kids and we have pictures in the Archive Collection of village boys racing motorbikes around the old bomb storage area. In the background of our picture is one of the redundant hangars. The aerodrome had four main hangars; all of which were of the Ministry of War Type T2, which were modular and lightweight in design and reckoned to be 'transportable' if the need to relocate them arose.

The latticework construction inside the hangar made an excellent climbing frame and Michael tells us that he and his friends would clamber up the side frames and across the roof trusses, although for himself discretion overcame valour when faced with the hard concrete 40 feet below! However, some did manage the perilous passage across the span of the building, gaining themselves valuable bragging rights. Like much wartime architecture, the hangars were built as temporary

structures. However, a surprising number still exist and are in use on airfields around the country.

After the war, the hangars at Husbands Bosworth were used for the storage of military surplus, with over 5,000 tons of ground equipment, spares and tools concentrated here for disposal. It was reported that one hangar was full of obsolete RAF stationery!

With the final closure of the storage facility and the return to agriculture of the land in October 1960, the hangars were finally disposed of by tender and removed from the site. Interestingly the successful bidder for the Bosworth hangars was the Vickers-Armstrong Aircraft Company, which had built most of the aircraft that had flown from the aerodrome.



FROM THE RECTORY

Do you find it hard to formulate the words for a prayer? You want to say something to God but you are not sure how to phrase it? I recently came across a song I had not seen before in the Methodist hymn book *'Singing the Faith'*. It is by a lady called Joy Webb, who was born in 1932 and its called Hard to Make a Prayer. Here are the words:

I should like to speak to you, for I know you're there!

Every time I try, I find it hard to make a prayer.

Could you see what I'm thinking and know that it's a prayer?

Could you look into my heart and find you're welcome there?

Could I bring you all my hopes and dreams, my moments of despair?

Could you take what I'm thinking and find that it's a prayer? A prayer!

Words are only part of praying. There is a saying which echoes this thought - 'Pray at all times, use words when necessary'. God knows the thoughts of our hearts and he knows our intentions. He also knows our attitude of heart, whether we are welcoming to him or not, whether we want to please him or not, whether we are sorry when we get things wrong - he knows!

So the answer to Joy's song is a resounding YES. God can see what we are thinking and what we intend as a prayer or not. And those thoughts we send in his direction, the times when we are aware of his presence but find no words to say then that is prayer, silent prayer - sometimes we might formulate words in our minds, but sometimes we can't, just spending time with him is prayer. And there are no right or wrong words for prayer - when we use words then say it how it is, God knows what we are thinking anyway, so there's no place for pretence in prayer. Words help us to pray together, but much individual prayer is done in silence.

If you would like the stillness of church for times of silent prayer, we plan to open the church on Mondays from the beginning of September onwards, from 12.00noon to 1.00pm precisely for that, for silent prayer in a sacred place. Do feel free to pop in for whatever time you can spare.

Hoping you have a good summer, with time for reflection and stillness and prayer. Liz
