#### WOODLAND WALK

Husbands Bosworth Millennium Woodland Trust was set up in 2002 to purchase and manage the village's community woodland as a millennium memorial project. Four acres of bare ridge and furrow pastureland, overgrown scrub and woodland off Mill Lane, was purchased from Leicestershire County Council as a community venture. The site had previously been a claypit and open-clamp brickworks and the hill on the main road up from North Kilworth is still known locally as Brickfield Hill.

Grants from the Parish Council, Leicestershire Shire Environmental Grant Scheme and *BiffaWard*, along with sponsorship by local businesses and donations from the community helped toward the initial purchase, original pathway work and tree planting. Recently a grant was secured from the Mick George Community Fund, which has enabled repair works to the original pathways to be undertaken and a new path and boardwalk to be installed through and previously inaccessible area to extend the visitor 'experience'.





Many folk, especially those new to the village, 'discovered' the Woodland as a wildlife haven and welcome 'safe place' to escape to during the various lockdown periods over the past couple of years and the site has become a popular place for families and dog walkers to explore.


The grant-funded works have now been completed. However, the Trustees aim to continue to maintain the site and carry out further repairs.

Recently two Bosworth youngsters, Ben and Harrison, have been helping out at the Woodland, carrying out some excellent work repairing pathways and installing new steps around the site. The work is part of the community involvement element of their Duke of Edinburgh's Award. Well done, boys!

### **BOSWORTH IN FOCUS**

#### AT HOME IN BOSWORTH

The average British home has risen in price by 13% in 2 years - including over 8% in the past year - taking the cost of the average home to £249,700. The growth in the last three months is the highest in 15 years. Sales agreed in the run up to Easter were

27% higher than their pre-pandemic level. Buyer demand remains high, at 58% above the five-year average. Supply is starting to increase, with the number of properties being put up for sale in March 3% higher than the five-year average, but the number of homes for sale is still 40% below the five-year average.

Over 4 million homes have been pushed into a higher stamp duty bracket, with over 1 million properties in England and Northern Ireland rising enough to become subject to stamp duty for the first time for home movers, and 2 million properties rising to more than the £300,000 threshold at which stamp duty becomes payable by first time buyers.

An average first-time buyer putting down a 15% deposit and borrowing 4.5 times their income now spends £225,000 - £27,000 more than they did two years ago. They require an additional £4,000 for a deposit, and need to earn £5,000 more each year in order to secure a mortgage.

Unfortunately, earnings growth has not kept pace with house price increases, with average annual salaries rising by only £2,704 during the past two years.

The housing market looks set to slow down during the second half of the year, as economic headwinds, such as the rising cost of living and higher mortgage rates, put pressure on house price growth. But while the number of homes coming on to the market has started to increase, the ongoing shortage of supply should prevent house price falls.

#### WILD ABOUT BOSWORTH

**Common Darter** *Sympetrum Striolatum* This little dragonfly is indeed common, and it catches its insect prey by darting out from their perch as a victim comes into range. Favoured perches are ones where they can warm their wings in sunshine. They appear on the scene as the weather turns mild and remain until the frosts come.

Immature individuals are a golden-brown colour, but the males, like the one in the

photo from the Millennium Wood, turn bright red as they age. This causes problems with identification, as there are other red dragonflies -for example, the Ruddy Darter. (In fact, I am not certain of the identification as a Common Darter...)

They regard still or slow running water as suitable breeding grounds; lake margins, ditches, garden ponds, fresh and stagnant water. Females advertise their readiness to breed by 'dancing' over a suitable egg-laying site. When she is joined by a patrolling male they fly off in tandem and copulate. Returning to the water the pair fly an undulating pattern, the female launching an egg at the bottom of each arc. The eggs hatch into larvae, which feed on moving prey such as water fleas, snails, tadpoles and small fish. They themselves fall prey to larger fish. Some individuals do overwinter in larval form to emerge as next year's winged population.

There's a curious east/west dichotomy in the mythological significance of dragonflies. In the east, they are seen as omens of good fortune. Whereas, in England, they're known as 'Devil's darning needles'. It's odd that they are disparaged, as they help to control pests like mosquitoes. In contrast to their Devilish associations, they became emblematic of Freya, the Norse goddess of love, war, and fertility.

St George's Day is the second most important date in the Scouting calendar, which 1<sup>st</sup> Kilworth celebrates with the other groups from the district at our Ullesthorpe campsite. It is an opportunity for all age groups to come together to renew their promise. This year our Cubs and Scouts took part in a 6 - 7 mile incident hike, entering four teams, three of which won the Best Teamwork and Best Overall Team trophies, as well as scoring highest on the General Knowledge Quiz. Congratulations to all those who took part. #### BYGONE BOSWORTH Images from the Historical Society's Archive Collection

Often, when trawling through the Historical Society's vast trove of old photographs we come across a picture that tells a far greater story than is apparent at first glance. This picture, of the Village Hall (more accurately, the Turville Memorial Hall...) is worth a detailed look.

In March 1896 the *Harborough Advertiser* reported the opening of the Turville Memorial Hall 'The memory of Sir Francis Turville is still green in the recollection of all who knew him, and the desire to erect some suitable memorial to him has long been cherished. During the past few months inhabitants of Husbands Bosworth have witnessed the realisation of their hopes by the erection of a convenient Village Hall, and the opening ceremony took place on Saturday.'

Sir Francis's widow, Lady Liscar had provided the site for a building to benefit the village in his memory. Public subscription, concerts and a grand bazaar in 1894, which was



opened by Her Serene Highness Princess Henry of Pless, (a close friend of Madam Alwina Valleria of Bosworth House), raised the £880 required to build the Hall.

Initially the Hall was a single room, and used as a reading room and the local big houses contributed their glossy magazines and news sheets. There was a billiard table and cards, dominoes and bagatelle were also played.

In our picture, taken in about 1905, we see the caretaker, Billy Neal relaxing. Under the table is Billy's crutch and propped up against the table is a gun, presumably used by the Rifle Club for target shooting, the target clearly visible in the back corner of the room, pinned to a heavy hide-bound backstop. The presence of the gloriously majestic '*Monarch of the Glen*' by Sir Edwin Landseer was presumably donated by a well-healed sponsor, who clearly felt that a modicum of the classical should be infused into the local community. Note the fireguard and coal-box in the front right foreground of the picture. The fireplace was on what was then an outside wall, the

position of which is still clearly evident today.



#### **BOSWORTH SKY AT NIGHT**

#### Astronomy from your Backyard

June is a problem when observing stars and deep-sky objects as the night sky never really gets dark and after sunset and prior to sunrise is given over to a form of twilight. The moon, however, is bright enough to see well, even against a twilight sky, and provides satisfying observing. A telescope or binoculars give great views of the Moon bringing the maria (seas) and larger craters to life and the glory of the ray system at full moon. Phases of the Moon for June are as follows:

First Quarter Moon 7th; Full Moon 14th; Last Quarter Moon 21st; New Moon 29th

In June the sun reaches its most northerly position in the sky. Known as the summer solstice this will occur at 10.13am on 21st June. This has always been a mysterious time over millennia. It is thought Stonehenge and many other enigmatic archaeological monuments may have been constructed to align with the rising sun on Midsummer Day and even today rituals are held to celebrate this event.

At this time of year, if conditions in the atmosphere are right, silvery-blue Noctilucent Clouds (NLCs) can be seen in the twilight sky after the Sun has set. The best views are between 11/2 and 2 hours after sunset or before sunrise, around 11.00pm (or before 2.40am!). NLCs are not astronomical objects, but high altitude ice clouds in the

mesosphere, basically thin sheets of tiny ice particles at an altitude of 60 - 80km, which reflect sunlight after the Sun has set. The picture shows noctilucent clouds high in the atmosphere reflected in open water. Quite an atmospheric photograph, to risk a pun. Mike Price Next month, July - observing sun spots
