PAYING FOR BOSWORTH

ouseholders will recently have received their Council Tax Notice for 2021/2022 from the District Council. The Notice lays down the amount required yearly from each household for the provision of services within the area and lists where each element of the Tax goes. Whilst the total amount due has increased, the eagle-eyed will notice that Husbands Bosworth Parish Council's contribution will actually decrease. This is partly because the Parish Council, whilst still ambitious in terms of maintaining and improving facilities, decided that an increase in its portion, the Parish Precept, would not be necessary this year.

The Parish Council spends most of the Precept on provision and maintenance of its assets: the Parish Office, the cemetery, allotments, planters, bus shelters, street refuse bins and dog bins, Sports Pavilion, Skate Park and Play Area, mowing council owned grass, assisting local groups and many other things. Despite no increase in the Precept this year, the Council still has plans for a number of projects for the benefit of the community, which it is hoped can be funded, or partially funded, from external grants. High on the 'wish list' is likely to be a major refurbishment of the Skate Park, which is very worn, suffering from vandalism and becoming uneconomic to repair.

Applying for grants is a time-consuming business and very competitive. The results depend not just on the worth of the project, but also on a fair degree of luck, so we will have to wait and see how this pans out.

THEFTS OF DOGS

Whilst not wishing to stoke up any further paranoia on the subject of dog thefts, there has been a rise in reported incidents, some of which have been local to south Leicestershire. Some reports suggest that the thefts are linked to cable-ties on lamp-posts being used to mark homes where dogs are kept. If cable-ties do appear unexpectedly near your property you should be wary of their appearance and certainly remove any that are new and have no obvious use.

More sinister have been a spate of recent reports from areas in Leicester of targets possibly being 'marked' with UV markers, which are difficult to detect without specialist equipment.

The latter method of possible marking appears to have been linked to cold callers canvassing for doorstep milk sales. The callers appear to be representing a well-known legitimate dairy company, however the company has not authorised doorstep canvassing and knows nothing of any such operations.

Whilst the police are keeping an open mind at present, they are advising the public to be especially cautious of any cold callers, or any unexpected or unexplained visitors.

WILD ABOUT BOSWORTH

Moorhen - Gallinula chloropus

Moorhens are one of those creatures that tend to go unnoticed. We often see them scurrying for cover as we walk along the canal but pay them little attention.

Perhaps it's their everywhereness (it's in my dictionary) that makes them unremarkable - 300,000 pairs in the UK. Undoubtedly, their success is partly due to their generalist diet: water plants, seeds, fruit, grasses, insects, small fish, snails, worms, and even other birds' eggs. The 'moor' in the name stems from 'mere' - a small lake, and the scientific designation

Gallinula Chloropus comes from the Latin for a small lake, and the scientific designation *Gallinula Chloropus* comes from the Latin for a small hen and the Greek for green foot. Talking of their feet, they are extraordinarily large and totally out of proportion to the rest of their body. Patently, these have evolved to facilitate walking on aquatic vegetation. Their



chicks appear particularly comical; a ball of fluff, balanced on a pair of twigs, which end in huge clowns' feet.

In the breeding season, March till July, they look for a concealed site at the water's edge and construct a nest using reeds and rushes. Surprisingly though, they sometimes climb a waterside tree to adopt an abandoned nest. They are territorial and aggressively protect their domain. I once witnessed a moorhen seeing off a grass snake that was swimming towards their neck of the woods. Like the long-tailed tits in an earlier article, related adolescent birds may help raise the chicks. And when the youngsters become independent adults, they are singularly unadventurous and rarely move far from their birthplace.

If you are wondering why moorhens are so skittish around people, a clue might lie in a comment made by the gourmand, Clarissa Dickson-Wright, who remarked, "...heron tastes like swan, stringy and fishy, rather reminiscent of moorhen..."

THE BOSWORTH GARDEN

April is the month to wake your garden up - sow seeds, lift, divide and plant. It is also the time to incorporate slow-release fertilisers, such as well-rotted manure, chicken manure pellets or homemade compost into borders and around established shrubs and fruit trees. Give the greenhouse a scrub at the start of the season to kill off any pests and diseases that may have been lingering, while cleaning the windows allows more light in! As the weather warms up weed seeds start to germinate, picking them out now and mulching your borders will save time and effort later on. **Jobs for April:**

Seeds

- · Sow annuals directly where they are to flower try marigolds, cornflowers or poppies
- Sow sunflowers indoors for summer flowers
- Start your very own herb garden by sowing basil, coriander and parsley

Flowers

- Plant dahlias in pots or directly into the ground
- Roses will be hungry after winter, so mulch them with a slow-release fertiliser, snip off any dead wood and tie in climbing roses
- Lift and divide congested summer flowering perennials to improve vigour and create new plants for your garden or neighbours
- Dead-head spring bulbs, but allow the leaves to die back naturally, helping the bulbs make more food and come back stronger next year
- Trim heather flowers back to stop the plants getting leggy over summer

Vegetables

- Support emerging beans and peas by pushing in canes or twiggy sticks around them
- Thin out early-sown vegetable seedlings and continue successional sowing of salad leaves
- Continue to plant first early and second early potatoes to spread supply over the summer
- Sow tomatoes under cover or plant out plug plants tumbling varieties are great for hanging baskets
- Sow cucumber, courgette, squash and marrows push them in vertically to prevent rotting when watered

Fruit

• Plant strawberries - try early varieties under a cloche for earlier cropping. If space is tight try strawberries in hanging baskets or wall planters

• Plant out raspberry canes, rhubarb crowns or other fruit bushes.

BYGONE BOSWORTH

Images from the Historical Society's Archive Collection

If you've not yet caught up with our Facebook page, *Husbands Bosworth Historical Society*, please have a look... On the page we have been looking at social aspects of Bosworth through pictures and other items from the Historical Society Archive Collection and

recently we've featured pieces related to Bosworth Albion football team, which has stirred up some memories. Former villagers, Len Bridge and Mick Parkin have put together some of their memories from the early 1960s.

Husbands Bosworth Albion FC had previously been very active, but folded in the 1950s. Ian 'Hovis' Brown had the idea of reforming the club with a view to joining the Market Harborough and District Football League for the 1962/1963 season. The nucleus of the team were Ian and a motley bunch of teenage schoolboys and young men of the village, including Maxwell Lang, Mick Parkin, Johnny Howes, Pat Wells, Anthony Adams, Albert Alley, Mick Lambert, Paul Lambert, numerous members of the Begley family, Nigel Brotherton and Len Bridge. Two of the best footballers in the village at that time, Barry Vicary and Dave Lambert, played for Welford Victoria FC, but in later seasons turned out for Bosworth.

The old team's strip, black and white quartered shirts, had somehow survived and the old goalposts and nets that had been stored at The Bell, were unearthed. The Bosworth pitch, which at the time still featured the ghost of ridge and furrow, was notorious for its unevenness, slope, liability to flooding and having



to dodge cow pats. In this photo (*right*), the photographer has kindly emphasised the precipitous slope - note also the old Bowling Green in the background, the wiggly white lines, weary goal nets and the hordes of spectators...

In those days proper football was played on Saturdays and marking out the pitch was a job for Saturday mornings. Initially sawdust from Knights the village carpenters was used to mark the lines. Later, white lime, mixed up and poured out from milk bottles was used. Eventually a white line marker was purchased and the markings became a bit straighter.

At the end of the first season the reformed Albion came bottom of the league with one win. They were regularly hammered by older and more experienced opponents who physically swept the youngsters aside. One miserable match is recalled when the team lost to North Kilworth 22-0, both a mud-bath and a bloodbath...

About this time Carole and Alan Lister came to live in the village. Alan had previously played senior football in Leicester and Carole was the daughter of a Leicester City scout, so when Alan joined the club a great deal of football knowledge was introduced. The team travelled to away matches in private cars but some travelled in the back of Alan's Ford Anglia van, which would pull up in some village playing field, the back doors would open and 4 or 5 fully-kitted youngsters would leap out ready for the fray!

Originally, players were solely from Bosworth, but soon a few outsiders crept in. Peter Lee, from Sibbertoft later became notable as a fine First Class cricketer, playing for Northamptonshire, Lancashire and the MCC. A number of players were also coaxed away from the over-subscribed Market Harborough teams and some of the younger lads of the village were recruited to the team, notably Eddie Smith, who turned into a prolific centre-forward, and Martin Lang.

Later, Albion had the services of ex-Leicester City, Peterborough United and Scotland goalkeeper Johnny Anderson. Johnny who had been in the Scottish squad for the 1954 World Cup Finals in Switzerland, had retired from the game and was a painter and decorator.

AT HOME IN BOSWORTH

The Guaranteed Mortgage Scheme

The Government hopes that their new mortgage guarantee plan will encourage lenders to reintroduce low-deposit lending. High loan-to-value (LTV) deals faltered amid fears over how Covid-19 could impact the economy, with lenders viewing them as high risk, at the mercy of falling house prices and potentially leaving borrowers owing more than their home is worth.

How much deposit will I need?

Instead of a 10% deposit - finding £20,000 to buy a £200,000 home - you will now only need a 5% deposit. This means only having to find £10,000 to buy the same £200,000 property.

What is the borrowing limit?

Loans will be available for properties costing up to £600,000.

When does the scheme begin and end?

The Guaranteed Mortgage Scheme will launch in April 2021 and will run to the end of 2022.

Why is it being introduced now?

The hope is that the scheme, alongside the stamp duty holiday extension, will offer a welcome boost for first-time buyers and those with smaller deposits and stimulate the market as a whole.

Which banks are taking part?

So far, Lloyds, Santander, NatWest, HSBC and Barclays have all said they are looking to offer up to 95% mortgages once the scheme begins.

What sort of interest rates can borrowers expect?

As yet, no details of actual rates have been revealed, but generally rates on lowdeposit mortgages tend to be higher than those on mortgages requiring a bigger deposit.

Does the scheme only apply to first-time buyers?

No. Current homeowners can make use of it too.



PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Report of the Parish Council Meeting held virtually on Tuesday, March 2nd 2021.

Present: Four Councillors and the Clerk. Two apologies for absence were recorded. No members of the public.

The Minutes of the previous meeting were approved for signature.

Matters Arising

The work schedule for the parish maintained verges and green spaces had been agreed with the contractor. Clerk was requested to report to LCC the overgrown condition of the footway between the village and Theddingworth.

Some small matters raised in the RoSPA report for the Play Area had been addressed. Some further work would be undertaken by a specialist contractor.

Finance

February Bank Statements and Cashbook overview were presented for noting.

Planning

An overview of comments made in respect of February planning applications was presented.

Pavilion Garage Conversion Update

Two estimates had been received in relation to this project. Clerk was asked to investigate other costs relating to the installation of a telephone line and Wi-Fi.

It was agreed to look into commissioning architectural plans for the project.

COVID Funding - Projects for Review and Decision

Millennium Wood - Council noted that the steps are in a poor state of repair and unsafe. It was agreed that the Parish Council would fund the repairs to enable the work to be carried out as soon as possible.
Skate Park & Play Area - Council discussed options and costs for renewing the Skate Park equipment, much of which is becoming beyond economical repair. Due to the costs of this undertaking various funding and grant options being invostigated and undertain the Play Area equipment.

funding and grant options being investigated and updating the Play Area equipment may also be an option within the project.

Dog Walk - Council discussed the possibility of installing a pathway around the dog walk. It was agreed to draw up a design, which will form the basis for quotations for the project.

Play Area Car Park - The poor condition of the Play Area car park surfacing was discussed and it was agreed to proceed and obtain quotes for repair work.

Road Safety Update

Coun. Bolter updated Council on work that the Bosworth Traffic Action Group are undertaking, including access to community speed watch equipment.

Butt Lane Bridle Path

Council noted that the landowner of the land adjacent to the bridle path off Butt Lane had dug a channel to help drain the water from the pathway and his land. Council agreed to monitor the situation. **Horticultural Show**

It was agreed to provide funding to support the planned Horticultural Show in August.

Fireproof Cabinet / Safe

Council discussed purchasing a fireproof cabinet or safe, to provide protection for important and historical parish documents. Clerk was asked to investigate costs and options.

Ditches & Hedges

Concerns were raised that the ditch backing onto gardens of the houses in Welford Road was in need of scouring to allow better drainage. Residents are to be contacted regarding the current situation, especially where garden waste has been allowed to build up, and what remedial work is required.

Council noted a verbal agreement with the developers of the Welford Road site with relation to the hedge and ditch for which they are responsible. Clerk was asked to re-affirm their commitment.

It was confirmed that the hedge behind the Scout Hut will be cut in the autumn after the bird nesting season.

Any Other Business

Council discussed the recent event where ponies had 'invaded' the Playing Field. Following a site meeting with the LCC agent it was agreed that the fencing would be replaced and efforts made to exclude the ponies from neighbouring fields. The cost of reparation to the playing surfaces would be reimbursed by LCC. A query from a parishioner concerning a possible parish interest in the former Methodist Chapel was dismissed as unviable.

Council discussed options for Christmas Lighting in the village. Clerk was asked to seek information from other parish clerks, regarding options and liabilities, etc.
Next Meeting

FROM THE RECTORY

Do you react differently to someone who knows you and calls you by your name, to someone who doesn't?

If we know someone's name they cease to be a random stranger, who could be anyone and to start to have a context and a background. When someone calls us by name it means we are known.

In the story of the resurrection of Jesus, Mary Magdalene goes to the tomb to anoint Jesus' body with spices and finds the tomb open and the body gone. She runs back to tell his friends, and Peter and John come to check on what she is saying. After they have gone again she remains at the tomb, crying.

She then sees what are described as angels, who ask her why she is crying and she forlornly says that someone has taken her Lord away and she doesn't know where they have put him. Then she sees a man she thinks is the gardener who also asks her why she is crying and who she is looking for and she gives him the same reply. The man then says her name and in hearing him say her name she knows she is known and she knows who he is.

This is Jesus, the same Jesus who knew her before the tomb, and he was alive again - even though she had seen him placed there and sealed in three days before.

The risen Jesus knows your name too, and he comes to meet you where you are, whether that is in the middle of sadness like Mary, in anxiety, sickness, or confusion or in celebration, hope and joy.
