The Queen acceded to the throne on the death of her father George VI on February 6th 1952 and will celebrate her 70th year on the throne with a special 4 day weekend

of 2nd-5th June 2022.

The Parish Council have agreed to host celebrations to mark the Queen's Jubilee on the village Playing Field and hope that the village will take this opportunity to celebrate, here and around the village.

FIRS FARM UPDATE

A recent survey and report has identified the extent of the waste on site, the types of material and quantities. These are now confirmed as 'municipal' waste, mixed residual wastes, imported soil and gypsum-based waste. There is no evidence to suggest hazardous or serious waste has been imported on to the farm.

Consultants will now finalise a remediation strategy and action plan for removal of the waste from the site to proper disposal facilities. The report confirms that there is a low risk of groundwater contamination due to the relatively shallow depth of the waste, and underlying soil types. The expectation is to be in a position to start removal of the main waste streams by late spring 2022, assuming all permissions are in place.

FOXTON LOCKS CAR PARKING

Plans have been announced for a new parking payment system at Foxton Locks. The Canal and River Trust (CRT) is looking to introduce automatic number plate recognition (APNR) technology in its Foxton Locks car parks to replace the current pay and display method. New payment machines would also allow visitors to pay for parking by card or via their mobile, as well as with cash. The plans, which CRT hope will enhance visitor experience at the popular site, have yet to be approved by Harborough District Council.

BOSWORTH IN FOCUS

BOSWORTH SKY AT NIGHT

Astronomy from your Backyard


Choose a clear night, wrap up warm and venture outside to look at the stars. Give yourself 10 to 15 minutes for your eyes to become accustomed to the dark. Take in the wonder of the night sky. It is quite good here in Husbands Bosworth, if you can get away from neighbours' annoying security lights. Take a pair of binoculars if you have them but they are not essential.

This month we are looking at the winter constellation Orion, the Hunter.

Orion is one of the most familiar sights in the winter sky and in February it is due south (looking towards Welford) at 8.00pm in the middle of the month. The star chart shows the brightest stars in Orion as seen by the naked eye.

The star *a* Orionis, or Betelgeuse (Beetle-juice!), is top left in the constellation and distinctly red in colour, particularly through binoculars. It is a red giant star nearing the end of its life and is expected to end its evolution with a supernova explosion within 100,000 years. It is between 10 and 20 times the mass of our Sun and 500 to 600 light years away. [NB. A light year is the distance light travels in a year - quite a long way!] The star β Orionis, or Rigel, is bottom right, diagonally opposite Betelgeuse and is a blue/white supergiant star. This star really is a whopper, seventy times bigger than and approximately 300,000 times as luminous as our Sun.

The highlight of Orion, however, has to be the Great Orion Nebula, or M-42, which is just visible to the unaided eye as a fuzzy patch in the Hunter's sword. Binoculars or a



small telescope transform M-42 into a greenish-white nebulosity. Glowing ionised hydrogen gas energised by hot young stars produce the nebula's light that we see.

The moon is full in the middle of February and washes out a dark sky, so it is best to view Orion in the first and last week of the month. Also look for the planet Venus appearing as a brilliant white 'morning star' before dawn in the south-eastern sky (in the direction of Sibbertoft). You might also spot the dull-red planet Mars at 5 o'clock under Venus, although it's quite faint. Next month - Gemini, the Twins

BYGONE BOSWORTH

Images from the Historical Society's Archive Collection

This month we venture a wee bit out of our parish and take a look at a piece of lost Leicestershire almost on our doorstep...

Near Lubenham on the A4303, a sign points to Papillon Hall Farm. Although the farm and a motley bunch of ancillary buildings have survived, the prize 'exhibit' - Papillon Hall itself, is sadly gone.

The Hall was demolished during 1950-1, after being much ravaged by the occupation of the 319th Glider Field Artillery Battalion of the 82nd Airborne Division of the US Army in the build up to the Normandy landings during World War II. The hall's glamorous heritage alone should have seen this glorious architectural gem preserved. Designed around the core of a 17th century manor house by the renowned Victorian architect, Edwin Lutyens and surrounded by



gardens laid out by the equally renowned garden designer Gertrude Jekyll, it was one of the most complete architect and garden designer collaborations ever contrived.

Lutyens greatly expanded the original house, adding four sweeping wings, which fanned out, in plan, like the wings of a butterfly *papillon* being French for butterfly; the family name of the original French Huguenot owners. Jekyll, for her part, swathed the hall with shrubbery and herbaceous plantings within a formal garden structure of stairs and balustraded terraces.

A bit late in the day, remaining fragments of the garden house, wall and attached pillar, that formed part of the garden, were listed as grade II buildings in 1995. Also still evident are elements of Jekyll's lily pond, summerhouse, some walls, and the remains of a greenhouse. The stables and outbuildings are now used as farm buildings.

MORE BOSWORTH IN FOCUS

BOSWORTH GARDENS

Spring is in sight and there are plenty of



things to be getting on with in the garden during any weather window in February ... **Vegetable Patch**

Prepare your beds by digging up perennial weeds and covering with cloches, polythene, or fleece to warm the soil for earlier planting

Chit early and maincrop potatoes - pop them in some egg boxes and put them somewhere warm and dry to sprout before planting in March

Plant garlic, shallot and onion sets out

Sow broad beans early in the month to avoid blackfly as much as possible

Sow salad crops - lettuces, radish, chard and spring onions, under cover to get ahead Flowers

Sow sweet peas under cover, and try using toilet rolls or individual modules to minimise root disturbance when you transplant them outside in spring

Divide crowded snowdrops and pop them around the garden for more plants next year

Prune wisteria, jasmines, rhododendron and summer flowering clematis

Cut back Cornus (dog woods) and Salix (willows) to promote summer growth

Fruit Patch

Plant deciduous trees or move them while they are still dormant. They also benefit from a good mulch of rotted manure or garden compost this time of year. Take care only mulch to feed the roots and try not mound it up the stems.

Protect any early fruit blossoms from frosts, but ensure pollinating insects have access

Prune and mulch fruit bushes to maintain their productiveness

Cover strawberry plants to encourage an earlier crop

which is another main type of property sales related fraud.

You might recently have come across the bizarre story of Luton based Reverend Mike Hall, who returned to his house after a long period working away from home to find someone else living in it. You might have thought it was a freak event. You'd be wrong... Here's how it works...

The fraudsters find properties that are mortgage free and ideally where there is a sole owner, a dead owner, an owner in a care home, a landlord, or living overseas. The fraudsters then 'becomes' the owner by legally changing their name to that of the owner and obtaining identity documents such as passports and driving licences in the new name. They may get an accomplice to rent the property as a tenant, giving the fraudsters free access to show estate agents around in order to appear more legitimate.

Land Registry and other searches in the sale process understandably throw up no anomalies in the registered ownership. The fraudsters then sell the property, pocket the money and disappear.

I know this sounds complex but each step is fairly straightforward, and with the huge amounts of money at stake there is a ready supply of criminals willing to give it a go. If you're worried about this kind of fraud affecting you, there's a simple thing that you can

do to stop it - set up a land registry property alert and get notified of any events affecting the title of your property: https://propertyalert.landregistry.gov.uk/propertyalert/ mark.baldwin@exp.uk.com

Minutes of the Parish Council 2022/23 Precept Meeting held on Tuesday 23rd November 2021 were approved and signed as correct.

Matters Arising from the Minutes

• A site meeting to assess the security of the Sports Pavilion is to be arranged.

• A meeting with an energy consultant to discuss future energy options for the Sports Pavilion. Options were discussed, which Council will consider at a workshop meeting.

Clerk confirmed that he had received a response from the Leader of the Scout Group, in relation to the use of the Scout Hut. This response was read out in full by the Clerk.
Finance

• November 2021 Bank Statements and Cashbook reconciliation were presented for review. **Planning Overview**

• Clerk presented the November planning application summary for information.

Co-option of Parish Councillor

• The resignation of Cllr. Meredith was accepted by the Parish Council and the process to allow Council to co-opt a Parish Councillor was started.

Skate Park - Status and Next Steps

• Revised designs and costing were submitted by the contractors for consideration. Council requested more specification information on designs. Clerk to request specification information from Contractors including details of Skate Parks already using these modular systems and designs.

Play Area - New Waste Bin

• It was agreed to proceed with the purchase of a larger bin for the Play Area.

Cemetery Wall

• Clerk presented a quotation received to date, to undertake the required work and is awaiting a second quote.

Any Other Business

• Repair of the damaged light in the changing room and external light at the Sports Pavilion was approved.

• Significant amounts of mud are being noted on the veranda area and on the pathways around the building. The matter has been discussed with the organisations using the Pavilion.

• Clerk was asked to investigate lighting options for the Sports Pavilion car park entrance.

• Clerk confirmed that servicing of the Emergency Lighting in the Pavilion had been arranged.

• It was agreed that Council will include the hedge at the Millennium Wood as part of the Parish hedge cutting programme.

• Clerk advised Council that Leicestershire County Council had indicated that the survey work had been completed at Firs Farm and a potential remedial plan was being drawn up. **Next Meeting**

ST.MARY'S NEWS

St Mary's in the grounds of Bosworth Hall, has seen Mass celebrated since the Reformation. The present church was built in 1873 and is now served by the Ordinariate of Our Lady of Walshingham and also acts as the home in Leicestershire of the Ordinariate.
