SHEEPDOGS ON TRIAL

In another step towards normality the Husbands Bosworth & Theddingworth Sheepdog Trials committee are pushing ahead with plans to hold the popular sheepdog trials this year, after cancellation of the competition last year. The trials, which feed competitors into the national and in a normal year, into the international competition circuit, will be held in the grounds of Bosworth Hall on Friday, July 23rd, with the public open day on Saturday 24th.

Although sheepdog trials have been recorded in Bosworth from about 1905, it was in 1932, with the influx of farmers and shepherds from north Wales to the area, that classical trials similar to the present event commenced in conjunction with the annual Royal British Legion Flower Show and other sporting events.



VILLAGE ROAD CLOSURE

Temporary Traffic Regulation Order (TTRO) is to be made for Butt Lane from its junction with High Street for approximately 80m, to enable gully replacement work to take place.

The TTRO will incorporate a temporary prohibition of waiting and loading.

SCAMS AWARENESS

POLICE FILE

New research by *Citizens Advice LeicesterShire* has found that almost eight in ten respondents had been targeted by a scammer since January. Fraudsters tried to trick locals in a range of ways - the biggest scam being delivery scams.

To encourage people to report scams, share their experiences and look out for others, *Citizens Advice LeicesterShire* have launched a Scams Awareness campaign.

To help stop more people being fleeced *Citizens Advice LeicesterShire* is sharing the following tips on how to spot them.

It might be a scam if:

• It seems too good to be true - for example, holidays, deals or goods that are much cheaper than you would expect

• You suspect you're not dealing with a real company - for example, if there are no direct contact details, verifiable phone numbers and no postal address

• You are pressured to transfer money or make a decision quickly or in an unusual way

• You've been asked to give away personal information such as account numbers, passwords or PINs

• You are not offered written confirmation or documentation for anything that has been agreed

If you've been the victim of a scam, *Citizens Advice LeicesterShire* advise you to talk to your bank or card company immediately if you've handed over any financial and sensitive information or made a payment.

Also be aware of offline scams, like telephone, post and doorstep and report these directly to *Citizens Advice* online or by calling 0808 223 1133.

BOSWORTH IN FOCUS

WILD ABOUT BOSWORTH

Meadowsweet - *Filipendula ulmaria*

Meadowsweet is one of those showy white flowers that decorate our countryside. It has a preference for damp locations, and swathes of it can be found growing alongside the canal to the north of Kilworth bridge.

It is a perennial herb and the 'sweet' in its name refers to its pleasant smell. In days of yore, it was used as a fragrant floor covering and is rumoured to have been a favourite of Queen Elizabeth I. It would be strewn in churches for festivals and marriages and incorporated into bridal bouquets, hence its vintage name, Bridewort. Even further back in history, there is evidence that Bronze Age people used meadowsweet in their funerary rites.

As for its place in the ecosystem - its flowers and leaves provide sustenance for legions of insects, including bees and hover flies, and the caterpillars of the emperor and mottled beauty moths feed on its leaves.

It is edible and is often used as a flavouring agent in such diverse delights as vinegars, jams, custards, cordials, ice creams etc. - not forgetting meadowsweet wine, mead, beer and champagne.

The plant is a source of salicylic acid and was once more popular as a painkiller than willow bark and salicylic acid extracted from dried meadowsweet leaves was used as a precursor in the development of aspirin. So, if you're suffering a hangover from all that beer and wine, run down to the canal, grab some leaves and brew-up some meadowsweet tea!

Though meadowsweet starts out having a pleasant aroma, when crushed its smell

resembles antiseptic. In Yorkshire, it was jokingly called 'courtship and matrimony', perhaps sardonically linking courtship to the delightful sweetness of the flowers and the reality of married life to the acerbic smell of the crushed plant! *Mike Chanter*

BOSWORTH GARDENS

The peak of summer is here! and your garden will be hitting its stride with flowers and new leaves! Taking time to pick flowers, deadhead, weed and keep an eye on watering will mean your garden continues to flourish into the rest of summer.

Jobs for July

Flower Garden

- Pinch out the tops of annuals to make them bush out and produce more flowers
- · Snip back spent foxgloves to allow side flower spikes to grow
- Cut back hardy geraniums when their foliage looks untidy, feed to encourage new foliage
- Take cuttings of tender perennials such as salvias, pelargoniums and penstemons.

Veggie Patch

- In the veg patch pinch out the tips of squash and courgettes to encourage branching
- First early and second early potatoes can be harvested now before blight sets in
- If you want Christmas spuds, now is the time to plant some seed potatoes.
- Sow winter vegetables: kale, cauliflower, cabbages and Swiss chard.

Fruit

- Lift rhubarb crowns and divide, discarding the middle, replanting the vigorous outer growth
- Prune plum trees in midsummer to avoid canker and silver leaf disease
- Prune out raspberry canes to avoid congestion, keep their bases weed free and well watered. *Wildlife*
- Avoid trimming hedges until late August so as not to disturb nesting birds

• Top up ponds and leave the lawn mower alone to allow frogs and newts to disperse safely

• Put water out for hedgehogs and offer chicken-flavour dog or cat food to fatten them up for autumn!

AT HOME IN BOSWORTH

Home sales values have soared, boosted by the stamp duty holiday, but with sellers adding stamp duty savings to asking prices the rise has left many unable to get into the market. The average price of a home in the UK hit £234,474 in May, far outstripping the stamp duty saving. In other words the 'stamp duty holiday' hasn't benefitted buyers at all, only vendors.

Transactions are taking longer, due to the extra workload and changes in working practices, so there's little chance of agreeing a sale and completing in time to benefit from the holiday. There is a possibility of a correction, or at least a slower rise, as lenders offering 95% mortgages under government's guarantee scheme are likely to be 'tight' with their valuations to minimise the risk of being stuck with property that is worth less than the money they lent for its purchase. As always, only time will tell...

old wharf. Trading as Hucker Marine, the business took off, fitting out locally-made

WASTE MANAGEMENT

A Rugby woman who hired a 'man in a van' to remove rubbish from her home has been issued with a £400 Fixed Penalty Notice after Harborough District Council investigators traced the waste, which was dumped near Gartree Prison, back to her address. Householders are reminded that they are responsible for waste removed from their property

and should check that anyone removing waste is a legally licensed waste carrier. There are several ways to dispose of the waste that cannot go into wheeled bins:

¤ Take large waste items to your local recycling and waste site (tip)

Use a licensed waste carrier: (Search: environment agency waste licence public register) ^{lpha}HDC large items collection service - up to 3 large household items or 12 sacks of waste can be collected for a fixed charge of £35.04.

BARBEOUE WINES

Glorious weather has finally arrived and I'm sure the barbecues are out, which can present a dilemma for winelovers: how do we TMWT

select wines to match such a wide range of barbecue food?

Here are a few tips:

Rosés

Often much maligned, rosés can provide a good match for chargrilled chicken, salmon, halloumi and even a burger! I always avoid

the confected strawberry flavours of sweeter rosés, but as long as you stay with dry or off-dry styles, they can be both refreshing and good with food. Languedoc produce a delightful blush-pink, dry with enough fruit to give it some body and interest.

Great value. Waitrose £5.99



For a more full-bodied rosé, an Aglianico grape based southern-Italian wine from the Wine Society has a fascinating profile, that matches well with dishes such as meatballs and lamb stew, and it delivers a great punch.

The Wine Society, £8.95. If all this talk of the pink stuff is too much

and all you want is a full-bodied red, then you can't go wrong with an Argentinian Malbec.

Widely available in all the major supermarkets, this provides the perfect foil for well-cooked (or burnt...) barbecued meats.

It doesn't have to be expensive, but if you pay more, you will get more intensity and full flavours.

Morrison's - The Best Malbec, on offer at £6.50, but still good value even at its usual £7.75.

THE CEMETERY

Husband Bosworth Cemetery on Welford Road opened in 1858 when the graveyard attached to All Saints Church reached its maximum number of burial plots. Today, the Parish Council, as the Burial Board, are responsible for the Cemetery and the Parish Clerk is responsible for the day-to-day administration. Some of these tasks are relatively straight forward, but occasionally I am asked to help in more unusual matters. Recently, I was approached by parishioners who were trying to locate the burial plots of family members. Through their own research, they knew they were buried in the Cemetery and the year they were buried, but did not know where. We still use the same Burial Book that was first used in 1858 to record interments and from this, and the Cemetery Plan, it was possible to identify the plots.

Due to COVID restrictions, I decided to check the location of the plots so I could direct them to the correct place. I was able, through using the Plan and cross-checking with other plots, to establish the exact location of their family members despite there being no memorial or markers. It was then my great pleasure to share the good news with the parishioners concerned.

The reason for sharing this story is to highlight the work undertaken by the numerous Councils and Clerks of this Parish since 1858, ensuring all Parish records are maintained to a very high standard. Especially important is that the Cemetery records are accurately documented and available for future research in relation to those who forever rest there. CHURCH NEWS All Saints Parish Church & St. Mary's Roman Catholic Church

FROM THE RECTORY

After a break of over 15 months we hope to restart our midweek services at All Saints Church in July. We are moving to the slightly later time of 10.00am each Wednesday and will hold a short, contemplative communion service. We are hoping we will be allowed to hold a coffee morning in church after the service, at around 10.45am and would invite anyone to come who would like to join us.

With Sunday services still being shared around the benefice there will continue to be only one Sunday service each month, but the midweek service is a different matter and we plan that these will continue on a weekly basis.

So if you have been missing church services, this is another chance to come together in worship. If you have been feeling lonely or isolated and wonder where to go for a chat and a catch up, then joining us for coffee might be the thing to do. You are welcome to pop in for coffee without coming to the service if you wish, or leave after the service if you do not want to stay for coffee and chat. You are welcome to bring children along too - for the younger ones there is a toy corner with a few books and toys. It is your village church, do come and make use of it.

It has been sad to see our church closed during the pandemic - it needs people in it to make it come to life again. It has always been the case that the building needs people for it to be a church, for the building houses the church, which is the people who believe in God. In each generation the building has helped point people to think about God, and it also carries the history of faith and the life of prayer in our village. Liz

The words below, which were written by Walter de la Mare (1873-1956) about a church in Gloucestershire, could also apply here (though parts of our church are older)

> Six centuries have gone Since, one by one, These stones were laid, And in air's vacancy This beauty made.

They who thus reared them Their long rest have won; Ours now this heritage -To guard, preserve, delight in, brood upon; And in these transitory fragments scan The immortal longings in the soul of Man.

KNAPTOFT CHURCH RUINS

Knaptoft church was originally part of the wealthy Manor and Estate of Knaptoft, which in 1301 consisted of the Manor House with enclosed garden, two fish ponds and 26 tenants, including a miller to operate the windmill. After the Enclosures and a change to sheep farming in the 15th century, the estate was depopulated. The earthworks of the lost village can be seen nearby and the adjacent farmhouse is thought to occupy the site of the Manor. The parish church of St. Nicholas, which was built in the 13th century, is thought to have been destroyed by Parliamentary forces during the Civil War.

The ruins of the church were preserved through the generosity of Henry T. Mills of Langton Hall in 1932 and today, the romantic setting hosts a series of summer services at 3.00pm on the third Sunday of the months of June, July, August and September, with the last being a Harvest Festival. Musical accompaniment is provided by Fleckney Silver Band and visiting speakers are invited to come and address the congregation. In July, our spreaker will be our Lay Reader, Carol Higson, from Arnesby. All are welcome to the services, or at any time to simply to come to visit and sample the peace and tranquillity. The site is looked after by the Friends of Knaptoft who oversee the care of the ruins and the gardens. There is a Friends of Knaptoft Facebook page, which holds quite a few pictures of the place, and some historic pictures from years gone by.
