REMEMBERING

emembrance Sunday this year will be a low-key event nationally as the Royal British Legion takes into account the personal safety of its members, many of whom are themselves vulnerable, and the public. The 'rule of six' or similar restrictions, are likely to still be in place at the time of Remembrance Day, Sunday, November 8th, limiting the traditional gatherings and ceremonies.

So, plans for Husbands Bosworth and Theddingworth Branch, at this stage, are that there will be no parades or gatherings in the villages, with only a simple wreath laying ceremony taking place at each of the four churches that the local branch covers, Husbands Bosworth, Theddingworth, North and South Kilworth and Mowsley.

As currently planned, these commemorations will be of brief duration, attended by the Chairman and President of the local branch, a single standard bearer, and a church official. The names of the fallen of each parish will be read out and the two minute silence will be observed. The Legion recognises, however, that last minute changes to these arrangements may become necessary, or even mandatory, as the situation nationally and locally progresses.

In view of the social restrictions, the Poppy Collection this year will not be conducted on a house-to-house or on-street basis but will be by collection boxes sited in commercial venues, shops, pubs and restaurants, etc. Furthermore, it is hoped that nationally, the major supermarket groups and retailers will have check-out collection boxes on display. Unfortunately, the cheery army of door-to-door collectors, the main-stay of the Legion's fund raising, has had to be 'stood down' this year but, hopefully, they will be back on the streets and rattling their tins next year!

Our readers are reminded that the Legion's help and support for members of the armed forces and veterans, their families and dependants is even more vital than ever in these trying times. The Poppy Collection each year is the Legion's main source of income and the prospect of much-reduced donations, due to the social restrictions and pressure on personal finances is a cause of great concern. So, you are asked, where possible, to dig that little bit deeper this year - and wear your poppy with pride!

CITY RING ROAD SHELVED

Droposals for a Leicester southern ring road scheme, that would skirt to the south and east of the city connecting the A46 at the Hobby Horse roundabout at Syston to the M1 at a new junction near Countesthorpe have been shelved.

As tabled, the scheme would have provided access to the new road to the A6 Harborough Road near Great Glen and to the A5199 Welford Road at Kilby Bridge,

However, funding for the scheme, which would also have opened up development land with a potential for 20,000 new homes on the southern and south-eastern periphery of the city has been withdrawn following a review of traffic flow projections.

Local campaigners voiced concerns that the new junctions on the A6 and A5199 and the subsequent development in-filling of land would increase traffic travelling away from the city and add to existing problems, especially problems created by HGVs heading for the A14.

SPEED INDICATION

Proposals to roll out more average speed cameras, similar to the one at Walcote, across Leicestershire, are back on the County Council's table after reassessing data from the existing 7 sites around the county. The scheme has proved that it can make a difference in communities where speeding is an issue and the council is considering setting up more sites to enable the existing cameras to move locations in order to change driver behaviour over a wider area. Communities will be consulted, alongside data from the police Safety Camera team.

Where average speed cameras are not a suitable option the scheme will look at alternative speed enforcement measures, such as the Community Speed Watch scheme and vehicle activated signs.

BIGGING UP THE PARISH COUNCIL

arborough District Council has recently approved a draft local governance review for further public consultation, which includes a proposal to increase the size of Husbands Bosworth Parish Council from six to seven parish councillors.

This is less than the eight councillors proposed by the Parish Council, which was based on the recent increase in the population of the parish and interest in parish matters. However, it is considered appropriate taking into account parishes with similar electorates across the district and Husbands Bosworth's history of uncontested elections.

Final recommendations will be tabled early in the new year with any approved changes coming into force from the next parish elections in 2023.

BOSWORTH IN FOCUS

AT HOME IN BOSWORTH

After lockdown ended the housing market 'bounced back', exhibiting strong activity and price rises.

However, with the government's furlough scheme, mortgage payment holidays and credit card payment holidays all coming to an end, things are unlikely to remain so positive. Many people are only staying 'above water' because of these schemes, and with their demise, jobs and homes will be lost. There is a strong likelihood that the negative effect on the economy will dampen market activity and exert downward pressure on house prices.

In some ways the recent rise in activity is artificial, representing not true growth but the release of pent up demand postlockdown and the effect of the stamp duty 'holiday', which ends on March 31st 2021. To take advantage of this concession the sale must be completed by that date, and as the average time from offer to completion is around 4 months, it's likely we can expect to see a slowdown in transactions before then. Mortgage lenders will also be watching the employment numbers very carefully and are likely to tighten up their criteria if the economy worsens. If they do this - for example by altering their loan-tovalue requirements, requiring increased deposits or equity - it will make moving untenable for more people and have further negative effects. Also if people's financial circumstances have changed for the worse during the pandemic then they will find it harder to get a mortgage even under the current lending criteria.

On the flip side there are plenty of people with money that they cannot so easily spend right now (e.g. taking expensive holidays) and so homes are getting refurbished and upgraded, making them more saleable. As always, opinions are just that, and time

WILD ABOUT BOSWORTH

Giant House Spider - Eratigena Atrica Halloween is upon us, which means male Giant House Spiders are on the march; their minds set on finding a mate. After locating a partner, he will guard her until she goes through her final moult and becomes sexually receptive. So, we can expect to see them scurrying across our carpets and exploring



our baths. Notably, they once held the Guinness speed record for spiders at 50cms per second! The males sport appendages (*pedipalps*) in front of their heads which look a little like boxing gloves and are used during mating to transfer sperm. These pedipalps and the females' receptive organs (*epigynums*) are unique and act as a species-specific lock and key.

Unlike some varieties, the females don't eat their spouses following mating. Instead, they politely wait until he dies of exhaustion from multiple couplings before consuming his remains! The sperm is stored until the spring when fertilization takes place and the females build several egg sacs, which hold roughly five hundred offspring. After hatching, these spiderlings disperse and begin independent lives.

A few lucky ones will find an abandoned cobweb which they will commandeer. The others manufacture new webs which signal the proximity of potential prey when they snag its silken threads; flies, wasps, moths, etc. But, not daddy longlegs, which are their mortal enemies. The males have smaller bodies but longer legs. And a well-nourished individual can attain a leg span of three inches. It's this size and otherworldly layout of eight eyes that some people find so unnerving. Do they bite? Well, if you handle them indelicately, the answer is yes. Though, exceedingly rare and given half a chance they will run away and hide. Except for people with particular allergies, the effect of a bite is insignificant, and any irritation will be transient.

It's always nice when a historical query relating to Husbands Bosworth drops into the 'in box'. Recently David Trickey from Hampshire dropped us a note to say that whilst sorting through a box of effects belonging to his mother-in-law he'd come across a silver pendant inscribed '1907' on the face and intriguingly, '*Champion Squad Husbands Bosworth Gala*' on the reverse. Did we have any information about the pendant, what it was presented for and how did it come to be in the family's possession?



A quick trawl of the Historical Society's Archive revealed that the 'Gala' was in fact a fun-filled 'grand day out' for the village, with the well-established sheepdog trials and horse show generously overlapping with a wide range of athletics and field events in the grounds of Bosworth Hall. The day was rounded off with a luncheon in a grand marquee, at which the toast was to the health of the King, followed by music and dancing into the night.

Not only did the Archive have a fund of information about the gala but we actually had a copy of the programme for the event in question, which was held on Bank Holiday Monday, May 20th 1907, (we also have Gala programmes for 1908, 1909 and 1910!). Browsing the programme revealed that one of the

afternoon events was an '*Air Rifle Competition*' for local air rifle clubs (at the stated 600 yards range it was more likely to have been a full bore competition) for which the prizes were a '*Champion Badge*' for each member of the winning squad.

So the trail leads to the event, but who won and how did one of the 1907 champion's medals find its way to Hampshire? The *Rugby Advertiser* for Saturday, May 25th 1907* helpfully reveals that the winners were the Welford N°. 1 Squad, and recorded their names - A. Yates, T. Millar, J. Chapman and W. Malings.

The quest to find a plausible link between those in the Welford 'squad' and the Trickey hoard gains traction with the fortuitous appearance of a family postcard album, which has a number of cards sent to Lottie Evans, David's wife's great-great aunt, who lived in Welford. A little further digging reveals that this Lottie (Charlotte) Evans married William Malings - presumably the W. Malings who was presented with the Gala medal! Mystery solved... *Quod erat demonstrandum!*

OPENING THE PAVILION

The Parish Council is working hard to enable the Sports Pavilion to open for casual bookings. To be compliant with current law all public venues must make provision to collect and log contact details for hirers, visitors and staff. To this end an NHS QR code poster, that will work with the NHS COVID 19 app on mobile devices, has been placed on the entrance doors. Individuals choosing to check-in using the QR code poster will not need to log in via any other route. Hirers will be asked to provide a COVID 19 Risk Assessment and comply with current local guidance with regard to social gatherings in force at the time of the hire period. People who are self-isolating, due to coronavirus, are now able to apply for one-off payments to help ease the financial impact of having to remain at home. Anyone who is required by law to self-isolate due to a positive test for coronavirus (Covid-19) or are contacted by NHS Test & Trace Service and advised to self-isolate, for any reason, can apply.

The scheme aims to support those on low incomes who are unable to work from home and whose finances are reduced by isolation.

The scheme will run until the end of January 2021 and those who satisfy the eligibility criteria may be able to claim a one-off payment of \pounds 500 to support them during each period of isolation. Anybody wishing to make a claim has 14 days from the date their isolation ended to complete their application.

The scheme for residents in Harborough district is now live. For all the details, including eligibility criteria, visit www.harborough.gov. uk/testandtrace

If a person does not meet the eligibility criteria for the main scheme, they may be able to claim as part of the Council's discretionary scheme instead.



PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Report of the Parish Council Meeting held virtually on Tuesday, October 6th 2020. Present: Full Council

Minutes of the previous meeting were approved.

Matters Arising

Council agreed to defer a decision on adopting a maintenance contract for the new allweather surfacing on the Play Area.

A new bench to be sited in the Dog Walk has been delivered. Clerk was asked to contact LCC with regard to overhanging vegetation adjacent to Firs Farm.

Traffic Issues

Concerns were raised about HGVs parking inconsiderately on the pavement on Welford Road. Clerk was asked to seek advice on the matter from Highways and HDC.

Council agreed to support the formation of an independent village traffic group, Bosworth Traffic Action Group (BTAG), whose aim will be to consider traffic issues, including HGV traffic and speeding.

Planning Issues

Members discussed Council's planning application procedures, to enable more transparent and open public access to decisions.

Playing Field

Cllr. Meredith agreed to draw up a protocol for the use of the Playing Field and Sports Pavilion and administer bookings. A bookings section is to be added to the Parish Council website. A correspondent had raised concerns about the conduct of players and spectators attending the weekend football sessions. Concerns were also raised about cars parking inappropriately on the grass verges. These matters would be discussed with the Football Club.

Tree Management

Concerns had previously been raised about the condition of a number of trees in Council's ownership. It was agreed to accept a quotation for carrying out the work, with ones needing work on public safety grounds being tackled first.

Millennium Wood

It was agreed that Council would undertake the trimming of the boundary hedges at the Millennium Wood as part of the regular hedge maintenance programme.

Any Other Business

Members noted that Snowdon Homes had submitted a draft adoption proposal for the boundary management on the cemetery side of the new development. A site visit would be called later to discuss the detail.

Council had been made aware of problems with ventilation in the changing rooms at the Sports Pavilion. It was agreed to look at the possibility of upgrading the extraction systems. Problems with drainage in the Dog Walk were discussed and it was agreed to ask Snowdon Homes to clear the ditch on the development side to see if this eased the situation.

Due to technical problems with the accounting software Council agreed to revert to the previous simple system.

Next Meeting

The next meeting will be on Tuesday, November 3rd at 7.30pm. This will be a virtual meeting. Please contact the Clerk for access details.
