We know that COVID-19 (Coronavirus) will have a serious impact on the lives of women, children and men who are experiencing domestic abuse. Fears over jobs, financial pressure, school closures, working from home and all the other current changes to our day to day lives are likely to result in an increase in domestic abuse incidents.

If you're already living with domestic abuse, then the restrictions put in place while the government tries to slow the spread of the virus have probably left you fearful of being isolated in the house with your abuser and as if there is nowhere to go for help. You may not be able to see the friends and family who usually support you, and some of the places where you go for help or treatment may be closed or offering a reduced service. Place remember that you can still call **999** if you or someone else is in danger.

WILD ABOUT BOSWORTH

Common Hawthorn - *Crataegus monogyna 'Haga'* is old English for a hedge, and *'haguthorn'* is a hedge with thorns, leading to today's 'hawthorn'. Everyone recognises the brilliant white blossom that graces our hedgerows at this time of the year. Part of the reason it's such a populous tree is that 200,000 of them were planted in the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries following the Enclosure Acts. Besides beautifying our countryside, hawthorns are much valued by wildlife. A variety of birds like to nest amongst their tangled thorny branches. In the winter, the haws are food for thrushes and small mammals.

In spring, the blossom provides sustenance for nectarivores, and the leaves are a source of food for the larvae of lepidoptera, such as the small eggar moth.



As for human consumption, not only are the haws edible, but young leaves and flowers can be added to salads. In days of yore, the leaves and buds were known as 'bread and cheese'. Though caution is needed as they contain a chemical used to treat heart problems, and it's possible to overdose, leading to arrhythmia and nausea or dizziness.

There's a similar tree called a midland hawthorn. The differences between the common and midland are subtle and it's not easy to tell the two apart. The midland tends to bloom first and its leaves are less deeply lobed. Additionally, the midland flower has two stigmas, leading to a haw with two seeds.

Mythology identifies hawthorns with fertility and hope, though it's considered unwise to bring it into your home. In the past, its smell was associated with death and the great plague, possibly because a compound in its scent is the same as one found in decaying animal tissue. Lastly, should circumstances dictate action, hawthorn is the wood of choice for stakes to dispatch vampires... *Mike Chanter*

CANAL WALK

The canal towpath is not closed to walkers, although users are asked to try to avoid places where boats are moored and reminded that in places the towpath is narrow and social distancing may be a problem when passing other users.

WELFORD WHARF

LUTTERWORTH EAST

A late response from the University Hospitals of Leicester (UHL) has effectively halted the progress of the proposed Lutterworth East development.

The proposal, for 2,750 homes, 84 hectares of employment land, a new primary school and community service hub has been tabled by the principal landowner, Leicestershire County Council.

However, the on-line planning committee meeting, which was supposed to discuss the plan was abandoned at the last minute when a late representation from the hospitals trust querying the validity of the plans was received. As such officers recommended that the application be deferred until it could be determined by a full planning meeting.

WALK ABOUT BOSWORTH Walkies Anyone?

Remember 'social distancing' shouldn't mean solitary confinement... unless you're actually suffering the Covid-19 symptoms! With venues closed, sporting, educational and entertainment events cancelled, there seems little left to do, other than watch repeats on daytime television. However, there's one activity that's not only allowed, but also beneficial - going for a walk.

Study after study has shown that walking not only improves physical health, but it also alleviates depression and anxiety, and most importantly, given the current situation, it positively boosts the immune system.

Further studies have found that maximum benefits are achieved when the walk is taken in the countryside. So, if you're going a little stir crazy, step out for a walk. Say, down Broad Lane, along the canal to the Leicester Road and back to the village, or out along Kilworth Road for a circuit or two of the Millennium Wood, or a longer expedition if you're feeling adventurous. The only issue to remember is, if you're walking with a friend or meet people along the way, heed the advice about maintaining inter-personal space.

BYGONE BOSWORTH

Images from the Historical Society's Archive Collection

We've brought you a couple of sinister items relating to Bosworth recently – Aneurin Owen's brush with the Civil Defence Corps in the 1950s and the village's nuclear holocaust *Plan for Survival*. But there's something even more sinister with Bosworth connections...

In the darkest days of World War II, Britain was desperate to muster any advantage that could stop the Axis Powers in their headlong charge for world dominance. Whilst the munitions camp was busily devising bigger and more destructive armaments, the boffins at the Chemical Defence Experimental Station



at Porton Down in Wiltshire were looking at the other end of the scale, down the microscope - at micro-biological warfare. Specifically they were looking at anthrax, a naturally occurring soil-borne bacterium, 100,000 times more deadly than the most virulent chemical agent.

Laboratory work at Porton Down had indicated that a wide range of animals would quickly die from exposure to anthrax spores and wider trials were needed to establish a viable method of distributing a lethal payload. Their research quickly moved on to seeking a suitable site for ground experiments where the anthrax spores could be released relatively safely into the environment in order to assess the effect. The authority's eye fell on Gruinard, a tiny uninhabited, treeless and suitably remote island off the west coast of Scotland.

In the summer of 1942, field trials were carried out on Gruinard with small air-burst bombs hung on gantries above a flock of sheep on the ground. The sheep subsequently died and the pattern of ground contamination was plotted from soil samples. The following year a smaller bomb, meant to represent one element of a cluster bomb was detonated and the effect noted once more. Meanwhile, Porton Down was also stockpiling linseed cattle-cake dosed with anthrax spores, which would be dropped in a retaliatory act from bombers over the pasture lands of Germany, if Germany chose to open a biological war. Mercifully the tide of the war turned before much further development was carried out and after



the war, Gruinard was sealed off by the Ministry of Defence as a contaminated site.

Testing indicated that lethal doses of anthrax were present even after 40 years and in 1986, following claims that local wildlife and livestock on the mainland was falling to anthrax and, more

worryingly, the threat of anthrax spores from Gruinard getting into the hands of terrorists, the government sought advice on the feasibility of decontaminating the island.

This is where Bosworth comes into the picture, for it was weed-control and fumigation specialists, Languard Holdings of Husbands Bosworth, who got the contract to carry out the work, which entailed devising a novel pumping and irrigating system to flood the contaminated areas with a formaldehyde and seawater solution.

AIR AMBULANCE APPEAL

The Derbyshire, Leicestershire and Rutland Air Ambulance (DLRAA) service has recently launched a funding appeal to replace its ageing helicopter fleet based at East Midlands Airport. The charity, which relies totally on donations, is hoping to raise around £5million over the next two years to enable it to acquire two of the world's fastest emergency medical helicopters. The Augusta-Westerland 109SP has been designed from the ground up as medical support aircraft, having faster start-up times, extended range and increased carrying capacity, smaller wing-span and faster ground speed than the previous aircraft.

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

PARISH COUNCIL BUSINESS

The Parish Office is closed during the virus pandemic and Parish Council meetings have been cancelled until further notice. The Parish Council is currently investigating the feasibility of conducting on-line virtual meetings, to which the public would be invited to participate. More information on this initiative will be posted on the Parish Council website and public noticeboards on The Green and Old Green if a meeting is deemed necessary and as the situation over coronavirus progress, public gatherings and social distancing develops.

FIRS FARM UPDATE

In response to my further queries raised by the Parish Council and a number of residents, the County Council has issued a further update on the situation at Firs Farm, Welford Road. The Environment Agency is currently investigating the source and scale of the incident relating to the waste at the farm and has removed the machinery and secured the site.

The Covid-19 situation and other issues have complicated the commencement of the removal of the waste, but the clean-up of the site will go ahead as soon as the situation improves. We are aware that a number of travellers ponies have recently been unlawfully released into the fields and we're working with the Multi-Agency Travellers Unit to get them removed. Unfortunately in the current circumstances we can't give a timescale for the animals being removed but are keen that they don't stay for very long.

BOSWORTH BUS

The Service 58 is one of the County Council's 34 contracted bus services, alongside Harborough's 33 and 44 services, that is currently being reviewed. The decision on these services is still under discussion and their contracts have therefore been extended until December $20^{th} 2020$ to enable the review to take place and will be extended further if the review is not complete by this date.

The government's recent announcement on additional funding for bus services could potentially have an impact on the outcome of the review for these services, although the precise funding for Leicestershire is not yet known. Clearly, the impacts of the Covid-19 pandemic will almost certainly delay time scales for the review of all of our contracted services including these.

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

Due to the current coronavirus situation the normal functions of many departments of Harborough District Council have been suspended. This has caused the Neighbourhood Plan timetable to be paused, meaning that the proposed dates for the required parish referendum will not be met. An update on resuming the programme will be issued when things begin to return to normal.

CONCESSIONARY BUS-PASS USE

Leicestershire County Council has announced that it is extending the times that people eligible for concessionary travel can use their bus passes during the coronavirus outbreak. The council is responding to supermarkets opening earlier to give their most vulnerable customers and key workers access to essential provisions.

The authority will relax the time restrictions put in place for people with bus passes, so they can now travel for free before 9.30am. Passes will continue to be able to be used as normal after 9.30am.

DATA BASE

The eagle-eyed once-a-day exerciser will have noticed that the church tower clock is stopped at 7 o'clock.


The clock is medieval, dating to 1614 and one of the first two-handed tower clocks in England. It was last restored in 1983 by village clock maker and church member, Geoff Armitage, who later installed a self-winding mechanism. Previously the clock had to be wound manually every day!

Recently the clock has been running erratically, due to problems with the winding mechanism and also probably its very great age!

Realistically the mechanism, and the faded glory of the clock face itself need to be professionally restored, which is likely to cost in the region of $\pounds 3,000 - \pounds 5,000$.
