TRAFFIC JAM

Notice has been served relating to a proposed road closure that is likely to cause an increase in HGV and general traffic through Husbands Bosworth.



The work is in relation to an on-going water main upgrade scheme and service connection being carried out on behalf of Severn-Trent Water and is scheduled to commence on Monday, December 14th. In order to carry out the work safely, the works will entail the closure to all traffic of a length of Pincet Lane north of Husbands Bosworth, from its junction with Leicester Road (A5199) and Pincet Lane (B5414) for a period of up to 4 days.

The traffic diversion route will be along the A5199 Leicester Road to Husbands Bosworth and the A4304 Kilworth Road to North Kilworth and *vice versa*.

During the period of the works, increased traffic flows will be likely on the A5199 routes through Husbands Bosworth and car owners parking on Bell Lane and Berridges Lane are asked to move their vehicles off-road if at all possible.

CORONA CASH

Businesses in the Harborough district that have been forced to close temporarily under the latest restrictions are being urged to apply for a grant. If you pay business rates or claim rates relief you may be eligible for grants worth up to £3,000 per month for the time you remain closed. Non-essential retail, leisure, personal care, sports facilities and hospitality businesses, which were open previously, can now claim a fixed grant - the amount depending on the rateable value of the premises.



Harborough District Council is distributing the grant according to national eligibility criteria and is encouraging businesses to apply online at: www.harborough.gov.uk/coronavirus as soon as possible.

DOG POO DILEMMA

The village social media network has been working overtime recently with reports of dog fouling. There certainly seem to be more dogs out and about during the summer, which may account for the increase in this unfortunate feature of social irresponsibility. Nationally, dog charities report greatly increased interest in people looking for dogs, presumably as a consequence of lockdown, folk working from home and having more leisure time.

Dog breeders are cashing in on the demand, with the price of puppies more than doubling during lockdown with dogs costing almost £1,900 on average, according to *Pets4Homes* website and up to £3,000 for 'designer' puppies such as cockapoos and cavapoos.

The increase in dog ownership doesn't excuse the responsibility to clear up after your pet. Picking up should be seen as part-and-parcel of dog ownership, not only for the social aspect but also to comply with the law.

On the ground and around the village, nobody, presumably even the perpetrators, wants to have to keep side-stepping to avoid standing in piles of poo or trailing it into our homes.

WARM WELCOME

We don't know which is the more heartening - folk moving into the village introducing themselves through our community social media pages or the positive response from those of us already snugly ensconced here.

A warm welcome to Bosworth is invariably offered, followed by a raft of responses that convey the positive community spirit. We'd like to think that those moving to Bosworth sense this, which, especially during this trying year, has really drawn the community together.

Something that also comes from this interaction is that folk thinking of joining our community do carry out research into what is on offer here.

The school, with its good educational reputation and strong work ethos promotes itself on-line and is undoubtedly a draw for those with young families or those intending to start families.

We would like to think that folk also look at what else we have to offer - welcoming pubs, shops, leisure facilities, activity and interest groups, local trades, medical centre and pharmacy. We promote a lot of this and our historical make-up, in our village website at husbandsbosworth.info and on the Parish Council webpages at husbandsbosworthpc.org.uk - check us out! All-in-all a big 'offer' in a small package, but we hope that the real deal-maker is the feeling of community! Welcome to Bosworth...

POLICE FILE



PUPPY THEFT

Leicestershire Police are appealing for information following the theft of four nursing puppies, three males and one female, from a farm near Gilmorton. The Jack Russell puppies, which were only 10 weeks old were not fully weaned, vaccinated or micro-chipped, and were stolen during an early evening break-in at the farmhouse. The puppy's mother and a fifth puppy were left behind. Anyone with any information, has seen them offered on social media platforms or who knows someone who is selling puppies is asked to contact Leicestershire Police on 101.

CARAVAN CRIME

Caravan thefts always increase at this time of year, when these vehicles are being laid-up for the winter and Northamptonshire Police have recently issued a warning to caravan and campervan owners following a spate of thefts in recent weeks within the county.

Particularly vulnerable are vehicles that are temporarily held on people's drives whilst they are prepared for storage. These thieves are not opportunists, working randomly, but will be stealing to order and have a ready outlet for their spoils. They will typically target specific areas, such as housing estates and quiet locations and will carry out reconnaissance trips to identify potential targets. They will be assessing the prospects and the safest time to pounce, so be aware of any unexplained visitors or passing vehicles.

When laying up your vehicle, even if temporarily on your drive, make an attempt to secure it, either by a simple wheel clamp or tow-hitch lock. Remove valuable items where possible and security mark and photograph fixed equipment such as TVs and audio equipment. Don't leave paperwork in the vehicle that might help the thief to sell it on, and consider fitting sophisticated tracking devices or alarms.

It is also worth checking your insurance as most car insurance policies only cover towed caravans (and trailers) for third party risks whilst they are attached to the car and may quibble over the theft of a stored caravan. Specific caravan insurance, which would give better cover, including contents cover, might be worthwhile considering for more peace of mind.

WILD ABOUT BOSWORTH

Mute Swan - Cygnus olor

Six maids a-milking, seven swans a-swimming... Three species of swans are resident in the UK; Berwick's, whooper and mute. Of the three, the mute swan is the easiest to identify, with its orange beak, which is surmounted by a knob at its base. Also, Berwick and whooper swans migrate to the Arctic during the breeding season.

Mute swans build large nests of twigs, rushes, moss, and even litter. Usually, the female (pen) builds the basic platform and lays her first egg. This is the cue for the male (cob) to join in construction duties. He helps by handing (beaking?) material to his mate to raise and enlarge the nest and he belligerently protects his territory, driving off waterfowl, dogs and humans that come too close.



It is a myth that a swan can break a man's leg, their bones are far too fragile. It is true, however, that swans mate for life. In the last forty years, ornithologists have only recorded two divorces! Both birds incubate the clutch of up to seven eggs, which hatch about six weeks after laying. The second half of the last century saw a dramatic fall in swan numbers. From a population of 1,600 on the Thames in the 1960's down to seven pairs in 1985. But through conservation efforts, the numbers had risen to 134 birds by 2017.

Since 1981 they've been protected by the Wildlife and Countryside Act, and right up until 1998 it was treasonous to eat one of the Oueen's swans!

Swans have always played a prominent role in mythology, representing beauty, love, and grace. Greek philosophers believed swans would sing as death approached, leading to the phrase 'swan song', meaning a final performance. Lastly, the collective name for swans is a ballet, bevy, drift, herd, regatta or my favourite, a whiteness.

BYGONE BOSWORTH

Images from the Historical Society's Archive Collection

One can imagine that Thursday, September 14th 1911 was a particularly slow news day when this story, about a Bosworth schoolboy's charitable actions, jostled for space alongside *Pomeroy's Skin Food* on page 11 of the *The Daily Mirror*.

Alfonso Granville St. John-Sharpe (apparently known affectionately as 'Wee Granville'), was a boarder at Miss Sharpe's private school on Church Street. A plucky chap, and presumably from a privileged background, he took upon himself to help the poor children of London by supporting Princess Mary's Needlework Guild of London's appeal for clothing, personally promising 500 knitted articles before Christmas. Evidently, his devotion to the task earned him the title of Honorary President of the charity and his story being splashed across a national newspaper.

The 1911 Census of Husbands Bosworth reveals 'Wee' Granville was Alfonso Granville St. John-Sharpe, 5 years of age at the time of the census, and the nephew of Mary Ann Sharpe, who was described as governess, and teacher at the school. The school obviously had a reasonable reputation, as it had boarders from London, Worcester and Staffordshire at the time, as well as a number of local 'day' pupils. Alfonso himself was noted as born in Nottingham (his aunt was born at Lenton) so one assumes that the kilt and sporran were maybe affectations of his class background. In the 1901 Census Miss Sharpe has two other nephews, presumably Alfonso's brothers, Archibald and Douglas,

as boarders under her care, and also three boarders from Ireland.

The lad turns up again in a photograph of the schoolroom taken

about the same time, with Alfonso, in less pretentious garb, and the rest of the school, practicing a tableau piece. The schoolroom later became a boot and shoe finishing factory but continues as a school today, occupied by the Dairy Farm Nursery. The charity that Wee Granville so nobly supported in 1911 also continues today, as

The Charity that Wee Granville so nobly supported in 1911 also continues today, as The Queen Mother's Clothing Guild, in honour of the late Queen Mother, now under the patronage of Princess Alexandra, The Honourable Lady Ogilvy, and distributes clothing bank items to orphanages and children's charities in and around the capital.





HISTORICAL SOCIETY

By this time in the year, Husbands Bosworth Historical Society, and many other interest groups, would normally be well into winter programmes. Obviously the Historical Society's plans have had to be put on hold, not only because of the difficulties of safe social distancing at our usual meeting place at the Sports Pavilion, but also because much of our membership would be firmly in the 'vulnerable' categories!

At the beginning of 2020 we had some ideas for speakers and topics for our forthcoming programme. However, as things stand at present it looks as if 'normal' meetings are not going to be possible or indeed advisable, until the course of the pandemic comes under greater control. The Society carries on in spirit, and partly in essence, with the *Bosworth Bugle* article each month and in the Local History section of the village website at: www.husbandsbosworth.info. Also, our vast Archive Collection of photographs and documents relating to the history and heritage of the village is still available and has been used on a number of occasions during lockdown to settle family history and other local enquiries.

Hopefully all our village activity and interest groups will soon be able to gather socially again and share our interests without fear and restriction...

CHRISTMAS TRAIL

way of celebrating Christmas as a community even when we cannot gather in the usual ways. The weekend will conclude with an Advent Service at 6.00pm on Sunday 6th, subject to any covid-19 ruling in place at the time.

DOG CONTROLS

After a recent incident at the Children's Play Area, the Parish Council would like to remind everyone that dogs are NOT ALLOWED in the Play Area. There are a number of commonsense reasons for this:

Biting

As children are most at risk from dog bites, a lot of parents will worry if they see a dog in a playground, even if it's on a lead. Children who aren't used to a dog won't always know how to behave around them. Whilst your dog may usually be perfectly friendly, they may feel threatened when surrounded by noisy children or if they're approached by a curious child. There may be moments where your attention is not on your dog and it can only take a minute for your dog to get frightened or react badly to a child pulling at its hair or fur. No matter how friendly or well-trained your dog may be, it's difficult to guarantee normal behaviour under stress.

Risk of Toxocariasis

Often, animals that carry this parasite may show no signs of infection. However, infected animals can shed eggs of toxocara in their faeces. Even if you pick up your dog waste, the ground can still be contaminated. Toxocara larvae can migrate to body organs and can lead to a variety of things such as fever, abdominal pain or even permanent vision loss. Dogs may also carry E. coli or hepatitis in their faeces.

Allergies, Fears, and Phobias

There are several reasons why some children and adults may not feel comfortable around dogs. Some people may have severe pet allergies, whilst others may have fears or phobias of dogs. It's important that children have a place where they can feel safe to play, without being cautious of an unknown animal.

There is plenty of public space in the Harborough area where dogs and children can exercise together. So, while it's tempting, please keep your dogs out of the children's playground for the sake of other children and playground users. At the end of the day, parents should be able to bring their children to a safe and friendly area, and not have to worry about allergies, infections, biting and even a risk of permanent loss of vision.

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PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Report of the Virtual Parish Council Meeting held on Tuesday, November 3rd 2020.

Present: Full Council; no members of the public.

Minutes

The Minutes of the previous meeting were received and approved for signature.

Matters Arising

- ■New signage relating to parking and emergency exits for the Sports Pavilion had been put up.
- ■The damaged down pipe on the Scout HQ had been repaired.
- A response had been received from County Councillor Blake Pain regarding the traffic issues including pavement parking. No response had been received from District Councillor Nunn.
- ■It was noted that a village traffic action group had been formed and Coun. Bolter offered to represent Council on this group.
- ■Coun. Forman had contacted a contractor who may be interested in carrying out routine mechanical hedge-trimming work of Council's hedgerows.

Finance

- ■September 2020 statements were presented for approval. Clerk informed Council that he hoped that problems transferring the Internet Banking facility from the previous Responsible Financial Officer were now sorted.
- ■Clerk informed Council that a Covid Compensatory Payment had been received. It was agreed to discuss how this should be used as an Agenda item at the next Council meeting.
 ■Council set a date for the annual Precept Meeting.

Snowdon Homes development

■Coun. Forman and Coun. Fletcher had met representatives of Snowdon Homes, the developer, on site to discuss work on the Council's ditch adjacent to the cemetery. Concerns were raised that the work that had been carried out could prevent Council from maintaining the boundary hedge and ditch and compromise drainage of the cemetery. Bowbridge Homes, the owner of the site had presented a draft management agreement, which was discussed at a follow-up meeting on the day of the present meeting. It was agreed to present this to Council for further discussion.

Parish Clerk

■Council confirmed the appointment of Derek Watson as Parish Clerk and Responsible Financial Officer following an acceptable probationary period.

Any Other Business

- ■Coun. Hobson gave an update of the Firs Farm situation. A number of agencies were now involved in the removal of the ponies and the contract to clear the site, with a view to re-letting the farm at the earliest opportunity.
- ■Some minor issues were highlighted by the recent RoSPA safety report on the condition of the play equipment and skate-park. These would be dealt with under the regular maintenance schedule.
- ■Clerk was asked to contact Snowdon Homes regarding mud from the Welford Road site fouling the road.
- ■It was agreed that a draft hire/use agreement for the use of the Sports Field and Pavilion should be discussed as an Agenda item at the next meeting.
- ■Clerk asked Council to note that lockdown provision would mean restricted access to the Parish Office.
