## **CALLING TIME ON THE QUARRY**

**D**roposals tabled by Mick George Ltd. to extend the hours of operation at Husbands Bosworth Quarry have been thrown out by the mineral planning authority, Leicestershire County Council.

The proposal, to allow traffic to leave the site from 6.00am was deemed unacceptable by the council's Environmental Health team. The planners also agreed with comments, raised by the Parish Council and other objectors, relating to the local impact, including noise and disturbance, within a rural environment that the proposal would cause.

The report also cites the lack of supporting evidence for the operation of a traffic plan, poor commercial justification for the earlier starting time, poor mitigation of the environmental impacts and the impact on health and wellbeing relating to disturbance. \*\*\*\*\*

In another application, the planning authority agreed to allow the importation of material into restoration areas adjacent to Butt Lane, previously excluded from the infill plan.

#### **DIM VIEW**

t the County Council's Cabinet Meeting in December, members agreed to dim all streetlights, including those on traffic routes and key junctions between 8.00pm and 10.00pm, as part of an 18 month trial period. Implementation will commence in January 2024 and will take approximately four weeks for around 68,500 lights to be re-programmed across Leicestershire.

The scheme will be monitored on a regular basis to see if there are any unintended consequences in relation to crime, the fear of crime or serious accidents.

The two reasons for change are environmental and financial. There will be benefits of reduced carbon emissions and light pollution and reduced energy costs for the council, which needs to save more than £500,000 in the street lighting department over the next four years.

The council has powers to install street lighting, but does not have a statutory requirement to provide street lighting. However, when it does choose to provide lighting, it must maintain it in a safe condition.

#### **BLACK MARKET**

s of January 1<sup>st</sup>, secondhand goods sold A on-line may be subject to tax, known as the 'side-hustle tax' in a new HM Revenue & Customs clamp-down.

Digital platforms, such as eBay, AirbnB, Etsy, Amazon and Vinted will be required to share seller information with HMRC, and anyone selling goods to the value of £1,000 or above a year will be required to register as self-employed and file a self-employed tax return at the end of the financial year.

#### **GO TO JAIL**

Tarborough District Council has been advised that there is no chance of succeeding in a legal challenge to the controversial decision by the Government to approve the 1,700 place prison at Gartree. In April, Harborough District Council refused planning permission for the proposed 'super prison' but the Ministry of Justice (MoJ) appealed. The final decision fell to the Secretary of State for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities, Michael Gove, who gave the project the go-ahead. At a meeting before Christmas Harborough District Council, following legal advice, voted not to challenge the decision.

Members of the local action group said the news was very disappointing and the local communities could foresee that the local infrastructure, services, highways and transport would be unable to cope, with the proposed 800 staff.

### **BOSWORTH IN FOCUS**

#### WILD ABOUT BOSWORTH

#### Eurasian or common magpie - Pica Pica

Magpies are corvids and '*Pica*' is classical Latin for a magpie. In the olden days, they were simply known as 'Pies', until the prefix 'Mag' was added in the  $16^{th}$  century. Mag was a diminutive form of Margaret, which was used to mean women in general. The rationale for this name change, presumably instigated by men, is they were disparagingly comparing the chattering birds with chattering ladies!

Magpies are omnivorous, eating small mammals, insects, scraps, carrion, acorns, grain, and other vegetable matter, and yes, they do have a liking for young birds and eggs. I've also enjoyed watching an individual performing a balancing act on my bird feeder for a meal of lard.

Mating takes place in spring and begins with the males dancing a courtship display to charm a prospective mate. They are monogamous and a pair will tend to occupy the same territory year after year. The male brings material for the nest which is built by the female. He also devotedly feeds his wife as she spends three weeks incubating the eggs.



Non-breeding birds congregate in flocks which have the collective noun of either a conventicle, gulp, mischief, tidings or tribe. Tests have shown magpies to be extremely intelligent. They are the only birds that can recognise themselves in a mirror; a talent they share with apes, dolphins, elephants, and humans. Perhaps it is this intelligence that led them to travel on the roof of Noah's ark, rather than share the space inside with the multitude of cats, raptors, and snakes.

There are many versions of the magpie counting rhyme which was first recorded in 1780. Perhaps the most popular begins: 'One for sorrow, Two for mirth, Three for a funeral, and Four for a birth '. Mike Chanter

In addition to over 300 varieties of snowdrops, there will be winter colour provided by cyclamen, hellebores, winter aconites, ranunculus ficaria, iris reticulata and early narcissus, planted with evergreen ferns, yew and box hedging and topiary. There will be homemade soup and rolls on sale to help with any winter chill.

BYGONE BOSWORTH Images from the Historical Society's Archive Collection

This fine photograph of Welford & Kilworth Station from our Archive Collection helps to convey the reality of winter life on the railways. At the time that this picture was taken the goods yard was obviously still working.

In *Recollections of a Country Station*, signalman at Kilworth crossing, Harry Aland, describes in detail the workings

of the station and the hierarchy of the staff... The goods and passenger sides of the business were run separately, but a station-master was in overall control of the site.

Goods incoming by rail would typically be bagged cattle cake, which was stored in the goods shed for farmers to collect, and live cattle from Wales for fattening on the rich Welland Valley pastures, which were off-loaded into the extensive cattle-pens. Occasionally, hunting horses for the local hunts and luggage for the huntsmen were conveyed by rail. During the building of the RAF stations at Husbands Bosworth and Bruntingthorpe, much of the construction material was brought to Kilworth for onward dispatch.

Outgoing goods included up to 12,000 gallons of milk a day from the United Dairies depot on the opposite side of the main road, which was shipped down to London daily. During the winter, rose trees from Gandy's Roses were a regular traffic.

Interestingly, Harry Aland recalls that shortly before the station closed in June 1966 the station lighting was completely modernised - the station, platforms and yards were apparently better lit than Rugby!

The churns propped up against the wall were for fresh water for Yelvertoft & Stanford Park station, which didn't have its own water supply.

#### WASTE & RECYCLING

LCC controlled Recycling and Household Waste Sites (tips) are operating winter opening hours until 31<sup>st</sup> March 2024 (09.00am to 4.00pm). Visitors are encouraged to arrive at least 10 minutes prior to closing, with the last admittance at 3.55pm.

Visitors to the tips are advised to only travel to a the site during icy/snowy conditions if it is necessary to do so. Sites may need to change opening times or temporarily close if the conditions on site are not safe at any time.

Always check the website for your chosen site before planning a visit, as the website will be kept updated where closures over 4 hours occur.

Be aware that not all sites are able to take all categories of waste - check on-line before travelling.

The Government has recently passed legislation that introduces a 'free allowance' for construction and demolition waste received at Recycling and Household Waste Sites from works undertaken by home-owners. LCC plans to introduce the free allowance (two bags or one large item per week) across all of its sites from 1<sup>st</sup> January 2024.

PLEASE NOTE: Existing charges and restrictions will apply to waste presented above the free allowances.

#### HAVING YOUR SAY

The Local Plan is the long-term development plan for Harborough District, and sets a strategy for the amount, location and design of new built development, such as homes, schools, employment, retail etc., whilst helping to protect the countryside, important green spaces and our built and natural heritage from inappropriate development. Although the adopted plan is still valid, a new local plan is being prepared to ensure Harborough remains up to date, and in line with Government guidance. A consultation has been put in place to enable those living or working within the district to have their say. The consultation document focuses on key planning issues, including

homes, jobs, heritage, town centres, climate change, biodiversity and protection of important open spaces. Each issue is introduced, explained, and feedback is invited on a number of consultation questions.

Broadly the consultation will consider issues and options for future development, housing and employment. The plan will also seek to refresh the list of Non-designated Heritage Assets.

#### **Comparing Scars...**

In the film, Jaws, there is a scene where Quint, the crusty old fisherman who has been hired to kill the shark, and Hooper, the young scientific researcher from the Oceanographic Institute, are comparing scars.

Both men have been bitten and scarred in their encounters with different sharks and marine life, as well as through their other adventures in life. They seek to outdo each other, as they share the stories of their many injuries; injuries that give testimony to their bravery and risk-taking. At one point Chief Brody, the dangeraverse police chief, looks down at his appendix scar, almost like he is trying to imagine a story he could make up about it... Being scarred is a universal feature of human-ness. In the act of

being born we are scarred, when we are detached from our mother's body. A scar that we carry for the rest of our lives - our belly button! Our navel 'scar' reminds us that our lives are a costly gift, given to us by our mothers, at great cost and inconvenience to themselves. Something that should give us all pause for thought.

In the Bible scars are important too. St. Paul's body bore the scars of his many beatings and stonings and no less than three shipwrecks. So, when the churches that he had founded fell out with him and new leaders rose up to oppose him, he wrote this to them; "From now on let no one cause me trouble, for I bear on my body the marks of Jesus" [Galatians 6:17]. His scars were the proof of his devotion to Christ, of his willingness to suffer for the cause of Jesus. His scars were his glory.

But even more significant than St. Paul, it is interesting that after his resurrection, Jesus, in his glorified body, still carries the scars of his crucifixion. We might wonder why? Shouldn't those scars have been healed, erased, shouldn't Jesus' glorified body be perfect and whole?

The reason those scars remain is that they are the absolute demonstration of Jesus's life and work. Jesus is the one who suffered and died for our salvation. His scars do not diminish him, rather they demonstrate his essence, his victory, his sacrifice. His scars are his glory.

So, the next time you are comparing scars and telling the stories of how you got them, remember the glorious injuries of Jesus, willingly accepted for your salvation.
