

GROWING PAINS

Catesby, the promoters of the proposed development site east of Welford Road, have finally shown their hand with an outline planning application for the site.

Worryingly, the proposals laid out in the site plan show little, if any, acknowledgement of the points raised by respondents in the public consultation in March, or the earlier informal consultation with the Parish Council. The proposal ignores the core concerns raised by villagers in the pre-submission public consultation, and also the consultation with the Parish Council, rendering both exercises pointless.

Whilst the Parish Council supports sustainable and proportionate growth of the village, concerns were raised that the overwhelming scale of development would constitute a major increase in the size of the village, putting strain on local facilities, traffic movement and utilities. 150 dwellings would represent a 25% increase in the size of the village.

As noted in the consultations, the development shows little connectivity to the existing built areas; the only road access being outside the existing building line and onto an unrestricted section of highway. The only other entry points are reliant on limited bridleway and pedestrian footpath access.

No consideration of the loss of medieval ridge and furrow and open rural vistas; both noted as locally important heritage landscape features. The proposal shows a lack of conformity with Harborough's Local Plan or the Husbands Bosworth Neighbourhood Plan, and at any rate ignores Harborough's own 105 dwellings allocation (to 2031) for Husbands Bosworth.

The proposals include:

Up to 150 new homes

40% Affordable Housing

Extensive areas of new landscaped open green space including play areas, managed for amenity and biodiversity gains

A network of pedestrian and cycle routes through the development, ensuring safe, convenient and car free connections for residents.

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BOSWORTH IN FOCUS

WILD ABOUT BOSWORTH

American Signal Crayfish

When considering non-native invasive species that have been introduced into our countryside, it is hard to find one that has such bad press as the American signal crayfish... Introduced from the US as late as the 1970s, as a commercially-farmed gastronomic delicacy, these voracious predators have wrought havoc in our inland waterways. Identification can be problematic. However, signal crayfish have red undersides to their claws, with a distinctive blue/white hinge. They are typically larger, growing to 15cm - 20cm.; much larger than our native white clawed crayfish, (typically less than 10cm) which they prey on and out compete. Signal crayfish are particularly aggressive in nature, destroy aquatic habitats, undermine canal and river banks, and eat anything that moves (and anything that has ceased to move...) even turning on each other when the whim takes them! That's not all...



they also carry a plague that decimates local native crayfish colonies. Due to the risk of misidentification and the threat of disease transmission, it is illegal to actively set out to catch signal crayfish, and any that are inadvertently caught must not be returned to the water. Also, conversely, the removal of the older, larger active examples, which have a role in controlling the colonies, can encourage the proliferation of the underlings... All in all, bad boys!

You often come across the mortal remains of signal crayfish (usually just the claws) on the towpath (often evidence of the presence of otters), or pause a while on the river bridge in town and spot them lurking among the pebbles in the shallows.

BYGONE BOSWORTH

Images from the Historical Society's Archive Collection

It's no surprise that developers were quick to see a big green light over Bosworth when the recent changes to the government's housing policy were announced. The stated determination to see more homes built, relaxation of community boundaries and the simplification of the planning process opened up opportunities to look at sites that might previously have been problematic to develop.

Rural village sites, especially previously undeveloped 'greenfield' sites have long been seen as easy targets, presenting few obstacles to development. With the 'threats' of development looming over the village at present, it is worth looking back at how Bosworth has developed in relatively recent times.

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COMPLETED HOUSE AVAILABLE FOR INSPECTION.

It is doubtful that there was much opposition to the 1930s ribbon development on Welford Road, or the Clearance Act removal of insanitary homes in Butt Lane and Bell Lane. As with the development of Lammas Close in the 1950s, housing was desperately needed, and local authority housing performed the function, with little finesse, and literally filled the gap.

In our pictures from the Historical Society Archive this month we look at later development. Hunters Close and Highcroft signalled the move, as markets evolved, to developing private housing. Built on greenfield sites, outside the established building line of the village, the advertising blurb clearly promotes the 'charming' rural character of the site, the vistas, (...one of the most beautiful in the area.) and the strategic location. And, at £6250 for a detached three-bedroom house, an absolute snip!

ALL SAINTS CHURCH NEWS

While it is important to regular worshippers that All Saints remains open there are occasions when weddings, funerals and baptisms have to take place there, whether or not those involved attend services regularly.
