SHEEPDOGS GO ON TRIAL

The traditional country spectacle of Sheep Dog Trials returns to Husbands Bosworth later this month, on Saturday, July 27th, when the annual Husbands Bosworth & Theddingworth Sheep Dog Trials will

be held in the grounds of Bosworth Hall

Popularised as a spectator event by countryman and commentator, Phil Drabble and the BBC TV programme, 'One Man and his Dog' during the 1990s, the trials are a popular event in the local country calendar.

The Bosworth trials will be open to the public all day from 9.30am on Saturday. There will be light refreshments, lunches, afternoon teas and ices available, and a licenced bar on site.

An important stage in the national Sheep Dog Trials circuit, the Bosworth trials attract a wide spectrum of participants from across the country and carry a proud reputation for bringing forward top-class competitors across all disciplines, feeding into the wider regional and international trialling competitions.

ACCESS ALL AREAS

Following a number of recent incidents where crews have had difficulty during emergency responses, Leicester Fire & Rescue are urging residents to consider access for emergency vehicles when parking in built-up areas.

They are targeting inconsiderately parked vehicles blocking vehicle access, especially in restricted situations, corners and at road junctions. Crews even resorted to releasing images on social media of the problems they faced recently with inconsiderately parked vehicles blocking their emergency response units and are urging drivers to park in a manner that will allow emergency vehicles unimpeded access.

Remember that fire appliances especially, need extended turning and manoeuvring areas. Don't be the inconsiderate driver who slows down responding emergency vehicles - it may be you one day who needs that help... and fast! Think before you park...

Editor's Note: This also goes for access for refuse collection and delivery vehicles around Bosworth.

VOTE CATCHER

You have probably noticed that the Prime Minister has called a 'snap' election for Thursday, July 4th, which some commentators are suggesting is likely, whichever way it goes, to be one of the most pivotal elections of modern times.

If you are minded to vote, the Polling Station will be in the Village Hall, which will be open from 7.00am to 10.00pm.

Remember to bring along a valid form of photo identity.

CAT NIP

What is the new ruling on cat ownership? The new rules, which came into force on June 10th, means that all cats, except feral and unowned cats must, by law, now be micro-chipped on a Defra-approved micro-chipping database before they reach the age of 20 weeks. The ruling also includes cats that only live indoors.

As part of the new rules, you must also keep your contact details on the date base up to date, as you would for a dog.

A 21 days grace period to allow owners to arrange to get their pets micro-chipped was applied, which means that anyone found to be the owner of a cat that hasn't been micro-chipped after July 1st could be liable to a fine of up to £500.

BUGLE POSTBAG

From Rev. Stephen March, Anglican Pioneer Curate to the Hexagon Benefice PRAYER WALKING

For a while now, parishioners of the two village churches, the Anglican All Saints' Church of England and the Roman Catholic St Mary's of the Leicestershire Ordinariate Mission, have been walking together around Husbands Bosworth - you may have come across us - praying for God's protection and blessing our homes, schools, businesses, medical surgeries and even the Parish Council!

We do this about once a month, led by myself, Rev. Stephen March and Fr. Matthew Pittam and we are usually a small group of about half a dozen or so.

When Jesus prays for the future of the Church in John ch.17, he prays not for spiritual power, political influence or even abundant resources, but for unity. I believe that whenever we can express our Christian unity across denominational divides, we please God's heart. One way in which we can do that is in joining together to pray for God's blessing on our local community.

You might ask, 'Why prayer-walk?' Well, in the Bible we see many instances where praying and walking are combined;

'Blessed are those whose strength is in you, whose hearts are set on pilgrimage....'

Psalm 84:6

As we walk, we can become sensitive to particular issues we should be praying about. But there is another encouragement for prayer walking... In the Scripture, God promises to give His people any land they walk through. 'I will give you every place where you set your foot.' *Joshua 1:3*

As we go into our village, where the life of faith seems largely absent, we can ask God to 'give us this land' spiritually, to turn it around and bring its people into the orbit of His love and His Church.

Finally, we remember the example of the Jewish exiles. Taken off to Babylon, they were wondering what their relationship should be to the place of their captivity. God's word comes to the prophet Jeremiah; "...seek the peace of the city where I have sent you into exile, and pray to the Lord on its behalf; for in its peace you will have peace." *Jer. 29:7* As we prayer-walk, we pray to the Lord on behalf of our village, we seek its peace, its flourishing, and its blessing.

BOSWORTH IN FOCUS

WILD ABOUT BOSWORTH

Mosses

A recent BBC documentary foucused on the amazing world of mosses, which, like lichens, were amongst the first plants to emerge onto land about 450 million years ago. Since then, they have evolved to colonise every continent, including 100 species that inhabit Antarctica. Mosses have a simple structure comprising of spirals of leaves attached to a central stalk, at the base of which is a rhizome which forms a hook to anchor the plant in its chosen location. Unlike roots, the rhizome doesn't absorb water or nutrients from the substrate. This marks moss as a non-vascular *bryophyte*.

To survive, mosses need three things, water, (absorbed directly through their leaves), light and carbon dioxide. Using these three ingredients and photosynthesis they manufacture sugars and oxygen. Because of the simplicity of their construction, mosses are incredibly resilient to environmental challenges, but are susceptible to damage from acid rain. They cope well with periods of drought, floods, cold, heat and physical damage and even absorbed radioactive metals from the Fukushima nuclear accident with no ill effects!

Amazingly, they can regenerate a whole plant from a few isolated cells. A scientist who retrieved a sliver of a moss which had been buried underground for 1,500 years in Antarctica, grew it into a complete plant.

It is a cliché, but under a microscope moss really is a jungle... Look closely and you'll see a multitude of tiny invertebrates: springtails, nematodes, tardigrades and rotifers.

Moss reproduction... well it's complicated... and primarily involves spoors, as mosses do not grow flowers or seeds.

Mosses have several uses: notably in the creation of peat and importantly, during malt smoking in the Scottish whisky industry. They're also increasingly being used as a medium for beautiful living wall art!

One of our 'regulars', Stoke Albany House near Market Harborough LE16 8PT is opening every Wednesday throughout July, 2.00pm - 4.30pm. The property features a 4 acre country house garden, with fine trees, herbaceous borders, a sweeping striped lawn, with an impressive display of roses, a Mediterranean garden, water features and various sculptures.

Over the weekend of 13th/14th July, Wigston gardens have a group of gardens open from 11.00am to 5.00pm for one ticket price of £6.00. The four gardens are: 28 Gladstone Street, 2a Homestead Drive, Little Dale Wildlife Garden and 6 Abington Close. These gardens are a mix of traditional and formal planting, with wild flowers, upcycling, and prairie style planting. Most of the gardens are within walking distance, but you may need a car to visit all the gardens or enjoy a walk. There will be homemade teas at Little Dale Wildlife Garden and 28 Gladstone Street.

Green Wicket Farm, Ullesthorpe Road, Bitteswell LE17 4LR is open on July 14th and 17th, 2.00pm - 5:00pm. A formal garden surrounded by fields, with many unusual plants and a range of colour themed borders. Accessible parking and access to the whole garden.

As a special treat for visitors the Secret Garden at Glenfield Hospital (LE3 9QP) will open on the July 20th July, 2.00pm - 5.00pm. This tranquil garden is located in hospital grounds and has been lovingly designed and restored for the benefit of patients and hospital visitors. A colourful garden with roses, lavender, salvias, penstemon, sweet peas, erigeron daisies, geraniums, and wild flowers in bloom. There will also be on show fruit trees, herbs and vegetables. There will be Arts and Crafts Pop-up Stalls, a plant sale and refreshments.

Sheepdog trials were first recorded at Husbands Bosworth in 1905, when the trials were run in conjunction with various other sporting events in a village gala day.

These trials attracted competitors from as far afield as the north of England, and Wales. A local class for farmers and shepherds within the radius of the Fernie & Pytchley Hunts was held following the Open Class. The trials continued as part of the village gala until it was discontinued in 1908.

In 1935, local landowner and auctioneer, Alec McTurk approached a number of farmers from Husbands Bosworth and Theddingworth, particularly those farmers who had settled in the Welland Valley from Wales. The trials were held that year in Husbands Bosworth Hall Park, in conjunction with the British Legion Flower Show and other sporting events. The trials at Bosworth continued at the Hall until the war, returning in 1946, with a gymkhana and pony club activities added to the programme.

The continuation of the sheep dog trials after the war, attracted competitors from further afield. Many from Scotland, Wales and many parts of England were attracted to these excellent trials, and they continue today to be as popular as ever.



ALL SAINTS CHURCH NEWS

Thomas the Doubter

We know very little about Thomas, in fact, almost the only thing we know of him is that he could not believe the other apostles when they told him that they had met the risen Jesus. What bad luck! For 2,000 years he has become a symbol of distrust, of a lack of good faith, of doubt and disbelief. But does he really deserve that?

Put yourself in his place - you have spent three years with Jesus, have seen his miracles and heard his teachings. Finally, you have come to believe that Jesus is the Messiah of God. Imagine your dreams, your hopes for the future.

But disaster! Jesus is betrayed, condemned, tortured, humiliated, nailed to a cross, and dies. Everything you dreamed, everything you hoped, has been shattered. Imagine Thomas's emotional, psychological, spiritual trauma. He was lost, disoriented....

A few days later, the disciples are still trying to cope with this huge disappointment and rebuild their lives. Thomas goes out and when he returns, he finds the other apostles are celebrating. Some are crying, others are laughing, some are singing songs of praise!

Finally, some peace settles, and Thomas asks, "What happened?" They say, "We saw Jesus, He came among us and spoke with us - He has risen!".

If you had been Thomas, how would you have reacted?

Perhaps the easiest thing would be to let yourself be carried along by the excitement but without being really convinced, not wanting to create a scene.

But Thomas honestly expressed his doubt and his disbelief, and we can imagine that it probably led to a heated exchange between him and the other apostles. But he did not give in - he would not believe until he had met with the risen Jesus for himself.

I think there are many people who need to follow the model of Thomas. They have had people share their personal experiences of how Jesus has made a difference in their lives but they find that it is still not entirely convincing. There is something they still lack and like Thomas, they need a personal encounter, a face-to-face meeting with Jesus Christ. I encourage you to ask Jesus for that. Later, Jesus did appear to Thomas and urged him to look and touch, and be convinced. I don't think Jesus minded Thomas's doubts, and I think Jesus is still ready to do that for anyone who genuinely asks Him.

Of course, if you come to church on a Sunday, you put yourself in the space where those experiences happen most often. So, do come along. Stephen ♥
